The purpose of this thesis was to present a history of the women's intercollegiate athletic program at East Carolina University from 1969 to 1996. The absence of complete information on the development of women's athletics at ECU dictated the need for this study.

Data was collected through the use of newspaper articles, interviews and information provided by the Sports Information Office at East Carolina University. The thesis contains background information on women's athletics and chapters on all women's sports at the school. It also presents findings of the study and comments on the future of women's athletics at East Carolina.

The main findings and conclusions of the study were:

1. A lack of money during the early years of women's intercollegiate athletics at East Carolina hurt the overall development of the women's program, including the retention of quality coaches.
2. A lack of money for scholarships and recruiting in the first 20 years of the women's program affected the quality of athletes recruited to ECU, which resulted in decreased competitiveness and mediocre performances by many of the school's teams.
3. A lack of interest and administrative support for women's sports during their initial years of development prevented the rapid growth and success of the program.
4. The lack of interest and administrative support during the early years also prevented accurate record-keeping in women's athletics, and as a result, many current and past sports do not have complete historical records of their development.

5. A new commitment to gender equity and an adopted 10-year plan for women's athletics should improve the overall development and success of the program by 2015.

6. More work is needed to create better, accurate records on the history of women's athletics at East Carolina University. The research encompassed in this volume is a start, but additional detailed research, including complete rosters, year-by-year results and interviews with team members, is needed in order to track where the program has been in the past and where it is going in the future.

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## Chapter 1

### Introduction

Women's intercollegiate athletics, after a brief stint during the 1930s, did not officially take hold at East Carolina University until 1969. Beginning with limited schedules in basketball, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, swimming and diving, tennis and volleyball, the program operated under the guidance of coordinator Nell Stallings and coach Catherine Bolton. Today, almost 30 years later, the women's program includes basketball, cross country, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball. In addition, another sport is scheduled to be added within the next few years.

### The Study

#### Purpose of the Study

The purpose of the study is to present a history of the women's intercollegiate athletics program at East Carolina University from 1969 through 1996. Results of the study should be of interest to the Athletic Department, Sports Information Department, faculty, staff, students and former participants in athletics at East Carolina University.

#### The Problem

The absence of complete information on the development of women's intercollegiate athletics at East Carolina University, including records and results for all of the early sports excluding basketball.

#### Hypothesis

The lack of money and attention given to women's athletics during their early existence at East Carolina University, which mainly affected



scholarships and recruiting efforts, later hampered the competitiveness of the women's programs at the school.

### Limitations of the Study

1. The study was limited to the present women's intercollegiate athletics program at East Carolina University, which began in 1969. It does not include information on any intramural programs or men's intercollegiate athletic sports. In addition, the study does not provide each roster and schedule results for every women's athletic program since 1969. In some cases, such as field hockey, golf and gymnastics, the information is not available. Rather, the purpose of the study is to provide a detailed background on the women's intercollegiate athletic program at East Carolina University and a general overview of each sport women have competed in since the first year of competition in 1969.

2. A good portion of the data for this study was collected through the use of personal interviews with individuals involved in women's athletics at East Carolina University. Because such data relies on the personal recollections of those individuals, information may not always be totally accurate or consistent. Also, the information included herein cannot be considered a complete history simply because it was impossible to contact and interview each individual who contributed to the history of women's intercollegiate athletics at East Carolina University.

### Definitions of Terms

1. The East Carolinian, the East Carolina University school newspaper, was known as the Fountainhead between the years of 1969 and

1979.

2. The Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women, or AIAW, was the governing organization for women's collegiate athletics until the early 1980s. As such, the North Carolina Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women, or NCAIAW, governed women's athletics in the state of North Carolina.

3. The National Collegiate Athletic Association, or NCAA, was originally the governing organization for men's collegiate athletics across the country. In the early 1980s, the NCAA became the governing organization for women's collegiate athletics also, and today the NCAA governs all intercollegiate athletic programs.

4. The Colonial Athletic Association, or CAA, formed out of the ECAC South conference on June 6, 1985. The old ECAC South, which began in 1981 as a basketball league, included the Naval Academy, East Carolina University, George Mason University, James Madison University, Old Dominion University, the University of Richmond and the College of William and Mary. The nine schools currently in the CAA are East Carolina University, George Mason University, James Madison University, Old Dominion University, the University of Richmond, American University, Virginia Commonwealth University, the College of William and Mary and the University of North Carolina at Wilmington.

5. Women's intercollegiate athletics at East Carolina University is defined as the varsity competitive women's basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field and volleyball teams, which operate under the direction of the Athletic Department and the rules and limitations set thereof.

## Chapter 2

### The Early Years

The present women's intercollegiate athletic program began at East Carolina University in the fall of 1969 with the fielding of seven sports: basketball, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, swimming, tennis, and volleyball. Originally paid for with money appropriated by the Student Government Association, the first-year sports mostly played limited schedules and were administered by Nell Stallings, coordinator of women's athletics (Bolton, 1978, May 11). Helping her was Catherine Bolton, who at some point during the early years served as coach for basketball, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, tennis, and volleyball (Hickman, 1977).

Although there was an earlier program of women's intercollegiate athletics at East Carolina prior to 1969, it only lasted about six years. Women's intramural sports, particularly basketball, had been popular since around 1910, and by 1932 the Women's Athletic Association asked school administrators for permission to establish an intercollegiate team. Denied permission at first, the women finally took the court in 1934 and won six games against neighboring schools and YWCAs. In 1936, under the direction of Lucille Norton in the physical education department, the program grew to include tennis and volleyball. After having trouble scheduling contests with other schools who did not favor women's athletics, the intercollegiate program ended in 1939 and did not resume for 30 years (Bratton, 1986).

According to Bolton, the new interest in women's intercollegiate athletics occurred because female athletes were ready to move beyond the

intramural realm at East Carolina. But that did not mean they were ready to totally embrace the rules established for men's intercollegiate programs.

"The students were so enthusiastic. From my understanding, the students had sort of initiated the drive to get funding. And so there was a lot of concern in the early days of women's athletics that we didn't have to model ourselves after the way the men's programs were being run," Bolton said. "There were some real philosophical issues and I think Ms. Stallings tried very hard to make sure that those kinds of issues were dealt with and that the women were given educational priorities. So I guess she was sort of a moral guide to the beginning of the program," (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

As early as May 1969, East Carolina Chancellor Leo Jenkins was also voicing his support for women's athletics. In a speech made that month to members of the Southern Conference, Jenkins said it appeared the time had come for the conference to, "develop varsity athletics for women, or even establish a Southern Conference varsity athletic program for women between the various members of the Southern Conference," (East Carolina University Special Collections, 1969).

Jenkins said such a program was already in the works at East Carolina. "Another innovation might be to have girls on predominantly male varsity sports in which they can compete," he continued. "I am referring here to such sports as tennis, swimming and golf. Here again, at any time that a girl can compete with or excel the athletic prowess of the men on the varsity squad, by what rational can we prevent that competition? It might prove a

strong incentive for the male members of the squad to produce a greater effort in view of the fact that they hardly wish to be excelled by a female," (East Carolina University Special Collections, 1969).

For several years, the same seven sports continued to exist for women at East Carolina, each with their own degree of success. Most were coached by Bolton at one time or another, with the help of graduate assistants in some cases. The teams competed as part of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), a governing organization for women's athletics. Early on money for the program, which was very limited, was still provided by the Student Government Association, not the Athletic Department, but that later changed (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

"The question was, and it is a good philosophical question, was why would women not be administered by the athletic department? Valid question, valid issue," Bolton said. "It was a valid argument that we should have been there. But when we did move under athletics, the discrepancy between the men and the women was just ... glaring. You just couldn't sit back because the women's teams were even less funded than the non-revenue men's teams, and they needed more funding. So those were some touchy issues as we moved into that period," (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

The period Bolton referred to was the beginning of Title IX of the Educational Amendments Act of 1972. By the mid-1970s this federal legislation, which established that no institution receiving federal money

could discriminate against or exclude women from any activity on the basis of sex, was creating a firestorm on college campuses across the nation. East Carolina University was no exception.

In 1974, the entire women's athletic budget at ECU totaled \$13,160, or less than \$2,000 for each of the seven sports. In contrast, the men's sports budget was \$552,230, including \$396,572 for football (Englert, 1974). This was the type of discrepancy the passage of Title IX was meant to alleviate.

In the next four years, the women's athletic budget increased in small amounts and more coaches were added, namely Steveda Chepko and Laurie Arrants in 1975. Bolton became the coordinator of the women's program that year, succeeding Nell Stallings, and continued her work toward Title IX equity at ECU (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997). As such, the first-ever athletic scholarships for women were announced in December of 1975. Seven women, Clare Albrittain, Gail Betton, Debbie Freeman, Beverly Osborn, April Ross, Frances Swenholt and Donna Williford, were the recipients of these first athletic awards ("Women Get," 1975).

Still, in the eyes of some, the process of gender equity in athletics did not move fast enough at East Carolina. In May of 1978, citing unequal treatment of women athletes, a group of five students filed a formal grievance with Chancellor Leo Jenkins. The group, Debby Newby, Mike Healy, Donna Pendley, Jill Vaughn and April Ross, requested a hearing in order to discuss alleged discrimination in several areas. Those areas were "provision to supplies and equipment, game and practice schedules, travel and per diem allowance, locker rooms, practice, and competitive facilities,

assignment and pay of the coaches, publicity and athletic scholarships," (Holloman, 1978).

Throughout the summer, a committee formed by Jenkins heard arguments from the students and responses from the university before ruling in favor of the students in August. For its part, the university submitted "A Plan to Strengthen Women's Athletics and Comply with Title IX Guidelines," and revised the proposed 1978-79 athletic budget. As a result, many women's sports saw budget increases of more than 200 percent, and the women's travel budget also increased. Despite the changes, however, Newby said the university had still not totally complied with Title IX guidelines in several areas (Whisnant, 1978).

According to then-Athletic Director Bill Cain, the problem in meeting Title IX was money. "I would say that I had some big issues there. I came in right at the beginning or early beginning of Title IX. And so from 1975 to 1980 I had to deal with some major problems," he said. "The federal government said 'you will do this' and they didn't really give you the resources to do it. I put tremendous pressure on myself to keep sports and try to fund within what we had and not cut anybody. And I am a pretty good money manager, but that was a hell of a chore," (B. Cain, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

According to Bolton, the lack of money early on hampered the growth and success of East Carolina University women's athletics in later years, mainly because the school could not offer full scholarships and therefore recruit the best players to ECU. Specifically she uses Kay Yow, an East

Carolina University graduate, as an example. Yow was the women's basketball coach at Elon College who later was hired to establish a program at North Carolina State University. While Yow's Elon College teams were regularly beaten by Bolton's ECU teams, once Yow moved to N.C. State and was able to offer more scholarships and recruit better players, N.C. State began blowing ECU off the map each time they played (C. Bolton, February 25, 1997).

"What happened in terms of our competitiveness was that the other institutions, the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) institutions, initiated programs. As soon as an ACC school started a basketball program they were immediately successful in recruiting. So the men's ACC aura influenced that immediately," Bolton said. "In pretty short order, (Yow) was able to recruit from around the whole region and we were, in two years, not competitive. In time, the recruiting differences and money difference and scholarship differences enabled them to become a power. Budget and ability to recruit was not enabling us to compete with those ACC schools in basketball," (C. Bolton, February 25, 1997).

After the Title IX grievance and money issues of the 1970s, the next big changes occurred in the early 1980s. That was when women's athletics, still part of the AIAW, became part of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). From that point on, men's and women's collegiate programs were administered by the same organization (Chandler, 1981, February 19).

At ECU, 1981 was an important year because the first woman was inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame now boasts eight women athletes (ECU Pirates Football, 1996).



## Chapter 3

### Basketball

Of all the women's sports at East Carolina University which got their start during the 1969-70 school year, basketball was easily the quickest success story. Under the direction of perennial coach Catherine Bolton, whose talents and winning percentage of .671 have never been topped, the basketball program attained both state and regional dominance within just a few short years.

Fortunately, due to the early success of women's basketball, records and information about teams over the years are plentiful. Women's basketball is the only team from that first year of intercollegiate competition for which year-by-year records and results are known.

In her first year as coach, Bolton's team compiled a 9-2 record, giving her an impressive .818 winning percentage. The next year the percentage jumped to .916, the highest single-season winning percentage in the history of ECU women's basketball, as the team lost only one game in 12 contests (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97). The loss that year came at the hands of nationally ranked Western Carolina University (Gibson, 1971). In 1972, the team completed another successful year with a 12-3 record and .800 winning percentage (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97).

But it was in 1973 that East Carolina made its earliest mark in the national basketball arena. Bolton remembers the season well.

“I had two outstanding players that played most of the game, with very little rest. And then I had six other players who were first-string caliber. So I sort of had an offensive set and a defensive set and it really, it was a lot of fun,” she said. “The team, we would be doing the offense number and then I would send in these defense kids and you could just see the opponent’s eyes get big. And then there would just be this real intense defense. It was just a treat to watch those women play,” (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

Coming off a spectacular regular season in which the team posted a 12-0 record, the women continued their success in the state tournament, winning three games and gaining a spot in the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) Region II Tournament (Trausneck, 1973, March 8). In regional play, the team continued the streak with wins over James Madison University, Tennessee Tech and South Carolina, and pushed their record to 18-0 (Trausneck, 1973, March 13). With those victories the women won a berth in the national tournament with 15 other teams, but that is where the story ended for East Carolina.

The eighth-ranked Pirates lost their first game to Western Washington State College, but then advanced in the consolation bracket with a win over Indiana State. In their final game against Kansas State, Bolton’s team lost 47-46 in the last 30 seconds of play and ended the season with a 19-2 record. Team stars Sheilah Cotten, Peggy Taylor, and Susan James, along with the other players, are still considered some of the best women to ever play basketball at East Carolina (Trausneck, 1973, March 27).

While the remaining Bolton teams did not fare as well as the 1973 squad, the majority of them were successful all the same. In 1974 the season record was 8-5, but ended early with a loss to the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in the state tournament ("Women Cagers," 1974). The next year the team compiled a 14-9 record but lost two games in the AIAW Region II Tournament, and in 1975-76 the women finished the year 12-6 (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97).

During the Bolton era, which lasted nine years, the women's teams saw only one losing season, in 1976-77. In games that year the women posted only a 7-15 mark, but it was during the final match of the season against the University of North Carolina that Bolton experienced the greatest highlight of her coaching career. The team, playing a consolation game in Chapel Hill for a third-place state finish, faced the Tar Heels after being blown out by North Carolina State in an earlier match-up (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

"The third-place game was against Carolina, and we were playing in Carmichael where the guys were playing at the time. And we beat Carolina for third-place that game. We weren't supposed to beat anybody," Bolton said. "The kid that scored the winning basket was a substitute; she was probably about ninth or eighth on my list of players. That was the only time in my coaching that we beat Carolina in Carmichael, and to the kids that had such a long, difficult season, it was like we had won the national championship," (C Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

Bolton continued, "It is easy to go off winning that wonderful 1973

year, and that was wonderful. "But it was not as wonderful as that bunch of kids who had struggled so hard and so long, and they played the best that they could play right down through the bench, to pull off beating Carolina in Carmichael," (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

A more determined team returned the following year to finish Bolton's coaching career at ECU with a 19-11 season. Standouts included Blounts Creek native Rosie Thompson, the leading scorer for the team, who would go on to leave her mark in the ECU record books (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97).

Following Bolton as head coach was Kathy Andruzzi, who spent six years at ECU before leaving to pursue business interests in 1984 (B. Cain, personal communication, February 25, 1997). Andruzzi did well as coach of the Pirates, tallying a .616 career coaching record. Her first three teams won 18, 21 and 22 games, respectively, with the 1980-81 team advancing to the AIAW Region II Tournament. In 1981-82 the women posted a 17-10 record but lost to South Carolina in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Eastern Regionals. In her final two years as coach, Andruzzi's teams finished with 14-12 and 13-16 seasons (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97).

The most memorable thing about Andruzzi's tenure was not her win-loss record, although that was impressive, but rather her unique ability to promote Lady Pirate basketball. Andruzzi, the first-ever full-time women's coach at ECU, was also the first woman to have a television coaches show in the state of North Carolina. The show, which premiered in November of

1979, was broadcast on WNCT-TV and featured game highlights and player interviews (DuPree, 1979, November 8).

After Andruzzi left East Carolina, she was replaced by Emily Manwaring, who in her three short years as head coach led the Pirates to consecutive winning seasons and a .670 winning percentage, the best percentage since the days of Catherine Bolton. In 1984-85 the team finished the season with a 20-9 record, in 1985-86 the record improved to 23-7, and in 1986-87 the women finished the year at 16-13 (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97). Manwaring's success could have continued the Pirates' solid program into the 1990s, but the coach resigned suddenly in February 1987, refusing to give a reason for her departure (Mews, 1987, February 3).

Pat Pierson, formally the head coach at Northwestern State University, was named the new women's coach in March of 1987 ("Pierson Named," 1987). She held the position five years, leading the Pirates to winning seasons in three of those years. Despite a first year record of 8-20, Pierson's teams continued to improve, posting a 15-13 record in 1988-89, an 18-10 record in 1989-90, and a 12-17 record in 1990-91. In 1991-92, Pierson's final and most successful year at ECU, the Lady Pirates won 21 games, lost 8 games and raised the coach's overall winning percentage to .521 (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97).

In 1992, ECU named Rosie Thompson, a five-year assistant under Pierson, as the head women's coach. Simply put, Thompson, a 1979 graduate of the school, was the best athlete to ever play women's basketball at East

Carolina. Most of the records she set during her career still hold almost 20 years later. As a player she was ECU's all-time leading scorer, with 2,352 points, and rebounder at 1,183. Other records included the most scoring in one season with 723 points, and the most rebounds in a season at 358.

Thompson was also ECU's all-time most accurate free throw shooter, having hit 74 percent from the line in her career. She led the Pirates' in minutes played, scoring, and rebounding for three straight years, and is the only Lady Pirate in history to have her jersey retired (East Carolina University Lady Pirate Basketball, 1994-1995).

As such, there was a lot of pressure on Thompson to succeed as head coach. In her first year the team delivered, posting a 16-12 record and giving the Pirates their 20th winning season in 24 years. But a depleted squad in 1993-94 only won two games in 26 contests. In her final year as head coach, Thompson's team improved to 8-19, but still left her with a career coaching record of 26-55. After resigning her post, Thompson continued working at ECU and in July of 1995 was named the senior women's administrator in the athletic department (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97).

Anne Donovan, a three-time Olympian, three-time All-American and semi-professional basketball player, joined the women's program as head coach in 1995. Donovan brought a wealth of experience to the position and, with five seniors returning in her first year, posted a record of 11-16 (East Carolina University Women's Basketball, 1996-97). With Donovan's experience, it is likely women's basketball at ECU will, in time, see successes similar to those experienced during the early years of the program.

## Chapter 4

### Cross Country

The emergence of women's cross country at East Carolina University came in 1986, when Athletic Director Ken Karr asked former wrestling coach John Welborn to restart a men's program which had been defunct since 1976 and combine it with a women's team. In the beginning, the team was strictly a walk-on program, but Welborn hoped a solid foundation would provide success in future years (Chandler, 1986). The budget for the first year was a mere \$250 (Morris, 1989).

In the inaugural year the women placed fifth in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA), and were led by Terri Lynch, Stephanie Ingram, Kim Griffiths, Kim Abernethy and Sheri Swick (East Carolina University Cross Country, 1987). In 1987 the Pirates took fourth place in the state's cross country championships, which were held in Raleigh ("ECU Women," 1987). They ended the year sixth in the CAA, but finished first in two of their seven meets leading up to the conference championships. Griffiths turned in the best performance at the championships that year, and was subsequently named the women's cross country most valuable player for 1987. Her efforts were supported by Lynch, Dawn Tillson, Judy Wilson, and Lucretia West (East Carolina University Cross Country, 1988).

In 1988, a freshman from Washington, NC put her stamp on the still young cross country program. Ann Marie Welch, who had not competed in high school, joined the team after being encouraged by her sister, Bobbi, another cross country runner at ECU. The family connection paid off. Welch

not only won her first meet as a freshman, but went on to win two more meets that year, setting a new ECU women's 5K record (18:29) along the way. Welch finished in thirteenth place at the CAA championships and led the team to a fifth-place finish (East Carolina University Cross Country, 1989).

The next year Welch garnered two first place honors and the team finished first in half of their first six competitions, but an injury prevented her from competing in the CAA championships, and the team ended the year with a disappointing last place finish there (East Carolina University Cross Country, 1990). Even so, by the fourth year of the program the team was receiving more recognition and the budget had improved to almost \$1,000 (Morris, 1989).

In 1990, the cross country team again had Welch as its top runner. Returning teammates were Gretchen Harley, Marianne Marini and Cathrine Norstrand. The year was a successful one for Welch, who was undefeated during the first five meets of the season, and for the team, which finished first in four meets. However, an injury to Welch two days before the CAA championships ended the team's hopes for a top finish, and for the second year in a row the women's team took last place. Senior Tillson, ECU's top finisher at the CAA championships, and Welch both competed that year in the NCAA District III championships (East Carolina University Cross Country, 1991).

The 1991 season capped off a successful cross country career for Welch, a graduating senior, who was awarded the team's most valuable player award for the fourth straight year (East Carolina University Women's Track & Cross



Country, 1996). She finished first for ECU in each of the team's six meets, including the CAA championships and NCAA District III championships. Overall, the team had one first-place finish and two fourth-place finishes, including the CAA championships, which was the highest finish for the team during its first six years of competition. In addition, the women competed as a team for the first time that year in the NCAA's. Standout Stacy Green, along with Marini, Norstrand, Susan Hu, Harley and Welch took home a 27th place finish out of 33 teams (East Carolina University Cross Country, 1992).

In 1992, sophomore Stacy Green led the Pirates in six of their seven meets during a year in which the team earned one first place, two second place, one third place, and two seventh place finishes, one of which was the bottom slot in the CAA championships. The team placed 34th out of 38 teams at the NCAA District III championships (East Carolina University Cross Country, 1993). But an injury to Green in 1993 left room for freshmen twin sisters Dava and Tara Rhodes to make their mark on the cross country program. That year Dava Rhodes led the Pirates in six meets, Tara Rhodes led in one meet, and Dava Rhodes and Norstrand led together in one meet. The sisters earned All-Conference honors at the CAA championships, where ECU finished in third place, the best ever for the team. The team also had its best finish at the NCAA competition, finishing 28th in a field of 40 teams (East Carolina University Cross Country, 1994).

Dava Rhodes continued to lead the Pirates in 1994, and was named the team's most valuable player for the second straight year. But since the team

won only one meet during the 1994 regular season, and secured a fourth place finish at the CAA championships, both sisters were ready to improve their records in 1995. That year Dava Rhodes was named to the All-America team while Tara Rhodes earned All-East honors. The surprise, however, was freshman Suzanne Bellamy, who finished in the top spot for the Pirates in five of their six meets. The team also placed fourth in the CAA championships for the second straight year (East Carolina University Women's Track & Cross Country, 1996).

In 1996 a big change in the program was the naming of Charles Justice as head women's coach to replace John Welborn, who had led the Pirates since the team's beginning in 1986. Justice, an accomplished runner himself, had served as the women's cross country assistant coach under Welborn since 1989 (East Carolina University Women's Track & Cross Country, 1996).

## Chapter 5

### Field Hockey

East Carolina University started the sticks flying in 1969 as one of only three schools in the state to offer a women's intercollegiate field hockey schedule. Although field hockey records from the Sports Information office at ECU do not begin until 1976, an array of early newspaper clippings show that the first seven years of the program were somewhat successful. In 1970, the team only won one game, but fought tough opponents from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and High Point College to tie games. This early team was led by goalie Janet Cox, center Tamara Wooten and halfback Cheryl Thompson. The fall of 1971 looked promising for the women, who only lost three members to graduation. Contests that fall included match-ups with Salem College, the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and William and Mary (Gibson, 1971).

In 1972, Gail Betton was chosen to play first on the Deep South All-Star Team, then on the Regional All-Star team which competed at the national level. At that time only four other players in the state had advanced that far in all-star competition (East Carolina University Women's Athletics, 1977).

The next year coach Catherine Bolton had 15 players return for a schedule of three games and two tournaments, including one home match. Leading the team was Second-Team Deep South fullback Francis Swenholt (Tompkins, 1973, September 18). Highlights that fall included an 8-0 shutout of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in which Terry Jones scored four goals, Jane Gallop scored two, and Carlene Boyd and Swenholt

scored one each ("Ladies Shutout," 1973). The team closed the year at the Deep South Tournament, defeating Furman University 1-0 in the first game but losing to host Appalachian State University 3-0 in the second game. The third game of the tournament ended with the Pirates beating the Carolina club team from Greensboro 1-0. After the tournament Boyd, an alternate on the Deep South Tournament team, represented the south in the Southeastern Tournament ("Women Close Out Season," 1973).

In 1974, Bolton coached the team through a successful year. The women posted an early 8-0 win against Old Dominion University, but fell 3-0 four days later against the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (Hughes, 1974). In a heavily contested match against the Tar Heels of North Carolina, the Pirates pulled off a 3-2 win, their sixth victory of the season, in the last 20 seconds of play. An official called a corner shot for North Carolina at the end of the game, but time expired before the shot could be made ("Ladies Win With Sticks," 1974). In two late regular season games, the team downed Campbell College 4-1 and posted a scoreless tie against High Point College, then moved on to the Deep South Tournament ("Hockey Team Wins," 1974). In the tournament the women registered one win, one tie and one loss. Four players, Betton, Boyd, Moira Devlin and Lynn Shubert, were rewarded with Deep South honors ("Four Make Deep South," 1974).

The next year of competition brought change to the field hockey program. Laurie Arrants joined the Pirate staff in 1975 as the coach of field hockey, junior varsity basketball and a newly-established women's track team. Arrants, who received her master's degree from Florida State University

earlier that same year, had served as Vice President of the Deep South Field Hockey Association prior to her arrival in Greenville (East Carolina University Women's Athletics, 1977).

In 1976, the team opened the season shorthanded, with only 13 players available to fill eleven slots. "We were hurt by graduation last year, because we had five seniors starting," Arrants said. "We are very young this year but will have some fine individual players," (Wheeler, 1976, September 23). Top returning starters were Betton and Devlin, who had helped the Pirates garner a 4-5-3 record during Arrants' first year. Before ECU played host to the 1976 Deep South Field Hockey Tournament in November, the team had posted a 4-6-1 record in regular season play (Hogge, 1976, November 4). At the tournament the Pirates won three out of four matches and three players, Betton, Kathy Zwigard, and Beth Beem, received Deep South honors (Hogge, 1976, November 11).

The field hockey schedule in 1977 included games against eight schools, a Winthrop College tournament and the Deep South tournament. The women opened the year with a 6-0 romp at home against Clemson University, then lost their next three games. By the end of the year the team held a 4-7 record, including a mid-year loss to the non-conference NC Club team and an early loss (2-1) to Appalachian State University in the Deep South Tournament. Sue Jones led the team with 10 goals that season, while Zwigard and Sue Saltzer followed with three goals each (Arrants, 1977).

With two top scorers returning along with an experienced defensive squad, Arrants expected good things from the 1978 field hockey team. Led by

Jones and Zwigard, the Pirates hoped to compete for the North Carolina Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (NCAIAW) state title and Deep South Tournament title (Rogers, 1978). The year was a disappointing one, however, as the team managed only a 4-10-1 record. Two wins were over Wake Forest University, while the other two came against the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Furman University in the Deep South Tournament. Zwigard and Jones were both named to the Deep South's third team. (East Carolina University Sports Information, 1979).

In 1979, six starters returned and the years of hard work finally paid off for the team. After posting a 2-6 record in regular season games leading up to the NCAIAW Division II Championships in Rock Hill, SC, the Pirates entered the tournament without high expectations. The fourth-ranked women surprised themselves, however, by first beating Wake Forest University 1-0, then High Point College by a 1-0 margin. Arrants, who left the team with assistant coach Anne Holmes for the first two games to attend a seminar in Atlanta, joined the team before the final match-up on Friday afternoon. (DuPree, 1979, November 6).

"I flew in Friday morning and everyone I saw was telling me how well East Carolina was playing," Arrants said. "I thought, 'my goodness; is this the same team I watched all season?' " (DuPree, 1979, November 6).

The women then lost 3-0 to Pfeiffer College in the championship match-up, but still finished second in the state. In the Deep South Tournament, which immediately followed the state playoffs, ECU won the first game against Converse College, but dropped the next two against

Clemson University and Appalachian State. Dru Kennedy, Carol Belcher and Dana Salmons were all awarded Deep South honors (DuPree, 1979, November 6).

The start of the new decade, ironically, was the beginning of the end for women's intercollegiate field hockey at East Carolina University. On October 22, 1980, Athletic Director Ken Karr announced that the women's field hockey and men's wrestling programs would be dropped at the end of their respective seasons ("ECU Axes Wrestling," 1980).

"Today's economic situation is extremely tough for athletic programs, especially one like ours that is attempting to grow. We must divert resources and energies in the areas most suited to our needs," Karr said. "As we project to the future and possible conference alignment, we must realize what sports are likely to be sanctioned by a conference. Wrestling and field hockey are not very likely to be sanctioned, whereas AIAW and NCAA cross country and AIAW golf are more likely choices. This is due to dollars involved in fielding such teams and the availability of recruiting talent in one's own backyard," ("ECU Axes Wrestling," 1980).

As such, the final version of women's field hockey started the year with a 2-0 win over Wake Forest University, then dropped the next five games, the last of which meant an early exit from the NCAIAW Division II state tournament. In the Deep South Tournament which followed, ECU held Wake Forest to a 0-0 tie, then managed another 0-0 tie with the North Carolina Club team. The last game of ECU's women's field hockey team, against the Tobacco Road Club, ended with a 1-1 tie. Junior Carol Belcher

earned first-team All-Deep South honors, and sophomore Dana Salmons earned a second-team spot, while sophomore Jane Radford and junior Dru Kennedy gained places on the third team ("Lady Pirates Fall," 1980).

As the season ended, Arrants expressed confidence in a field hockey club team for the following year and pride in her players. "Even though we're graduating two seniors, the team shows a tremendous amount of potential. We should have a terrific nucleus for next year's club team," she said. "I am very proud of them. They really played good hockey," ("Lady Pirates Fall," 1980).



## Chapter 6

### Golf

Women's golf began at East Carolina University in 1969-70 as one of seven sports fielded during the first year of women's intercollegiate competition at the school. It also holds the honor of being the shortest-lived women's sport at ECU, having lasted only until the 1976-77 season.

According to Catherine Bolton, who supervised the early golf teams, "Golf was really taking them to tournaments. I don't recall ever playing a two-way match in golf. We monitored that there was practice, which we arranged. They were practicing at Brook Valley ... the few, the handful. But in terms of true coaching, they really didn't have that true coaching. And I went as a chaperone to take them to some tournaments" (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

Although no records exist on the women's golf team at the Sports Information office at East Carolina, there are a few newspaper clippings over the years which provide some sketchy details about the sport and its players.

The earliest standout on the golf team was Gail Sykes, who that first year won the National Women's Intercollegiate Golf Tournament (Gibson, 1971). Sykes was also known for setting course records on three state golf courses and was one of six players named to the first women's intercollegiate All-America golf team ("Primary Ed.," 1969).

Another golfer at that time, Kathy Postlewait, graduated and went on to become a successful Ladies Professional Golf Association player. She was named to the East Carolina University Sports Hall of Fame in 1989 (East

Carolina University Football, 1996). Other team members in the first years included Joan Edwards, Cheryl Thompson and Nan Roberson (Gibson, 1971).

In 1973, the team opened their fall season against Wake Forest and Furman and were led by returning golfer Barbara Haverty, a four-handicapper, along with Lea Kemezis and Lollie Edwards (Tompkins, 1973, September 25). Later that season, Kemezis was first in the putting competition and fifth overall at the Mary Baldwin Invitational in Virginia ("Women to Compete," 1974).

In the fall of 1975, Steveda Chepko joined the Pirate staff as the head coach for, among other sports, golf. Early the next year golfer Marsha Person took first place at the North Carolina Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (NCAIAW) golf tournament in Durham, NC. Veteran team member Barbara Haverty placed third in the event with a two-day total score of 174 ("Person Takes First Place," 1976). The two later teamed up to take the team title at the Appalachian Invitational Tournament with a combined score of 169 during the last competition of that season. Haverty's score of 79 was enough to win the tournament, while Person's score of 90 garnered her a third-place slot. The pair beat out teams from Appalachian State University, Wake Forest and Winthrop College during the event ("Haverty Wins," 1976).

By late 1976, men's golf coach Mac McLendon took over the women's program, which had Person as the only returning member. Among the newcomers were Heather Jones, Jill Carney, Lynn Copeland, Morri Chambliss, and Dawn Williamson, none of whom had collegiate experience (Wheeler, 1976). Despite the youth factor, Jones scored 80 to win the

individual medalist in the Blue Ridge Ladies Tournament, the first tournament of the year (Robey, 1976, September 30). By the end of the season, Pierson, Jones and Carney had qualified for individual play in the state tournament. However, since four players needed to qualify for the state team tournament, East Carolina was unable to compete as a team (Robey, 1976, October 12).

After the 1976 season, women's golf was discontinued at East Carolina until 1981, when Athletic Director Ken Karr announced the program would begin again with the fall season (East Carolina University Sports Information, 1981). To date no women's golf team has yet to compete.

## Chapter 7

### Gymnastics

Intercollegiate gymnastics, one of the school's original seven sports for women, started out small at East Carolina. During the 1970-71 season the squad competed in only two meets, with a graduate assistant serving as the main coach. In the first meet the team captured second place. In the second event, the Furman Invitational Gymnastics Championship, participants Sharon Pullen and Cindy Wheeler won class B medals, while Annie Dorer, Joan Fulp, and Sandy Hart performed well in the higher class. The following year the team's schedule was expanded to six meets (Gibson, 1971).

The team greatly improved during the 1972-73 season, winning its first tri-meet against the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Western Carolina University. Competing were Fulp, Wheeler, Hart and Gail Phillips ("Girls Win Tri-Meet," 1972). An outgrowth of the popular gymnastics club team, the intercollegiate squad was led by assistant coach Julie Schilling, a 1972 ECU health and physical education graduate, under the supervision of Catherine Bolton, who served as a head coach and supervisor of women's athletics. Besides Fulp, Wheeler, Hart and Phillips, other strong team members included Sharon Pullen and Jane Smith (Trausneck, 1973).

In spring competition, ECU beat Appalachian State University 57.85 to 40.20 and won two additional tri-meets, bringing their regular season record to 7-0 ("Girls Win," 1973). At the NCAIAW state meet, Hart's best all-around performance of 22.26 led the team to a second-place finish behind host Western Carolina University. Her efforts were supported by Fulp and

Phillips' performances on the uneven bars and Smith's score on the balance beam ("EC Lady Gymnasts," 1973). In regional competition, the four women all finished among the top 10 in at least one event, leading ECU to another second-place finish and the best performance of the year ("Women Gymnasts, 1973).

Plagued by injuries in 1974, the gymnasts compiled a losing record during the regular season, but finished in second place behind Western Carolina at the NCAIAW state meet for the second straight year ("Lady Gymnasts Finish," 1974). At the regional level, East Carolina was ineligible for team awards after qualifying only five members for competition. In individual competition, Fulp placed fourth on the uneven parallel bars, Linda Lane placed eighth in vaulting exercises and Myrna Ocasia finished seventh on the balance beam ("Five Lady Gymnasts," 1974).

Steveda Chepko joined the women's athletic staff in 1975, and assumed coaching responsibilities for swimming, gymnastics, and golf. Her first year the gymnasts' team score improved 20 points over the previous year (East Carolina University Women's Athletics, 1976).

In 1976-77, the first year in which gymnastics records are available at ECU's Sports Information office, Chepko's team lacked both experience and depth. In fact, of the eight women involved, only one had any previous experience at the start of the year. In addition, injuries were a problem, as three people were hurt by the time East Carolina faced spring competition. The losing season ended when the Pirates hosted the NCAIAW state meet in March, finishing fourth out of five teams. ECU's Betsy Atkins placed eighth

in overall competition ("Women Gymnasts Lose," 1977).

The signing of two talented gymnasts gave Chepko hopes of a greatly improved team during the 1977-78 season. Susan McKnight of Greenville, NC and Mary Hubbard of Moorestown, NJ performed well for the team in early competition (Peele, 1977). Despite carrying a losing record into the state meet, where the Pirates finished fourth out of five teams, the two freshmen stars did well. Hubbard placed fifth in the all-around competition, fifth on the uneven bars and sixth on the floor exercise, while McKnight finished as a top-ten performer in the all-around competition. Only Hubbard qualified for the AIAW Division II regional meet, where she placed 13th in the all-around competition with a total score of 32.05 (East Carolina University Women's Gymnastics, unpublished raw data, 1978).

In 1978-79, the gymnastics team compiled a 4-6 record in regular season match-ups and were led by McKnight, Elizabeth Jackson and Phyllis Nelson (East Carolina University Women's Gymnastics, unpublished raw data, 1979). ECU finished fifth out of five teams at the NCAIAW state championship in Durham, NC, with McKnight and Jackson qualifying for regional competition at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, VA. In that all-around competition, McKnight placed 45th and Jackson 50th in a field of 58 women (East Carolina University Women's Gymnastics, 1979).

Coaching duties changed hands in 1979 when Jon Rose took over as the head coach of Pirate gymnastics. Rose came to ECU after serving as head gymnastics coach for the men's and women's teams at Southeast Missouri State University for three years. In Rose's first year, the team logged a 4-5

record in early competition, but went on to finish the season at 11-16. In the NCAIAW state championship, standout Jackson placed sixth on the balance beam (East Carolina University Gymnastics, 1980-81). At the AIAW Region II championships, held at Radford University in Radford, VA, the team earned a fifth-place finish with a score of 119.8, a school record. Performer Cindy Rogers placed seventh on the uneven bars, also a school record, and seventh on the balance beam. McKnight garnered a sixth-place finish in the floor exercise, while Kim Lowe vaulted into seventh place (Chandler, 1980).

“We performed very well,” Rose said of the competition. “I think we have set the foundation this season of a rising program. Our accomplishments this season have gone beyond my expectations,” (Chandler, 1980).

Unfortunately, the foundation set by the 1979-80 team was not enough to maintain gymnastics at East Carolina for future success. After posting a 6-11 regular season record, the 1980-81 squad was poised to host the NCAIAW state tournament (“ECU Gymnasts,” 1981) when Athletic Director Ken Karr announced February 26, 1981 that gymnastics was being dropped from the ECU lineup.

“We are restructuring our athletic offerings for next year to more adequately serve the athletic needs and interests of prospective East Carolina University athletes,” Dr. Karr said. “It is our intent to offer 17 sports next year as we are this year, but the offerings will be different. Also, the new sports we are adding are more in line with possible future conference alignment thoughts,” (East Carolina University Sports Information, 1981).

although we know that the risk in women's gymnastics is certainly no greater than football or any other sport," (J. Rose, personal communication, March 24, 1997).

After gymnastics ended as an intercollegiate sport, Rose continued teaching gymnastics at East Carolina and was later offered the position of diving coach by swimming coach Ray Scharf. Sixteen years later, he still holds both positions ((J. Rose, personal communication, March 24, 1997).

Ironically, the end of women's gymnastics at East Carolina, along with men's wrestling and women's field hockey, did not make way for the three new sports which were to start in the fall of 1981. Five years passed before men's and women's cross country were fielded at ECU. In the sixteen years since, a women's golf program has never been reinstated.



## Chapter 8

### Soccer

Soccer, the latest addition to the women's sports line-up at East Carolina University, began in September 1994 with a season opener against fourth-ranked George Mason University. During the first year the squad, which was elevated from club status to a Division I team, played 17 games, six of which were against Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) opponents (East Carolina University Women's Soccer, 1994). Head Coach Scooty Carey, then in his fourth season as coach of the men's soccer team, and Assistant Coach Colette Gilligan, a three-time soccer All-American, led the Pirates to a 2-15 year, including a 1-5 record in CAA play. Midfielder Robyn DePasquale was named to the second team All-CAA squad, the first-ever such award for a women's soccer player at ECU (East Carolina University Women's Soccer, 1995).

In 1995 the team record improved to 3-17 under new head coach Neil Roberts. The team, led by Heather Good and Renee Larson with one goal apiece, defeated Liberty 2-1 during the fifth game of the season. After a stretch of eight losses, Good, Larson, and Kristen Thor each scored to give the Pirates a 3-0 victory against Mt. Olive College. The third win of the season came during a home game against Jacksonville University. Two goals from Thor, two from junior Heather Lindsey, and one apiece from Stephanie Dressel and Becky Tiesler combined for a 6-0 Pirate romp of defenseless Jacksonville. Despite a first round loss in the CAA tournament to William & Mary, senior defender Maureen Corcoran became the second ECU player named to the

second team All-CAA squad (East Carolina University Women's Soccer, 1996).

The third year of competition proved to be the best yet for the Pirates. Roberts' 1996 team tallied seven wins, including one against CAA conference foe UNC Wilmington. The overall record was 7-11-1 during regular season play, including a first-ever tie against Appalachian State University. Leading the way were junior midfielder Stacie Gause and freshman forward Karen Blake, who both scored seven goals during the year (Bartels, 1996).

"Other than one year, I've had my hands on everything that has been involved in women's soccer since its inception here, which is exciting, and at the same time very challenging. It is a really good situation for me," Roberts said. "We're excited about the future, there's no question about it. The future is bright and it is certainly an exciting time for an athlete to be involved. The freshmen who came in this year in four years are going to look back and know they were part of a major construction of a good program," (Neil Roberts, personal communication, March 18, 1997).

## Chapter 9

### Softball

The spring of 1978 meant new things for women's athletics at East Carolina; namely, the beginning of intercollegiate softball. The slow-pitch team was led by Alita Dillon, who was hired as the women's volleyball coach in 1977. Starting in 1978 she coached both teams (East Carolina University Softball, 1979).

The first year, 40 women practiced several weeks beginning in November before half were cut to comprise a final roster of 20. The selected team then completed seven weeks of weight conditioning and preparation for the season opener. The work paid off. East Carolina won the opening doubleheader against North Carolina Central University, 10-4, 16-6 (Merriam, 1978). The team went on to finish 19-13 in the first year of play (East Carolina University Softball, 1979).

In 1979 the team posted a similar record, 18-14, including a six game winning streak toward the end of the season (East Carolina University Softball, 1981). Freshman centerfielder Shirley Brown led the Pirates with a batting average of .386 in regular season play (DuPree, 1979, April 26).

Dillon's third year at the helm was the best yet for the Pirates, who completed a 29-4 regular season and went on to capture both the state Division I crown and the AIAW Regional Tournament championship. The final record was 37-5, making the team at that time the winningest team in the history of East Carolina athletics, both male and female (East Carolina University Softball, 1981).

The 1981 season, Dillon's last as head coach, brought even more success to the young softball program. Led by Kathy Riley, Cynthia Shepard and Ginger Rothermel, all of whom were selected to the 1981 AIAW National Tournament Team, the Pirates stormed to a 44-8 record, setting 12 single-season records along the way. Once again the wins were the most ever for an East Carolina varsity team, male or female. Despite a third-place finish in the national tournament, East Carolina earned the number one spot nationally in the final Women's Collegiate Sports Ranking. Senior leftfielder Riley received the Broderick Award as the most outstanding slow-pitch softball player in the nation (East Carolina University Women's Softball, 1982).

The winning percentage of Dillon's last two teams at ECU, .846 in 1981 and .880 in 1980, have never been broken (East Carolina University Softball, 1997).

The 1982 season marked the beginning of an era in women's softball which lasted 15 years. Following Dillon as head coach was Richmond, VA. native Sue Manahan. A graduate of Longwood College, Manahan was an all-state basketball player and was named to the Women's Softball Association All-America team for her outstanding play in the national tournament. As a high school coach prior to her move to ECU, she won four district championships, one regional championship and one state championship (East Carolina University Softball, 1982).

Manahan's early teams continued the success started by Dillon, with the 1982 squad finishing the year at 42-14, a winning percentage of .750. The team also placed fourth in the AIAW national championships. Three key

contributors were pitcher Jeannette Roth and All-Americans Mitzi Davis and Shepard (East Carolina University Softball, 1983). In addition, Shepard became the second Pirate to receive the Broderick Award (East Carolina University Softball, 1989). The 1983 squad ended their year with an impressive 31-10 record, tallying a .756 winning percentage, the highest ever achieved by a Manahan team (East Carolina University Softball, 1997).

In 1984, a new honor was bestowed on the softball team. Stacy Boyette, star pitcher for the Pirates, was named ECU's first-ever Academic All-American. While compiling a 12-2 record on the mound, Boyette also posted a 4.0 grade point average and was named the school's top chemistry student for the 1983-84 school year ("ECU and Summertime," 1984). The team went on to post a 25-15 season record during their first year of fast-pitch play. Under Manahan's leadership, ECU became the first college program in the state to offer fast-pitch softball, even though all the state high schools still offered slow-pitch softball as the only option (East Carolina University Softball, 1989).

The 1985 team, led by senior Boyette, ended the year with 24-17-1 record, including the first-ever tie game in ECU softball history. In 1986 the record improved to 30-18-0, a winning percentage of .625 (East Carolina University Softball, 1997).

With only two seniors returning to the team, inexperience was a factor in 1987. As a result, the women won 25 games, dropped 17 and tied one, giving Manahan a winning percentage of .581. The next year, with 10 starters returning, Manahan's crew bettered the percentage to .625 and finished with a

25-14-1 record. In 1989, however, for the first time in the history of the program, the Pirates posted a losing record of 18-20. The .474 percentage was the only time during Manahan's tenure that the softball team did not earn better than a .500 mark (East Carolina University Softball, 1997).

The 1990s proved to be more successful for Manahan and her teams, however. The main reason for the upswing was Maryland native Jenny Parsons, a four-year letterwinning pitcher for ECU. Between 1990 and 1993, Parsons pitched in 157 games, started in 151, and completed 121, all ECU records. In her four years she posted 102 victories, had 402 strikeouts, 34 shutouts, and pitched a total of 968.9 innings. Again, all of these were ECU softball records. In addition, Parsons led the NCAA in wins with 38 in 1992, and held the second-highest number of wins, 32, during the 1993 season. During the Parsons era, Pirate softball teams posted records of 27-13 (.675) in 1990, 25-17 (.595) in 1991, 42-16 (.724) in 1992 and 34-22 (.607) in 1993 (East Carolina University Softball, 1997).

In her remaining three years as coach, Manahan's teams continued their success. In 1994 the team garnered 40 wins and 24 losses. The record improved in 1995 to 42-22, and her final year saw the Pirates go 40-21. Star players during those years included third base player Rhonda Rost, shortstop Sharolyn Strickland and pitcher Jami Bendle (East Carolina University Softball, 1997).

After Manahan resigned to pursue other interests in 1996, Richmond, VA native Tracey Kee, 29, an assistant coach under Manahan from 1991 to 1996, assumed head coaching duties for the Pirates. Kee, one of three sisters to

play softball at ECU, was a four-year letterwinner and starter on the softball team and received the Most Outstanding Defensive Player award in 1989. With four years as a player and six as an assistant coach under her belt, she brought both experience and dedication to the Pirate program. Joining Kee as an assistant coach in 1997 was former standout Parsons, who began her first year as assistant coach and her fourth as pitching coach for the team (East Carolina University Softball, 1997).

## Chapter 10

### Swimming and Diving

The first women's intercollegiate swimming and diving team at East Carolina started during the 1968-69 school year. Men's coach Ray Scharf served as the first coach of the team, which posted an impressive 7-0 record. After one more year, Scharf relinquished the program to concentrate on the men's team (East Carolina University Women's Athletics, 1977). This early success, however, was the blueprint upon which close to 30 years of excellence has been built.

Eric Orders, a former swimmer himself at ECU, coached the team after Scharf under the guidance of women's athletic coordinator Nell Stallings. Ironically, the early teams were led by Orders' wife, Terry Orders. During the 1970-71 season the team placed 21st in the nation in swimming, while Terry Orders placed sixth in the nation as a diver (Gibson, 1971).

Early standouts for the team in addition to Terry Orders were Barbara Strange, Sharon Atwell, Karen Maxwell and Cindy Wheeler ("Coeds Host," 1971). Other members included Linda Smiley, Lynn Totty, Kay White, Diane Freedman, Peggy Toth and Laura Harris. Of those, Wheeler, Freedman and Harris were strong diving performers ("Coed Swimmers," 1972).

Although entire records from the early years of swimming are not available, the spring schedule in 1973 resulted in several successful finishes. The women placed second in a meet against Appalachian State University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, ("Girls Finish," 1973), then beat St. Mary's College by a score of 65-41, with Smiley leading the effort



("Women Tankers Beat," 1973). In the first annual East Carolina Women's Swimming and Diving Championships, the women beat out Appalachian State University and Columbia College, but lost to powerhouse Florida State University ("Fla. State Edges," 1973).

The 1973-74 season was also a strong one for Orders' swimmers and divers. In the year's first event the Pirates blistered Appalachian State 105-19 ("Lady Swimmers Drop," 1973). After dropping a contest to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, the team went on to record 25 best times in 38 attempts against Duke University ("Lady Swimmers Spook," 1973). By the time national competition began in March, four swimmers and two divers qualified for the event ("Women to Nationals," 1974). Of those attending, diver Wheeler placed 20th out of 59 women in one-meter diving, and 36th out of 55 women in three-meter diving. ECU's Sue Bingham placed 32nd in the three-meter diving event. Smiley finished 46th in the 50-yard butterfly and 49th in the 100-yard butterfly event ("Wheeler Finishes," 1974).

In 1974, Orders bowed out as coach of the team and senior student Barbara Strange took his place. Strange, herself a swimmer the previous three years on the team, assumed assistant coaching duties mainly because there was no one else to do it. "If I hadn't been here this year, I doubt there would have been a team," she said. "They really need another staff member in the women's physical education department," ("Student Coaches," 1974).

At that time, women swimmers purchased their own swimsuits, goggles and bathing caps. The only equipment provided was kickboards ("Student Coaches," 1974).

“We have no advantages to offer any swimmer who wants to come here, no grants and no aid based on need or academics as is done at some schools. They come only out of the goodness of their heart,” Strange said. “We need a coach who is willing to fight for the things we need for a good swimming program. There is no one in the administration who cares about swimming. We need someone to put in a good word for us now and then,” (“Student Coaches,” 1974).

While the records during Strange’s short tenure aren’t complete, the Pirates placed second in the first meet of the year (“Women Swimmers,” 1974) and later won a dual meet against North Carolina State University and Meredith College (“Lady Swimmers Win,” 1974). In Strange’s final outing, the first-ever North Carolina Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (NCAIAW) Swimming and Diving Championships, ECU placed fifth out of six schools (Hughes, 1974 December 12).

Strange said no swimmers would be attending nationals that year because the North Carolina schools all swam before Christmas. “It is not a concern of North Carolina schools to go to the nationals,” she said. Since Strange coached her last meet in December, there was no coach to supervise the continued training of the swimmers, who would not attend national competition until March of the next year (“Student Coaches,” 1974).

In 1975, new athletic department hire Steveda Chepko assumed the role of coach for the swim team, along with her duties as golf and gymnastics coach. That year the first two swimming scholarships were awarded (East Carolina University Women’s Athletics, 1976). Chepko’s inaugural team

held a 1-2 record in early meets ("Women Drop Swim Meet," 1975), but the final regular season record is unknown. During NCAIAW state competition, the Pirates finished fifth out of seven schools in the team competition. Several individuals did well, however. Clare Albrittain placed at least sixth in five different events, Bev Osborn placed in the top 10 in three events and Jeanette Inmann placed in the top 10 in two events ("Albrittain Shines," 1975).

The 1976 team included 18 women, 13 of whom were freshmen or transfer students (Robey, 1976, October 7). After dropping the first meet, the team went on to win their next three contests of the year (Robey, 1976, October 28). Although all remaining regular season results are not available, the team did lose a late-season contest to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill before attending the NCAIAW state championship (Robey, 1976, November 16). At the state meet, Chepko's final outing as head coach, the team placed a disappointing fifth in a field of 10 schools. The best individual performance was a third-place finish by diver Cathy Callahan on the three-meter board ("Women Tankers End Up," 1976).

Men's swimming and diving coach Ray Scharf, in his 11th year, took over the women's program from Chepko in 1977. That season is the first for which complete records are available on swimming and diving from the Sports Information office at East Carolina University.

"Taking over the women's swim team will be a challenge for me. When I first came to East Carolina, I had the program. Over the years, it became difficult to effectively operate two programs, so I concentrated on the

men," Scharf said. "This year, I intend to make the women's swim team a respectable one. They are going to work hard, with the intention of building a program comparable to the men's," (East Carolina University Pirate Swimming, 1977-1978).

Those words were an omen of what was to come for women's intercollegiate swimming and diving at East Carolina University.

During the next five years, Scharf's women accomplished more than any other women's swimming and diving teams had in the history of the program. His first year back, the women compiled an 0-6 record, but the next year their efforts improved to 3-4. In 1979-1980, the team improved again, posting a 4-5 record, and in 1980-1981 the team record jumped to 6-3. In Scharf's last year, the women finished the year 5-4 (East Carolina University Swimming, 1982-1983). But despite having only 18 wins compared to 22 losses, the program improved greatly with Scharf at the helm. In those five short years he coached 24 women's All-Americans, led the 1981 team to a 16th-place national finish, and led the 1982 team to a 17th-place national ranking (East Carolina University Swimming, 1982-1983).

When Scharf stepped down in March of 1982, the natural choice for his replacement was Rick Kobe, an excellent recruiter who spent two years as Scharf's assistant coach. In addition to Kobe, Jon Rose, the former women's gymnastics coach who was named the diving coach in 1981, remained as an assistant coach and still holds that position 16 years later (East Carolina University Swimming, 1996-1997).

In the last 15 years, to say Kobe's teams have excelled beyond

expectation is an understatement, and to list all standout performers would be impossible. In short, Kobe has brought a level of success to Pirate swimming unlike any in the program's history.

The women's overall record under Kobe is 119-45, a .725 winning percentage. With his guidance the women have seen just one losing season in his entire head coaching career. Between 1985-86 and 1988-89, the women earned two second, one third, and one fourth-place finish in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA), respectively. The 1989-1990 team finished fifth in the CAA, while the 1990-1991 team finished seventh. Other honors include a third-place CAA finish in 1992-93, a second-place CAA finish in 1993-94, and first-place CAA finishes in both 1994-95 and 1995-96 (East Carolina University Swimming, 1996-1997).

For Kobe, who was named CAA Coach-of-the-Year in 1988, 1989, 1994, and 1995 (East Carolina University Swimming, 1996-1997), strong recruiting, academic excellence and winning seasons have become almost expected of his teams. His coaching philosophy of setting goals and working hard to meet them has made him one of the best, most consistent coaches in the country.

Kobe said a key to the wins is the consistency of coaches over the years.

"There hasn't been a lot of turnover. Swimming, more than any other sport, year in and year out, has been probably the most successful athletic team on campus," he said. "We've always had winning seasons and our winning percentage is high. So it is really a pretty rich and successful tradition," (R Kobe, personal communication, April 2, 1997).

Kobe's statistics don't lie. A look at the record book speaks for itself.

## Chapter 11

### Tennis

Most current records on the history of women's tennis at East Carolina date back only to the 1976 season, but the program was actually one of the seven original women sports started during the 1969-70 school year. In the beginning the tennis team, like so many other early women's intercollegiate sports at East Carolina, was coached by Catherine Bolton (C. Bolton, personal communication, February 25, 1997).

Only two newspaper articles were found which provide information about the team's first three years. The 1971 season ended with the women posting a 3-3 record, including two wins over strong rivals Meredith College and Atlantic Christian College. Standouts that year were Martha Stancil, Susan Bussey and Charlotte Metz, all of whom returned to play the following year. Reserve players were Joette Abeyounis, Darlene Morris and Joan Rupert (Gibson, 1971).

The season record in 1971-72 improved to 4-1 over the previous year with the leadership of Bussey and Ellen Warren, the number one and number two players (Thompkins, 1973, September 25). The team captured wins over Atlantic Christian College by a 6-3 margin and Campbell University. In the Atlantic Christian College match, singles winners included future coach Cynthia Averett. During a mid-season 5-4 loss to Duke University, Warren fought back from an 0-5 deficit in the final set to win her match ("Women Wallop," 1972). Warren would also later serve as coach for the team.

Coached by Carol Reeves, a physical education graduate assistant, the 1973-74 squad started the year off with a 6-3 victory over St. Mary's College ("Lobbers Dump," 1973), and the wins kept coming. Led again by Bussey and Warren, with the help of strong players Genny Deese and Averett, the team coasted to a fall-spring undefeated record of 12-0 (Hughes, 1974, October 3). In state tournament play, East Carolina finished fifth out of 15 teams ("Lady Netters Defeat," 1974).

In 1974, Anne Sayetta assumed coaching duties for the squad, which continued its success that year with returning players Averett, Warren, Ann Archer and Ann Chavasse (Hughes, 1974, October 8). Going into their final fall match with Peace College, the women were 8-2 for the season ("Tennis," 1974).

Not much is known about women's tennis from the fall of 1975, except that former standout Ellen Warren assumed coaching duties that year (East Carolina University Women's Athletics, 1976). Her team managed a 3-4 record in fall play ("Women's Teams Close," 1975). In the first month of spring play the team held a 2-1 record ("Women Netters Take," 1976).

Warren continued to coach in 1976, and her team posted a 10-3 record that year (East Carolina University Sports Information, 1997). Leading the charge was number-one seed Dorcas Sunkel of Maryland (Hickman, 1976, September 21).

In the spring of 1977, new coach Cynthia Averett, another successful tennis alumni, announced the the first-ever grants-in-aid for women's tennis at ECU. Debra Ann Spinazzola of Pennsylvania and Diane Keough of

Virginia were the recipients. Before coming to East Carolina University, Keough played competitively at another school. While enrolled at Chowan Junior College, she was the star of the men's tennis team, where she tallied a 10-2 record against the men from opposing junior colleges ("Women Netters Signed," 1977).

Averett's teams, however, did not enjoy the success of earlier women's squads. During her two seasons, the Lady Pirates finished 6-8 and 1-5 (East Carolina University Sports Information Record Book, 1997). Averett left East Carolina to coach women's tennis at Rice University in Houston, Texas in 1978. Upon announcing her resignation, Averett said ECU did not provide the money or tools needed to develop a strong women's team ("Averett Leaves," 1978).

Following Averett was Barbara Olschner, whose teams earned 5-12 and 2-8 records during the 1979 and 1980 seasons (East Carolina University Sports Information Record Book, 1997). Since her teams weren't stellar, Olschner was probably best known for the stir she created upon resigning her post in April of 1980 (Williams, 1980).

In a letter to Athletic Director Bill Cain, which was later publicized in the ECU school newspaper, Olschner said she was leaving her post "due to low wages and frustrating working conditions," (Williams, 1980). She claimed the program had no real goals to strive for, lacked definition, and was not given the attention it deserved from the athletic department. She added that the \$9,000 women's budget, which included her salary, was not enough to build a strong tennis program. Olschner suggested the athletic department combine the men's and women's tennis programs under one coach and raise the budget to \$20,000, not including salary (Williams, 1980).



In 1981, Caroline Brown became the women's coach and the team ended the season 5-4 (East Carolina University Sports Information, 1997). One year later she coached both the men's and women's teams successfully. The women finished with a third-place state ranking while the men posted an impressive 15-4 record. A few months later Brown resigned her post to become the head women's tennis coach at Davidson College near Charlotte, NC (Pleasants, 1982, June 9).

Dr. Patricia Sherman, a 41-year-old Minnesota native, was named head coach of the men's and women's tennis program in 1982 ("Sherman Named," 1982). That year the top returning player for the Lady Pirates was Katherine Tolson, the first female tennis player from ECU to ever reach the regionals in national competition (Pleasants, 1982, September 2).

In her six years as coach, Sherman's women's teams held their own against some tough opponents. The women played both a fall and spring schedule, but since tennis is considered a spring sport, only the spring results become the official season records listed by the ECU Sports Information office. As such, Sherman's early squads posted four consecutive losing seasons with a 6-7 record in 1983, a 1-10 record in 1984, a 4-7 record in 1985, and 4-9 record in 1986 (East Carolina University Sports Information 1997). The 1987 season improved, however. With the leadership of players Amy Ziemer, Kim Bergen and Maria Swaim, the team earned an 11-5 mark (Chandler, 1987). In 1988, Sherman's final year as coach, the women's record was 6-5 (East Carolina University Sports Information, 1997).

Following Sherman as head of ECU's tennis program was Dr. Bill

Moore, a former Pfeiffer College standout and head coach at East Stroudsburg University in Pennsylvania ("Tennis and Volleyball," 1988). In his first six years as coach, Moore's women's teams had winning seasons three times. In 1989 the season record was 3-7, but play improved in 1990 with a 9-6 mark. Another winning year followed in 1991, when the Pirates posted an 8-6 record. After falling to 5-8 in 1992, the team posted a 7-7 record in 1993 and finished sixth in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA). In 1994 the team went 9-7 for the year and ended the season with a fifth-place CAA finish (East Carolina University Sports Information, 1997).

But it was the 1995 team which won the most accolades for Moore. In that year, the lady netters started the season 9-0, and ended the year with a record of 16 wins and six losses. Freshman Rachel Cohen broke three team records while compiling a record 17 season wins. Other standouts included Hollyn Gordon and Elke Garten, who finished her tennis career at ECU with a 38-24 record (East Carolina University Tennis, 1996).

To Moore, however, compiling new records and winning seasons isn't the most important part of playing tennis at ECU, nor is publicity for his program. "I really don't care about that," he said. "That's not why I do what I do, and I could care less if anybody's name gets in the paper or if anybody knows what ... we do, I could care less. I'm not into coaching for that stuff," (B. Moore, personal communication, April 1, 1997).

What is important to Moore is that his players follow the six core principles which make up the fundamental reasons for the existence of the tennis program at ECU. Those are to, "work hard, yet have fun; emphasize

continual self improvement of each team member; provide shared experiences that are both positive and challenging; gain self understanding through commitment to disciplined training and competition; emphasize excellence as a daily process, not an end product; and recruit quality people, not just quality players," (East Carolina University Tennis, 1996).

## Chapter 12

### Track and Field

The first track team was established at East Carolina in the fall of 1975 under the direction of new coach Laurie Arrants, who was also leading the field hockey and junior varsity basketball teams (East Carolina University Women's Athletics, 1976). With competition beginning in the spring, the biggest obstacle to overcome in the first year was finding a school to compete against. That year East Carolina was the only school in North Carolina with a women's program, which meant the team had to travel to other areas for meets (Evans, 1976, April 29).

Arrants led the team for six years, and by 1977 was the only full-time women's track coach in North Carolina. During the 1975-76 and 1976-77 seasons the team did not lose a dual meet and went on to claim several first-place meet titles (East Carolina University Women's Athletics, 1977). The first indoor meet ever for the Pirates, which was a non-scored team event, was held in Chapel Hill, NC, in January of 1977 (Wheeler, 1977, January 18).

In 1977-78, led by standouts Debbie Freeman, Maria Gudjohnsen, Linda Mason and Cookie McPhatter, the women captured several first-place finishes, including the NCAIAW state championship (East Carolina Women's Track, 1978-79). The following year the team continued its success and claimed a second-place finish in the state championship meet. In 1979-80 and 1980-81 the Pirates finished fourth out of seven teams and fifth out of six teams in the state championship, respectively (East Carolina University

Sports Information Record Book, 1997).

Unfortunately, ECU Sports Information office records are scarce for the track and field team during the 1980s, a decade which saw many coaching changes for the women. During the two years following Arrants departure from ECU, Pennsylvania native Pat McGuigan assumed head coaching duties of the team. The 1982-83 year was notable as the first in which the women began competing in field events (East Carolina University Women's Track, 1982-83). McGuigan resigned from her position in June of 1983 to pursue a doctoral degree from the University of Maryland ("McGuigan Resigns," 1983).

The 1983-84 season was a year of rebuilding for the Pirates. After rumors circulated that McGuigan was becoming too involved in her players' personal lives, Bill Carson, a 17-year veteran coach of the men's track team, was named head coach of the women's squad for one year. Little is known about that team, which returned only five women despite having 14 who were eligible to compete (Mews, 1983).

Following Carson as head coach was Wayne Miller, a Mount Olive, NC native who had served two years as an assistant coach for Carson's men's teams. Miller, who had been named a track All-American during his days at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, had a very young, inexperienced team to work with in the beginning (East Carolina University Women's Track, 1985).

"With the size of the team and the fact that we are almost starting from scratch, we must realize how we can be most effective," Miller said. "We will concentrate on the sprints and relays and gear ourselves for the outdoor

season. To be successful is going to require 100 percent effort from our athletes, and I feel like they have the ability and attitude to be competitive,” (East Carolina University Women’s Track, 1985). There wasn’t a single upperclassman on Miller’s team during his first two years as a head coach (East Carolina University Women’s Track, 1986).

For the remainder of the 1980s, Miller’s teams continued to improve with the help of performers like Sonya Baldwin, who broke the school record in the 100 meters and set another record as a member of the 400 meter relay team. She later worked two years as the graduate assistant coach of the team under Miller. Other record holders during Miller’s tenure included Vanessa Smith in the 400 meters, and cross country star Ann Marie Welch in the 3,000 and 10,000 meters (East Carolina University Women’s Track, 1990).

Another transition occurred during the 1991 season, when Carol Slowik became the head coach of women’s track and field. Although she stayed in the position just one year, it was her assistant coach at that time who went on to make an impact as an ECU coach (East Carolina University Women’s Track, 1991).

Charles Justice, who began his first year with the team under Slowik, was named head coach of the women’s program the next year and has continued coaching for the last six years. With his leadership, the teams have made progress. In 1992 and 1993, the Pirates finished fourth in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA), and improved that mark to a second-place finish in 1994, 1995 and 1996. Danita Roseboro, who was a CAA champion in two events in 1992 and set a CAA meet record in the 200 meters in 1993, was the

first true standout of Justice's tenure (East Carolina University Women's Track, 1996).

Since then, however, the honors have kept coming. In 1994 Dava Rhodes, also a cross country team star, won the CAA championship in the 5,000 meters and received All-American honors. Long jumper Amanda Johnson placed 15th in the long jump at the NCAA Indoor Championships in 1995, and in 1996 Suzanne Bellamy was named Rookie-of-the-Year in cross country. In addition to those awards, Justice was also honored in 1996 as the CAA Coach-of-the-Year (East Carolina University Women's Track, 1997).

## Chapter 13

### Volleyball

Like several other women's sports at East Carolina University, volleyball got its intercollegiate start in 1969. The first teams were coached by Catherine Bolton, who also served as the coach for basketball, field hockey, golf, gymnastics and tennis (Hickman, 1977).

Records from the Bolton era, which lasted until 1977, are few. However, several newspaper articles fill in some details about the earliest volleyball seasons at East Carolina.

In 1970, the team finished the regular season undefeated, but lost two games and was eliminated from post-season tournament play (Gibson, 1971).

The 1973 team was also rather successful; the women started that year with a 5-1 record (Tompkins, 1973, October 18). In later play, the team hosted the AIAW Region II volleyball tournament in Minges Coliseum, and ended the year with a win over state champion Western Carolina University and two losses against Madison College and the University of Tennessee. Players at that time included Sheilah Cotten, Sue Calverley, Cookie Egan, Jan Claiborne and Lu Ann Swain ("Winthrop Captures," 1973).

The season started poorly for the Pirates in 1974, when the team dropped the first four matches of the year against Elon College and the University of North Carolina at Greensboro ("Women's Volleyball Winless," 1974). In mid-October the team took two wins over Chowan College with the help of spiker Calverley ("Volleyball Wins," 1974), and at the end of the month the women won three of five matches in the annual invitational at



Appalachian State University ("Spikers Do Well," 1974). In the third annual state volleyball tournament in November, ECU managed a win over Catawba College, but fell to Elon College and Wake Forest University. Both Debbie Freeman and Charlotte Layton contributed strong performances in tournament play ("Volleyball," 1974).

In 1975, Bolton's team carried a 5-4 record early on ("Spikers Split Pair," 1975), but closed out the season at 7-13 after losing two games in the NCAIAW state tournament ("Women's Teams Close," 1975).

Boosted by the help of all-around strong player Gale Kerbaugh, the Pirates in 1976 posted an 8-12 record going into the NCAIAW state tournament ("NCAIAW Next," 1976). This was Bolton's last year as coach of the volleyball team.

Alita Dillon, the first women's softball coach at East Carolina, was also the next volleyball coach at the school. She arrived in 1977, the first year in which complete records on women's volleyball are available from the ECU Sports Information Department. During her four-year stay, the volleyball team posted two winning seasons and two losing seasons, leaving Dillon with an overall record of 72-71. In 1977, led by All-State honoree Debbie Freeman, the Pirates earned a 13-11 record, and in 1978 they posted 23 wins to 12 losses (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1996). As host of the NCAIAW state championship that year, Dillon's team lost to North Carolina State University and Wake Forest University (DuPree, 1978, November 16).

In 1979, the record dropped to 20-22, and fell again in 1980 to 16-26. Player Sharon Perry was named NCAIAW All-State at the end of the 1980

season (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1996).

After serving as an assistant coach under Dillon, Lynn Davidson entered her first year as the head volleyball coach in 1981 (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1981). That year her team won 11 games and lost 23, but garnered a second-place finish at the East Carolina Invitational (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1982). During her second and final year as head coach, Davidson's team finished with a winning 26-15 record, bringing her overall record at ECU to 34-38 (East Carolina University Women's Volleyball, 1996).

Upon leaving, Davidson said a desire to further her educational goals and earn more money prompted her resignation (Pleasants, 1983, January 1).

"I can't afford to work here anymore," she said. Davidson's volleyball salary was \$3,000 per year, and her salary as assistant coach of the softball team was \$1,500 a year. When she resigned she was working three jobs to make ends meet. "All of the women coaches here are part-time, except for women's basketball. There are coaches in the same situation who can't financially afford to work just here ... I really think that the center people in the administration need to get their priorities straightened out. They give so much priority to the top sports," (Pleasants, 1983, January 1).

Following Davidson as head coach was Imogene Turner, a 1963 graduate of East Carolina who was a two-sport star at the school during the early 1960's (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1985). During Turner's tenure, the Lady Pirates endured the worst slump in the history of women's volleyball at ECU. From 1983 until 1987, the teams posted 4-23, 3-24, 10-19, 8-

17, and 9-19 records, respectively. Turner's total record as a coach was a dismal 34 wins and 102 losses (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1996).

Washington, D.C., native Judy Kirkpatrick, who spent seven years as the head volleyball coach at West Georgia College, joined the ECU athletic staff in 1988. She stayed in Greenville just two seasons. The first year, her team only posted a 7-19 mark but standout Jemma Holley was named to the All-CAA second team (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1989). In her final year, Kirkpatrick coached the women to a 16-15 record. Holley was awarded first-team All-CAA honors, while Michelle McIntosh earned second-team All-CAA recognition (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1990).

The transitions continued in 1990 when Martha McCaskill left her job as volleyball coach at nearby D.H. Conley High School to become the coach of the Pirates (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1990). Like Dillon before her, McCaskill led the program just four years, compiling a total record of 50-82 along the way. Year-by-year, McCaskill's teams went 13-19, 13-19, 13-20 and 11-24. Player Rhonda Jackson earned second-team All-CAA honors in 1990 and 1991, Wendy Schultz received All-CAA honors in 1992, and Staci Winters was named to the second-team All-CAA squad in 1993 (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1996).

In 1994, the only year Gail Guttenberg held the head coaching position, the volleyball team won 16 games and lost 17. For the second straight year, Winters received second-team All-CAA honors (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1996).

In 1995, for the eighth time in 26 years, a new women's volleyball coach

made her way to East Carolina University. In her first year Kim Walker led the team to a 19-18 season record, the first winning season for the Pirates since 1989 (East Carolina University Volleyball, 1996).

For Walker, making the volleyball program more successful will begin with consistency.

“You have to have consistency in coaches first to build some type of consistency in a program,” she said. “My goal is to be at the top of the conference every year. My goal is to win it every year so we can go to the NCAA tournament and compete there. I would like to see this program, and I think it has the potential, to be a pretty good upper mid-level Division I program,” (K. Walker, personal communication, March 18, 1997).

## Chapter 14

### Women in the Hall of Fame

In 1974, East Carolina University established the Athletics Hall of Fame to honor individuals who, through direct participation in the school's intercollegiate athletics program, have brought outstanding recognition to themselves and ECU. The first woman inducted was Sheilah Cotten in 1981; in the years since seven other women have followed suit (East Carolina University Football Media Guide, 1996).

The following is a complete list of the women and their accomplishments as published in the 1996 East Carolina University Football Media Guide.

Cotten finished her basketball career at ECU with 1,270 points and was the first 1,000-point scorer in school history. She led the 1973 team to the school's only AIAW state championship and also to the AIAW national tournament.

In 1989, Kathy Postlewait, a standout volleyball, field hockey and golf team member at ECU, was honored. Today she is one of the leading players on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour.

Rosie Thompson, ECU's top women's basketball scorer and rebounder, earned Hall of Fame honors in 1990. Thompson served as assistant basketball coach for five years and head basketball coach for three years.

In 1991 Debbie Freeman, a three-sport star at ECU, was voted into the Hall of Fame. During her career, Freeman was a standout on the school's basketball, track and volleyball teams.

Catherine Bolton, who established the foundation of women's athletics at East Carolina in 1969, was named to the Hall of Fame in 1992 for her contributions to the program and for serving as head coach of six of the seven

original sports during the early years of the women's program.

Mary Denkler, a basketball player during the 1980-83 years, was voted into the Hall of Fame in 1994. Denkler was East Carolina's first women's basketball All-American.

Leora "Sam" Jones, a 1993 Hall of Fame inductee, helped lead the Lady Pirates basketball team to back-to-back AIAW and NCAA tournament berths. Later, as a team handball player, Jones competed in three Olympic Games.

Kathy Riley, both a basketball and softball standout during her career, competed only two years at ECU. She was an honorable mention All-American in basketball and a member of the 1981 softball team that earned a 17th-place national ranking. Riley was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1995 (East Carolina University Football Media Guide, 1996).

## Chapter 15

### Conclusions and Findings

Upon review, it is obvious that the history of women's intercollegiate athletics at East Carolina included many successes and hundreds of dedicated women athletes. Since its inception the women's sports programs have also provided innumerable hours of entertainment for students, staff, faculty, friends, members of the Greenville, NC community and beyond.

Even so, the program has not existed without problems. Specifically, a lack of adequate funding for women's athletics during the 1970s hampered the school's ability to provide large scholarships for its women. As the nature of women's athletics became more competitive, the lack of scholarship money and money used to recruit athletes limited the number of quality players the school could bring to its programs. In fact, it has only been since the early 1990s that East Carolina has created a firm, written commitment to providing scholarships and opportunities for women athletes that are equitable to the men's programs. As a result, several of the women's programs, especially volleyball, tennis, and track, have seen a large amount of turnover among coaches, many of whom cited a lack of money and dedication from the athletic department as the reasons for their departure.

It comes as no surprise that the two most consistently successful women's programs have not experienced this turnover. The women's softball team has had only three coaches during the 20-year history of the program, one of whom was just hired in the summer of 1996. After bouncing from coach to coach for the first eight years, the women's swimming and

diving team has only had two coaches since 1977. The record book for these sports proves that in order to have success over time, a program needs stability and consistency. Fortunately, with the hiring of Dr. Bill Moore as tennis coach, Charles Justice as track and field coach, Anne Donovan as basketball coach and Kim Walker as volleyball coach, it appears possible that East Carolina's remaining older sports will also see success over time.

As for the future of women's intercollegiate athletics at ECU, the outlook is bright. According to Athletic Director Mike Hamrick, the school's NCAA Division I Athletics Certification Self-Study Report includes a long-range plan to continually improve the offerings for women's athletics at ECU (M. Hamrick, personal communication, March 26, 1997).

"We've developed a gender equity plan that takes us into the next 10 years of what we plan to do with women's athletics," he said. "By the year 2004 to 2005, we hope scholarships in all our Olympic sports will be 90 percent fully funded. That means 90 percent of what is allowed by the NCAA," (M. Hamrick, personal communication, March 26, 1997). Olympic sports are defined as non-revenue sports, or all sports except for football and men's and women's basketball.

For example, Hamrick said during the 1991-1992 school year, ECU spent about \$159,000 on scholarships for women athletes. In 1996-97, that amount increased to \$700,000 (M. Hamrick, personal communication, March 26, 1997).

Other improvements in the gender equity plan to be implemented by 2001 include the following. Increases in the recruiting budget for women's softball of \$1,000, increases in the volleyball budget of \$1,500, increases in the



women's basketball recruiting or travel budget by \$8,000, providing private locker facilities for the cross country, track, tennis, soccer and softball teams, and providing two additional courtesy cars for the women's coaching staff. The plan also includes making several coaches full-time employees as opposed to part-time, and making several assistant coaches full-time employees with teaching duties. Finally, the plan includes adding an additional sport to the women's offerings and providing additional office space for coaches (East Carolina University NCAA Division 1 Athletics Certification Self-Study Report, 1996).

### Findings

1. A lack of money during the early years of women's intercollegiate athletics at East Carolina hampered the overall development of the women's program, including the retention of quality coaches.
2. A lack of money for scholarships and recruiting in the first 20 years of the women's program affected the quality of athletes recruited to ECU, which resulted in decreased competitiveness and mediocre performances by many of the school's teams.
3. A lack of interest and administrative support for women's sports during their initial years of development prevented the rapid growth and success of the program.
4. The lack of interest and administrative support early on also prevented accurate record-keeping in women's athletics, and as a result many current and past sports do not have complete historical records of their development.

5. A new commitment to gender equity and adopted 10-year plan for women's athletics should improve the overall development and success of the program by 2015.

6. More work is needed to create better, more accurate records on the history of women's athletics at East Carolina University. The research encompassed in this volume is a start, but additional detailed research, including complete rosters, year-by-year results and interviews with team members, is needed for each sport in order to track where the program has been in the past and where it is going in the future.
