

A TALE OF TWO COMMUNITIES:
GRAVE MARKERS AS ILLUSTRATIONS OF MARGINALIZATION AND SELF-
DETERMINATION IN AFRICAN AMERICAN CEMETERIES IN EASTERN NORTH
CAROLINA

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ABSTRACT:

Burial practices have long been understood to vary both temporally and culturally. However, little research has been conducted using cemetery trends to compare contemporary historic African American cemeteries in different communities. Ayden and Princeville are two towns in Eastern North Carolina separated by only thirty-five miles and the Tar River. Despite the towns' proximity, their stories are vastly different. Ayden has been home to both white and African American individuals, often separated by social and economic divisions. Princeville was founded by previously enslaved African Americans who had flocked to the relative safety of a Union Army encampment and is the oldest continually occupied town in the United States founded by African Americans. Though they are similar in size today, both communities have historically existed in very different environments. This research, by comparing trends in gravemarker construction and design, shows how these patterns can represent unique aspects of communities that may otherwise be missed.

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CHAPTER 1: INTRODUCTION

People have often wondered if the dead can speak to the living. However, this question is most often left to the purview of the mystic and the psychic. While this thesis will not address nebulous questions of spirituality and eternal destination, it does rely on one of the most foundational beliefs of archaeology: That which is left behind can reveal truths about those who have gone before.

Historical Archaeology seeks to find and discuss that which has been left out of the accepted historical record. More often than not, these are the histories of the colonized and marginalized; those who have been prevented from telling their own stories (Little 2007:23). This search for the untold stories has led many archaeologists to study African American communities, historic sites, and burial grounds. It has long been accepted that burials and grave goods can reveal a lot about a culture or community (Binford 1971). When the study of African American communities is combined with the study of grave markers, it often takes the form of a comparative study of the differences between historically African American cemeteries and concurrent historically white cemeteries. While this can provide fascinating information and reveal valuable trends, it fails to recognize a crucial point; that African American culture is not monolithic. Studying the differences between historically African American and white cemeteries can shed light on many aspects of African American history, however that places the focus primarily on marginalization, rather than accounting for self-determination.

It cannot, and should not, be denied that every African American community experienced marginalization and even violence throughout the majority of the history of the United States. However, it is irresponsible to assume that every African American community shares an identical history or appears the same in the archaeological record. In order to highlight the

unique characteristics and histories of individual African American communities, they should be compared to each other, not just the local white community.

This thesis seeks to address that gap. To do so, this research focuses on two African American communities in Eastern North Carolina, Princeville and Ayden. These two towns are separated by only about 35 miles and the Tar River. They were incorporated within five years of each other and the African American communities in both towns remain approximately the same size, though Ayden is somewhat more populous (US Census Bureau 2022). However, the circumstances surrounding the founding and the subsequent histories of both towns are almost entirely different. Princeville is considered the oldest continually occupied town founded by African American individuals in the US and has remained almost entirely African American. Ayden was founded by a wealthy white landowner as a primarily agricultural town. The African American community in Ayden has always existed as a minority in a majority white town. Through the examination of the trends present in the cemeteries in each of these towns, this thesis seeks to show that, though the cemeteries in both African American communities may exhibit similar materials and forms, the trends of their usage are different and can point to unique aspects of each community.

Grave markers are inseparable from death and the individuals that they mark. In many respects, they are the last thing left that represents the life of the person buried beneath that marker. Studies of these markers and their ability to inform the archaeologist and historian on culture and belief have become commonplace in archaeological journals and at anthropological conferences. In the United States, this fascination with the study of grave markers can be traced back to the seminal work “Death’s Heads, Cherubs, and Willow Trees: Experimental Archaeology in Colonial Cemeteries” which connects the change in decoration on colonial

gravestones over time to the changing attitudes towards death (Dethlefsen and Deetz 1966). This work was continued in James Hijiya's examination of the same topic which broadened the research area, both spatially and temporally (Hijiya 1983). These two works laid the foundation for the classification of what has been called the American burial pattern. Other studies have attempted to uncover and describe the burial pattern of African Americans in the South. Often, this pattern is denoted by the use of vernacular grave markers and concrete slabs visible at ground level (Brown 2019; Little 1998). While none of these researchers claim that these patterns apply to every cemetery, they provide the groundwork for comparative studies including the research conducted for this thesis.

This study set out with one overarching research question and four hypotheses. The research question was whether or not there are discernible and significant differences between the patterns of grave marker form, material, decoration, and epitaph usage in the historically African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville. The hypothesis related to this question was that there would be differences observed that were statistically significant. It was also hypothesized that, as the use of concrete is considered a hallmark of the southern African American cemetery and is not often seen in historically other cemeteries, the cemeteries in Princeville would see a greater and longer lasting use of concrete. Additionally, it was hypothesized that Princeville would see a greater and longer lasting use of the slab as a marker form. Finally, it was hypothesized that, over time, the Ayden African American cemeteries would more closely resemble the historically white Ayden Town cemetery.

In order to accurately and clearly illustrate the results and meanings of this research, this thesis is divided into five primary chapters. The first covers the background history of African American individuals in North Carolina from the first days of the colony through the beginning

of the Civil Rights movement. This chapter also includes a specific history of the towns of Princeville and Ayden and a relatively brief history of cemeteries and cemetery studies in North Carolina and the southeastern United States. The next chapter explores the previous archaeological research completed in these two towns which leads to the following chapter that explains the methodology employed by the research for this thesis. The penultimate chapter covers the results of this research, presented as both portions of the total assemblage and as trends over time. The results are followed by the final chapter which includes both the analysis of the results and the discussion. As this research covers multiple variables, it was decided that combining these two sections would provide the clearest explanations and allow the significance of the results to be fully appreciated.

CHAPTER 2: HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

At first glance, the subject of African American grave markers might seem a somewhat straightforward and simple topic. The gravestones are marked with names and years and the monuments are made from (mostly) permanent materials. These factors should present a clear timeline, and any trends should be obvious. However, there are many factors that must be considered in order to understand the true meanings and histories that are present in these often-overlooked burial grounds. To understand historic African American cemeteries, several topics must first be explored. A cemetery is a physical representation of the community that created it. It is therefore impossible to understand a cemetery without understanding the history and culture of that community. It is furthermore impossible to understand a community without an understanding of the broader context and history in which that community exists. Therefore, it is necessary to begin this background with a short explanation of the history of African American individuals in North Carolina from enslavement through the beginning of the Civil Rights movement.

Other topics covered in this background include brief histories of Princeville and Ayden as well as a discussion of the town cemeteries, the history of the funeral industry and cemeteries in the United States, and the general history of grave markers present in white and African American cemeteries.

A Brief History of the African American population in North Carolina

The first enslaved Africans arrived in North Carolina as early as 1665 (Turner and Bridgers 1997:157). However, many of these first individuals were brought by colonists from other already established colonies, as the first direct trade route to North Carolina from West Africa was not documented until the early 1680s. Even once that trade had been established, the

state's lack of natural harbors and limited road system in the early 18th century limited North Carolina's ability to import enslaved Africans (Kay and Cary 1995:11). At the turn of the 18th century, it is estimated that there were between 800 and 1000 enslaved laborers in the state. By 1720, North Carolina boasted a robust plantation system based almost entirely on enslaved labor (Wood and Tise 2017:93). Although the population of Black (and white) individuals grew slowly at first, by 1767 the number of enslaved individuals had expanded to over 40,000 (Franklin 1995:8). As in much of the rest of the country, the movement and concentration of enslaved individuals followed agricultural trends. Due to the expansion of tobacco farming from Virginia into the Albemarle region and the adoption of rice plantations from South Carolina in the Lower Cape Fear, these two regions saw the largest populations of enslaved individuals in the state (Crow et al. 2002:3).

As previously stated, unlike other southern states, North Carolina relied primarily on overland transportation to import enslaved labor. While the number was likely understated, port records indicate that between the years 1755-1767, fewer than 800 enslaved individuals passed through North Carolina's ports. Even if that number is accurate, based on other sources, that still accounted for barely a quarter of the enslaved individuals who arrived in the state. Though researchers accept that most enslaved individuals came to what would later become the United States from West Africa, the lack of port records for North Carolina provides scant information about the origin of the individuals. Conversely, in states like South Carolina and Virginia, this importation information was much more thoroughly recorded and generally of greater importance to the slaveholder (Kay and Cary 1995:20-21).

The population of enslaved people in the western region of North Carolina was far smaller. In counties along the eastern Virginia border, like Halifax and Northampton, between

40% and 60% of households owned slaves while in counties closer to the center of North Carolina, like Orange and Anson, the percentage of slaveholding households was only 10% (Crow et al. 2002:3). In 1775, in the eastern counties of Craven, Chowan, Bertie, Onslow and Carteret, 37% of families owned slaves and, in Pitt County, that percentage was even higher at 42%. In these six counties, by the last quarter of the 18th century, African Americans comprised approximately one fourth of the total population (Watson 1978:556). Though the distribution of enslaved labor across the state was uneven, by 1790, 31% of all families in North Carolina owned slaves (Crow et al. 2002:3-11).

By the year 1800, the total population of North Carolina was 478,103. Of those, 133,296 were enslaved and 7,043 were free people of color (Milteer 2020:6). As the population of North Carolina's white citizenry increased, so too did the numbers of both enslaved and free African Americans. Throughout the time when slavery was legal, free African American individuals made up a relatively small portion of the total African American population. In 1790, there were 5,041 free African American individuals living in the state. While this number was much lower than in of Virginia or Maryland (12,866 and 8,045 respectively) it was much higher than that of the state's southern neighbor, South Carolina (1,801) (Franklin 1995:14). Although the percentage of white families who owned slaves fell slightly from 31% in 1790 to 27% in 1850 (Franklin 1995:9), enslaved individuals accounted for approximately one third of the state's entire population by the year 1860 (Padgett 1937:434). In 1860, the total population of North Carolina had reached 992,622, with 631,100 white individuals, 331,059 enslaved individuals, and 30,436 free people of color (Milteer 2020:6).

Throughout this period in North Carolina's history, the state legislature passed a series of laws, each of which further limited the rights and opportunities of North Carolina's free African

American citizenry. This was especially true in the period between the late 1820s and the Civil War (Wood and Tise 2017:97). In 1826, a law was passed prohibiting any free African American from entering the state (Boykin 1958:37). This law brought with it a \$500 fine imposed on any individual found guilty of transporting a free African American individual across the state's border. Only four counties opposed this, one of which was the Quaker stronghold of Randolph County (Franklin 1995:43). While in many cases, religion was used as a means to justify and maintain the institution of slavery (Hurmence 1984), the Quakers, or the Society of Friends, were an outspoken voice against the practice, going so far as to found the North Carolina Manumission Society which, at its height in the early 1830s, had 40 branches (Franklin 1995:25-43).

According to historian James Boykin, "the free [African American] seems to have lived a more precarious life than the skilled slave on the plantation because, in spite of his skills, his ability to get along in the world was greatly impaired both by his ignorance and the restrictions placed on his freedom by the law" (Boykin 1958:25–26). The "ignorance" of the free African American was ensured and exacerbated by still more legislation. Two laws were passed in 1831, one of which prohibited teaching any African American individual to read, and the other stating that any person who was freed within the state had to leave the state within 90 days (Wood and Tise 2017:98). Other laws included one in 1835 which prevented the teaching of writing, one in 1844 that prohibited any African American from being taught in public schools, and one in 1861 that prevented any African American from owning slaves of their own. Though uncommon, before the passage of that law, it was legal for a free African American individual in North Carolina to own slaves (Boykin 1958:25-49).

Though the vast majority of African American individuals in the state of North Carolina worked in an agricultural context both pre- and post- Emancipation, the greatest concentration of enslaved laborers worked in non-agricultural contexts like lumber production and naval stores (Kay and Cary 1995:43). Unlike the neighboring states of Virginia and South Carolina, North Carolina's geography did not support a single cash crop like rice or tobacco. Though the state still grew both of these products in increasing intensity, for the most part the state had a "more flexible and opportunistic plantation economy" (Wood and Tise 2017:91). Most of the crops grown in the state were seasonal by necessity, meaning that large numbers of enslaved laborers were only used for portions of the year. As such, many laborers would work in an agricultural context for part of the year and in a non-agricultural production context during the off season (Kay and Cary 1995:45).

The life and livelihood of an enslaved individual varied greatly according to where they lived and worked. Unlike in other states, specific records detailing the occupations of enslaved individuals on large plantations exist for only three locations in North Carolina between 1770 and 1809. However, from those records, and through the examples from neighboring states, it is clear that the majority, 90%, of enslaved laborers on plantations worked in the field or other agricultural pursuits (Kay and Cary 1995:32). All of the crops grown in North Carolina, particularly the two most popular, corn and cotton, were incredibly labor intensive and physically demanding of the enslaved laborers who grew them. While those who worked in a domestic setting may have been spared from the conditions in the field, they had to endure even less privacy than other enslaved individuals, as well as forced distance from their own communities (Crow et al. 2002:53-55)

Despite an often-purposeful separation of communities and destruction of cultural practices, many enslaved individuals were able to preserve some aspects of self-determination and cultural cohesion. As Kay and Cary stated in their text, the population of North Carolina had reached “the necessary critical mass of slaves and supporting demographic factors had unfolded that were preconditions for the effective transmission of African cultures among the slaves.” Despite their rudimentary dwelling spaces, many enslaved individuals and families were able to keep their own gardens. While this primarily existed to supplement the rations provided to them by the landowner, they were sometimes also able to sell the surplus to provide themselves with some source of income (Kay and Cary 1995:25-37). However, it is important to note that the cabins that survive to the modern day are outliers, much better constructed than those to which most enslaved individuals would have had access (Crow et al. 2002:56).

Neither the election of Abraham Lincoln in 1860 nor the Emancipation Proclamation three years later immediately changed the situation of African American individuals in the state of North Carolina. In fact, for many of North Carolina’s newly freed citizens, freedom did not actually occur until Federal troops arrived on their individual plantations (Crow et al. 2002:74). Even after freedom reached North Carolina, the general practice was to encourage former slaves to remain where they had been enslaved and continue working for the landowner, though this time for, albeit meager, wages (Mobley 1986:341). As could be expected, the majority of these individuals continued to work in an agricultural context. In 1890, 64.6% of the African American population worked either as farmers or, more often, agricultural laborers (Logan 1964:76). The cultivation and harvest of major crops that had been done by slave labor was replaced by share cropping, crop liens, and tenant farming (Biles 2007:159). However, it seems to have been the preference among the white employers to hire workers as wage laborers rather than tenant

farmers. In both cases, the African American laborers faced similar hurdles. These challenges included wage discrimination and payment in supplies rather than in currency (Logan 1964:76).

Between the years 1890 and 1940, though the percentages of both African American men and women who worked in agriculture dropped, the percentage of men stayed above 50%. In 1890, 72% of African American men and 50% of African American women worked in agriculture. By 1940, those percentages had fallen to 53% and 18% respectively. Many of those who left jobs in agriculture flocked to blossoming industrial centers like Tarboro for work in factories and other industrial contexts. No matter their occupation, African American individuals in North Carolina, especially prior to the Civil Rights movement of the 1960s, faced great hardships and challenges. A survey of houses conducted between 1930 and 1940 revealed that, while dwellings that were occupied by African Americans accounted for only 1/3 of all houses, 52.5% of all houses that were considered to be substandard were occupied by African Americans. This percentage rose as high as 74.6% in some cities (McConnell 1944:73, 177).

This discrepancy was even more pronounced in agricultural contexts. A Farm Housing Survey was published by the Department of Agriculture in 1939. For the purposes of the survey, areas of land that were less than 3 acres were not counted as farms, “unless its agricultural products in 1929 were valued at \$250 or more.” The condition of various aspects of the farm houses was rated either good, fair or poor (Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics 1939:42). 74.9% of all surveyed African American farm operators lived in dwellings classified as “unpainted frame buildings” compared to 52.5% of white farm operators. Every farmhouse on African American-operated farms was reported as having over-crowding, 53.3% were rated as having poor foundations, 46.6% as having poor floors, and 48.3% as having poor roofs. This is

especially telling as white-operated farmhouses did not surpass a 30% “poor” rating in any category (McConnell 1944:178).

From 1890-1940, there was a gradual movement among the general population of North Carolina from the rural to the urban (Logan 1964:90). Though that trend has continued, North Carolina retains much of its rural lands with roughly 23% of the state classed as farmland today (NCACC 2024; USCB 2020). As the number of African Americans working in agriculture fell, the proportion that worked in either industrial or domestic service industries rose. In 1890, 8.1% of employed African American men and 3.5% of women worked in manufacturing. In the same year, 13.9% of men and 46.1% of women worked in domestic service. By 1940, the percentage of those working in manufacturing had doubled and comprised 17.4% of employed African American men and 6.8% of women. In that same year 5.9% of men and 58% of women worked in domestic service (McConnell 1944:74).

After the Civil War, while many newly freed African American individuals did stay in North Carolina and put down permanent roots near where they had been raised, others left the state to try to make their fortunes elsewhere. The first mass exit of the “Exodusters” occurred in 1877 with several thousand African American individuals leaving North Carolina for states like Indiana, Oklahoma, and Kansas (Crow et al. 2002:93). In general, the movement of African American individuals during this time, especially between 1890 and 1940, took two forms, each with its own motivation and driving force. The first pattern of movement was external, or migration out of the state. By the year 1930, 21.4% of the African American individuals who were born in North Carolina had moved elsewhere. The same proportion for white individuals continuously fell during this time and by 1930 was 14.2%. The second was urbanization, or the movement from the rural to the urban. In 1910, 16.6% of the African American population lived

in urban areas while 87.8% lived in communities classified as rural. Just 30 years later, by 1940, 30.7% of the African American population lived in urban communities with 69.3% living in rural areas (McConnell 1944:12-16).

In addition to wage discrepancies and unequal access to resources, the postbellum era brought in other threats to African American communities. One form this took was the Ku Klux Klan, often violent white supremacists that rose to power in the 1860s. The Klan's aim was to keep black individuals from gaining any kind of political power (Crow et al. 2002:89–90). Klan activities and violence were often ignored by sympathetic local and state governments, with the North Carolina legislature passing a law that granted “complete amnesty and pardon” for all crimes other than rape, willful murder, arson, or burglary, for members of the KKK or similar organizations (Paschal 2021:67).

The KKK did not disappear at the turn of the 20th century. In fact, in many cases, the number of people affiliated with the Klan grew. The United Klans of America, to which most Klan chapters, or klaverns, belonged had a presence in 19 states as of the 1960s and over 200 “klaverns” in North Carolina alone (Cunningham 2008:70). In addition to the continued terror perpetrated by the Klan, Jim Crow-era legislation was passed that not only codified segregation but sought to make it all but impossible for African American individuals to climb the social ladder or progress academically. Laws were passed in several counties between 1900-1920 that mandated segregation by race in children's school. A law passed in 1903, geared towards anatomy education, stated that “no white cadavers could go to any school for colored persons.” Another law passed in 1915 prevented any white nurses from attending to a “colored” patient. Even in cases where the legislation had not necessarily changed, there was a massive shift in the

first decade of the 20th century where funding and resources vastly favored white schools over those for African American children (Paschal 2021:130).

Even for those African American individuals who were able to beat the odds and gain a good education, opportunities were still limited. The right to vote was denied to all African American individuals in North Carolina, regardless of level of education or status. A New Bern resident stated, in his lifetime, even "a black man with a PhD degree, couldn't register. They say, 'well, he's not qualified to read the Constitution of the United States'" (Hawkins 2008:379). While the law did not explicitly state that an African American person could not vote, the laws and literacy tests that were applied meant that most African Americans were effectively prevented from voting and denied a voice in the governance of their own towns and communities (ACLU).

The town of Princeville emerged just after Emancipation and was first known as Freedom Hill. The community took shape when newly freed, African American individuals sought the protection of Union Army troops, who were still stationed in the area. One group of Union soldiers was encamped on the banks of the Tar River, in Edgecombe County (Mizelle 2016). This

area of Edgecombe County, just to the southwest of Tarboro, was and continues to be a marshy area that is very susceptible to flooding. Therefore, it was undesirable for development by the more affluent white landowners (Figure 2.1) (Mobley 1986:340). As such, the African American individuals who called Freedom Hill home were allowed to remain and live on the land. Though the community was first established by 1865, making it the oldest continually occupied town that was founded and governed by African American individuals, it was not officially incorporated until 1885. It was then renamed Princeville in 1905 to honor an early resident and former slave named Richard Turner Prince (Phillips et al. 2012:407). Turner Prince would later go on to be named a magistrate in the No. 1 township of Tarboro, which includes Princeville (Turner and Bridgers 1997:307).

Although some of the early residents of Freedom Hill/Princeville did make their living through farming and sharecropping, like the majority of African Americans in eastern North Carolina just after Emancipation, Princeville saw a much larger diversity of occupation than many other areas. By the late 1880s, many of the town's citizens had opened businesses and were working as cobblers, blacksmiths, grocers, seamstresses, barbers and more. Other residents also took industrial work in the nearby city of Tarboro. In fact, according to the 1880 census, only 43 of the town's 379 residents (11%) worked in agriculture with that number falling to only 21 of 552 (3.8%) residents in 1900. According to the 1910 census, Princeville represented a draw to African American individuals outside of the state of North Carolina, with many individuals immigrating to the town (United States Census Bureau 1910). Additionally, Princeville soon built its own school, and residents like Turner Prince, took an active role in the politics of nearby Tarboro (Mobley 1986:343–360). Although Princeville's relative stability and self-sufficiency was undoubtedly a source of consternation for the proponents of segregation (Mizelle 2016),

Princeville was able to mostly avoid interactions with the Klan and other similar organizations. As a sizeable, entirely African American community, Princeville's boundaries were able to provide its residents a sort of protection that was difficult to find elsewhere in the state, or the country (Mobley 1986:348).

Unlike the structure of many nearby towns that were primarily white, historian Joe Mobley suggests the social structure of Princeville was looser in nature. He states that it was not firmly split into the haves and the have-nots, or those with expendable income and those without. Although there was less of an importance placed on the amount of personal wealth a person or family possessed, Princeville still needed capital to survive. Once chain stores and mail order catalogs were introduced to the area, it became increasingly difficult to keep the money that residents made within the town (Mobley 1986:357). In addition to economic hardships, Princeville's location in the swampy floodplain of the Tar River brought with it another problem: flooding. Floods have been documented in the Tar-Pamlico River basin since its settlement and include severe inundations in 1889, 1919, 1924, and 1940, just to name a small portion (Mizelle 2016). More recent devastating floods include 1999, a result of hurricanes Floyd and Dennis and the 2016 flooding brought by Hurricane Matthew. During the 1999 flooding, the river submerged the town for approximately two weeks. During Hurricane Matthew, around 80% of the town was again under water (Phillips et al. 2012:406; Adkins et al. 2021:221). Despite the hardships that have pervaded the community's history, Princeville has persevered, remaining to many a sign of the resilience of the African American communities of North Carolina (Mizelle 2016).

Ayden, North Carolina is located approximately 36 miles to the southwest of Princeville (Figure 2.2). It was incorporated approximately six years after Princeville, in 1891. Although it was incorporated under the name “Ayden,” prior to its official beginning, the community was known as “Arthertown” or “Arthurtown,” named for one of the most well-known and prolific farmers of the area, Arthur McLawhorn. Four years after the town’s incorporation under the name Ayden, the founder of the town, William Henry Harris, petitioned and won the right to rename the town to Harriston. Many of the residents resisted the change and the name eventually reverted to Ayden at the beginning of the 20th century (Kammerer 1988). Today, Ayden is home to approximately 5,000 individuals. However, in the 1930s it was the second-most populated area of Pitt County, overshadowed only by the county seat of Greenville (NPS 1994:100).

Though it was a largely agricultural community for most of its history, Ayden’s beginnings are inseparably linked to the railroad industry in North Carolina. Prior to 1890 there were no distribution centers for tobacco in Pitt County, even though tobacco was one of the county’s leading crops. The closest centers were in Oxford, Henderson, and Durham, all between 90 and 105 miles from Ayden, by modern roads (NPS 1994:102). As the demand, and the

potential profit of, tobacco increased in eastern North Carolina, the primarily agrarian residents of the area recognized the benefit of a railroad depot closer to home (Kammerer 1988). Harris, as one of the largest landowners in the area, donated one parcel of land and sold another to the Wilmington and Weldon railroad for the creation of such a depot. In conjunction with the railroad and the East Carolina Land and Improvement Company, 40 additional plots were arranged and sold, creating the beginnings of Ayden Town (National Park Service 1994:99; Power 1991:291). Tobacco has continued to be a major crop and source of employment throughout Ayden's history. Ayden once hosted several tobacco warehouses for multiple types of tobacco leaf, though they were destroyed in favor of other industries by 1930. By 1900, scarcely 10 years after its founding, Ayden had blossomed into a successful town with over a dozen businesses and 557 residents (NPS 1994:103–104).

According to the 1910 census, the vast majority of all the residents of Ayden in the early days of the town's history were farmers. For the African American residents, this meant primarily being employed as being farm laborers, although a few were listed as being the owners of their own farms. Additionally, some individuals listed as domestic servants or general laborers, but they were in the minority. In addition to a lack of diversity of occupation, most of the early residents of Ayden listed their parents' place of birth as the state of North Carolina. (USCB 1910). However, it has been suggested that the town did represent a draw to some farming families within the state (NPS 1994:103). While this may be the case, census data suggests that that draw did not extend beyond the borders of North Carolina.

Ayden and Princeville Cemetery History

Unfortunately, little is known about the founding of any of the historically African American cemeteries in Ayden or Princeville. The earliest known burials in the Ayden

cemeteries, that is, the earliest death dates on legible markers, are 1908 for the Ayden African American cemetery and 1955 for the Northeast Ayden cemetery. In Princeville, the earliest legible, verified marker dates to 1894 in the Wilson Cemetery and 1916 in the main cemetery. However, particularly in the Ayden African American Ancestral Cemetery and the Wilson cemetery, it is all but certain that there are earlier burials that were either never marked or whose markers have since worn away or been removed.

While it is not known who the first individuals buried in the Princeville cemetery were, it is known to be the final resting place of several founding members including Abraham Wooten (Mobley 1986:366). It is also rumored to be the final resting place of Turner Prince, although the exact location of his burial is not known. According to some residents of Princeville, the older section of the cemetery, the Wilson Cemetery, is not owned or maintained by the town but rather the descendants. A local non-profit, called Freedom Org. which focuses on community outreach and cultural preservation in historically disenfranchised towns, has spearheaded efforts to clean and maintain this section of the cemetery (Freedom Org). According to Edgecombe County GIS, the 14.59-acre parcel that contains the most, if not all of the Princeville Cemetery including Wilson cemetery and several other cemeteries to the west are all under the ownership of town (Edgecombe County Government).

The Ayden African American Ancestral cemetery's founding and ownership is perhaps even more mysterious. One thing that is known for certain is that the 4AC, and later the Northeast Cemetery, were founded during a time of legal segregation for Ayden's African American residents. Before renaming, both cemeteries were known collectively as the Ayden Colored Cemetery (Works Progress Administration 1940). Many residents and members of the 4AC friends group state that, while the cemetery was still in use, for a set fee the caretaker of the

cemetery would provide a plot and bury the deceased individual. However, no one seems to know who this individual, or individuals, might have been. Further, no one knows who owns the cemetery (Ewen 2025). While, according to Pitt County GIS, the Northeast Cemetery is owned by the Town of Ayden, the owner of the Ayden African American Ancestral Cemetery is listed as “cemetery unknown” (Pitt County). This has created many questions regarding who is legally obligated to maintain the space.

General Cemetery Background:

American Burial History

Just as a community must be examined with regard to the larger historical context, so too cemeteries and grave markers must be researched within the context of American burial customs and funeral industry as a whole. The American funeral industry has often been criticized for its tendency to focus on capital gains rather than on the individuals being buried and their families. However, the funeral home industry as it is known today is a relatively new invention. The earliest customs surrounding Euro-colonial burials in the United States were relatively stark and mirrored those that the colonists had known before immigrating to the New World (Mitford 1998:16). For these primarily protestant immigrants, this meant an avoidance of lavish ceremonies and the prayers over the dead associated with the Catholic Church. Rather, the body was interred without any pomp or formal ceremony. The beginnings of a shift were seen around the turn of the 18th century, when funeral ceremonies began to be held within churches and then, even later in the century, graveside prayers and ceremonies became commonplace (Habenstein and Lamers 1962:197).

Before the turn of the 18th century, evidence suggests that some women may have combined the roles of the undertaker and the upholsterer. Many upholstery businesses were

combined with cabinet making and, as such, it was very convenient for the cabinet makers to also produce coffins (Habenstein and Lamers 1962:225–240). Rather than arising out of some new need for a funeral industry, early undertaking was a career of convenience and, generally, only a portion of their livelihood. By the mid-1700s, the typical American funeral had begun to take on some of the characteristics that are associated with many funerals today. In addition to the introduction of specially built and designed coffins and “coffin-furniture,” gifts and tokens such as gloves and rings would be distributed to the mourners in attendance. In addition to the funeral gifts, mourners were enticed to attend with grand funeral feasts (Habenstein and Lamers 1962:206).

By the middle of the 19th century, cabinet makers were also advertising their services as upholsterers and undertakers. In many cases, city directories of the mid-19th century reveal that some businessmen were listed as only cabinet makers and then, within fifteen years, they were listed as upholsterers and undertakers as well (Habenstein and Lamers 1962:230). In other cases, the job of the church sexton was expanded to include that of the undertaker. The sexton would take charge of the interments within the church-associated burial grounds that were under his purview (Habenstein and Lamers 1962:240). Around the turn of the 20th century, the location for funeral ceremonies began to shift from the home of the individual to the funeral home, which had just begun to emerge. The process of embalming had originated to preserve the bodies of those killed in the Civil War. However, around the turn of the century, schools dedicated to the teaching of mortuary sciences like embalming began to emerge. This, in turn, solidified the role of the undertaker, or funeral director, as a profession rather than a convenient additional duty (Habenstein and Lamers 1962:404; Melville 2022:119).

This status of the funeral and its associated practices as an industry has prevailed to the modern day, though some researchers believe that, during the past decade, the funeral industry has been in a period of rapid change (Dawdy 2021:5). Although it has definitely shifted in the modern day as more individuals are choosing to be cremated rather than have a traditional burial, the funeral home industry remains an integral part of the American experience of death (Sloane 1991:150). While journalist Jessica Mitford argued in her exposé of the American funeral home industry that “the cost of a funeral almost always varies, not according to individual taste but according to what the market will bear,” others believe that the variation in burial customs is more due to cultural differences (Mitford 1998:16). Still others argue that “the mere passage of time guarantees nothing about the burial customs of a people” and “that it must be admitted that the precise nature of the ceremonies, goods and equipment incorporated into the behavior toward the dead is always subject to the circumstances of the particular culture” (Habenstein and Lamers 1962:252–252).

American Cemetery History

The cemetery in the United States, and elsewhere in the world, has gone through many forms and stylings. In the earliest days of the United States, indeed before it was even the United States, the most common burials included frontier graves, homestead graveyards, churchyards, potter’s fields, and the earliest town cemeteries (Sloane 1991:4–5). The frontier grave, or pioneer grave was perhaps the starkest of all the burial trends in what would become the United States. As colonization of the land occurred, and colonists died, as people do, they needed to be buried. These so-called frontier graves were born out of necessity, burying people essentially where they fell and not in any specific location (Sloane 1991:14). Homestead graveyards and church yards are self-explanatory. The first refers to graves on the land owned by the individual’s family while

the latter refers to a graveyard maintained by a religious institution (Sloane 1991:17). The potter's field refers to a pauper's burial ground, or a place to bury those who could not afford burial in any other location. These, though relatively uncommon, were an option prior to the turn of the 19th century (Sloane 1991:24).

In the 19th century, burial grounds underwent a transformation. The previously existing cemeteries that were within a city's boundaries had reached capacity and, in many cases, had exceeded it (Melville 2022:65). This era saw a transition to the so-called rural and lawn-park cemeteries that often existed outside of a city's borders. These cemeteries combined the burial ground with a well-manicured park that was appealing to visitors (Sloane 1991:44). At the beginning of the 20th century, the cemetery took on a shape that is more recognizable to individuals today, that of the memorial park (Sloane 1991:4–5). Although cemeteries in Europe faced similar issues of over-crowding and a similar timeframe of transformation, the cemeteries of the United States and Europe have differed, and continue to differ, in many ways. These include the American traditions of ownership of cemeteries by private citizens, a family's control over the plot itself, the intense commercialization of the cemetery, the preference for natural landscapes and the increasing selection of cremation over traditional burial (Sloane 1991:3).

Just as the role of the undertaker emerged as a viable career in the mid- to late- 19th century, so too did the model of the cemetery as a business or investment. While previous iterations of the American cemetery had either been privately owned or maintained by a town or religious institution and run by a sexton (if anyone), in the 19th century with the introduction of the rural cemetery, management began to be the purview of trustees, entrepreneurs, superintendents and sales managers (Sloane 1991:4–5). Towards the end of the 19th century, there was scarcely a cemetery anywhere that did not charge some sort of fee for internment and

maintenance. By the beginning of the 20th century, the vast majority of cemeteries in the United States could be separated into three general categories. These were: those used by ethnic, religious, or racial groups; continuations of previously popular rural cemeteries; and those that followed the newer lawn-park model (Sloane 1991:109–125). As time continued, the cemetery model changed yet again. More and more individuals began to choose cremation over traditional interment in a burial ground (Table 2.1). While this rise in cremations is outside of the scope of this research, it is worth acknowledging as it could explain any decline seen in total numbers of burials over time.

History of African American Burial Grounds

As mentioned in the previous section, one of the major distinctions between burial grounds was that of racial segregation, either legally or culturally mandated. Often “prevailing prejudices in the land of the living were at one time mirrored in the land of the dead, and racial segregation as practiced on cemetery land paralleled what prevailed above ground” (Mitford 1998:85). In many cemeteries, especially as the years continued to pass and the potter’s fields and churchyards declined in popularity, there was less of a division along economic boundaries

seen in the burial ground. This is not to say that the quality and extravagance of the grave markers did not vary according to what the family could afford, but rather that rich and poor could be buried in the same burial ground. However, there was little to no flexibility when it came to racial boundaries (Sloane 1991:187). This division in burial grounds according to racial categorization began with the graves of enslaved individuals and transitioned into legally mandated separate (and rarely equal) graveyards. In many cemeteries today, many members of distinct communities desire burial on the same grounds as their ancestors.

The earliest African American burial grounds in the United States are typically those of enslaved individuals. Those burial grounds can be sorted into two general groups: those which were made by the white slave owner and those that were created by the enslaved individuals themselves (Little 1998:36). The cemeteries erected by the slave owners were typically more organized, according to Euro-American standards (Brooks 2011:180) and were often the only enslaved burial grounds where commercially produced marble headstones are seen. These headstones often contained reference to the fact that the individual was the “property” of the landowner, with epitaphs describing the deceased as enslaved or describing them as “my own” (Little 1998:36–37). Still other graves mention the individuals only by a first name followed by the designation “servant” and including the name of person by whom they were enslaved. These markers also often mentioned the race of the individual (Baughner and Veit 2016:174, Tashjian and Tashjian 1989:169)).

Conversely, those burial grounds created by the enslaved individuals often had a less rigid organization and unique grave markers. These markers have often not survived as they were made of wood or were plants that were used in place of a marker (Brooks 2011:180; Little 1998:36). The graves that did have more durable markers usually used either concrete, a tradition

which continues in African American graves through the middle of the 20th century, or locally available stone. (Baugher and Veit 2016:175). Both white and African American cemeteries did turn to commercially produced markers as they became available, but those cemeteries that were historically African American, typically continued to contain handmade or “folk” markers long after mass-produced headstones were readily available (Little 1998:237). Although there were definite differences in the gravemarkers, some researchers believe that it is the layout and the pattern of internment that truly distinguishes the African American burial ground from a traditionally white graveyard (Little 1989:105).

Just as the burial grounds for the enslaved were often hidden and out of sight, on land that was deemed unusable for other purposes, so to were the historic African American burial grounds. While the white cemeteries were often organized in neat, manicured rows and the only trees and other foliage were carefully curated, the African American burial grounds were less rigid in their design (Little 1989:106). Instead, though the slabs and headstones were still laid out in an East/West orientation, the pattern of internment is often not readily identifiable in the earlier burial grounds, especially those before desegregation (Brown 2019:23). Often the graves in older African American burial grounds are arranged into family groups but there is not a defined order to the family group, as is often seen in white cemeteries (Little 1998:237). This means that, while the members of the family are buried in the same general area, they may not be grouped into distinct nuclear family units.

American Grave Markers

It is important to note that most of the early, longitudinal research that was completed which looks at the iconography of American gravestones has been limited to the eastern United States. So, when many researchers stated that the research is concerned with “American” grave

markers, they are in reality referring to a singular geographic area. While there have been studies more recently that have looked at the markers of other regions, the East Coast has remained the focus of most work (Hijiya 1983:339). In his study of American gravestones published in 1983, researcher David Hijiya stated that grave markers in the United States can be separated into six distinct time periods with associated styles, and revelations about the contemporary attitudes towards death (Table 2.2).

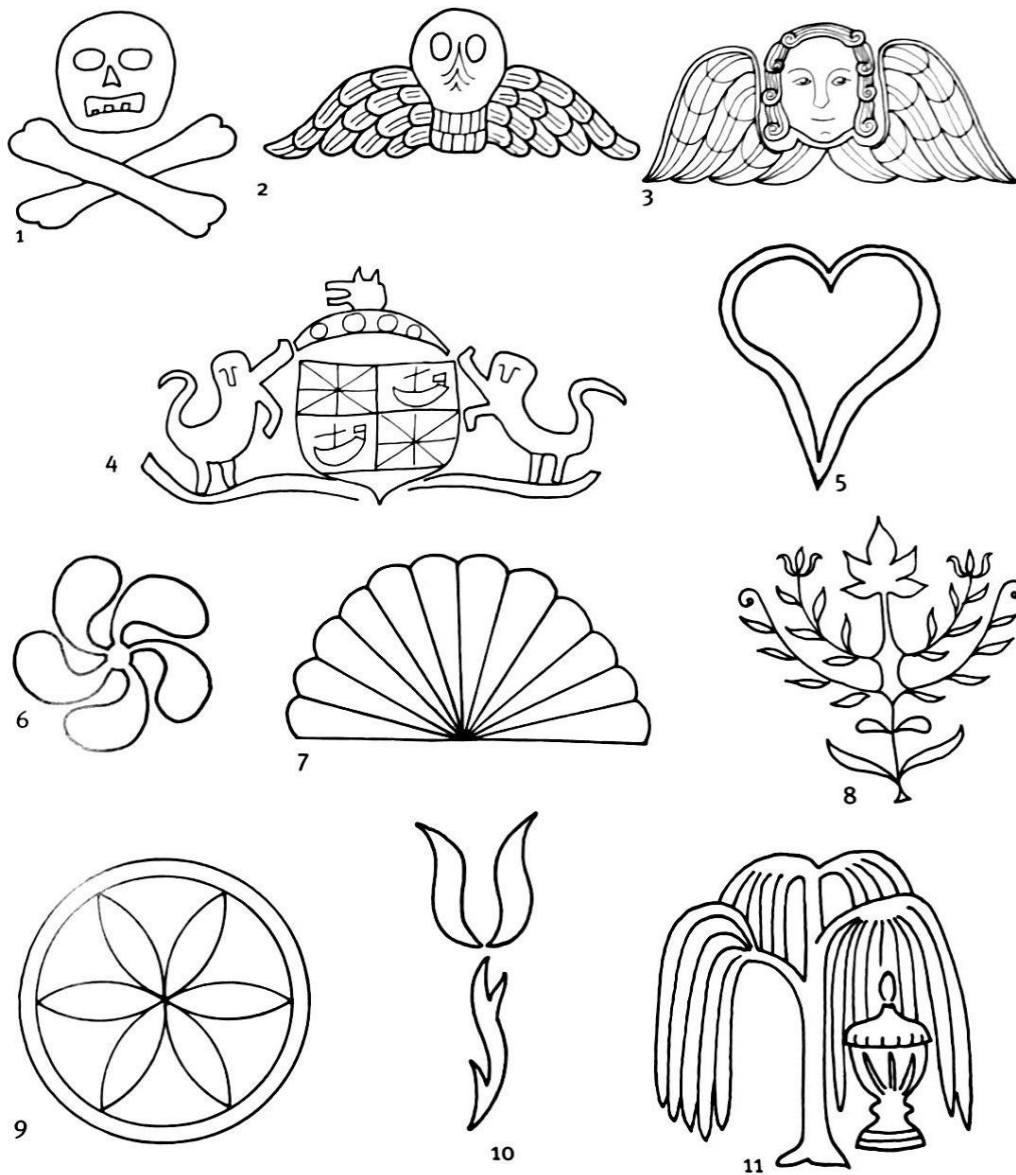


Figure 2.3: Common early gravestone motifs.

The earliest of Hijiya's categories covers the period of English colonialism in what would become the United States. These early markers were, as the title "plain" suggests, stark in design. Often these stones had little to no additional decoration and were marked by a simple inscription such as "here lies." While Hijiya believes that this showed a sort of resignation to the inevitability of death, he also suggests that the lack of any decoration or other inscription suggests that the communities may have had doubts about the final destination of the departed soul. Later motif designs such as the death's head, which is often synonymous to early colonial burial grounds, and the angel or cherub were thought to represent an awe of the heavens and a confidence in the soul's salvation, respectively (Figure 2.3) (Hijiya 1983:340–348).

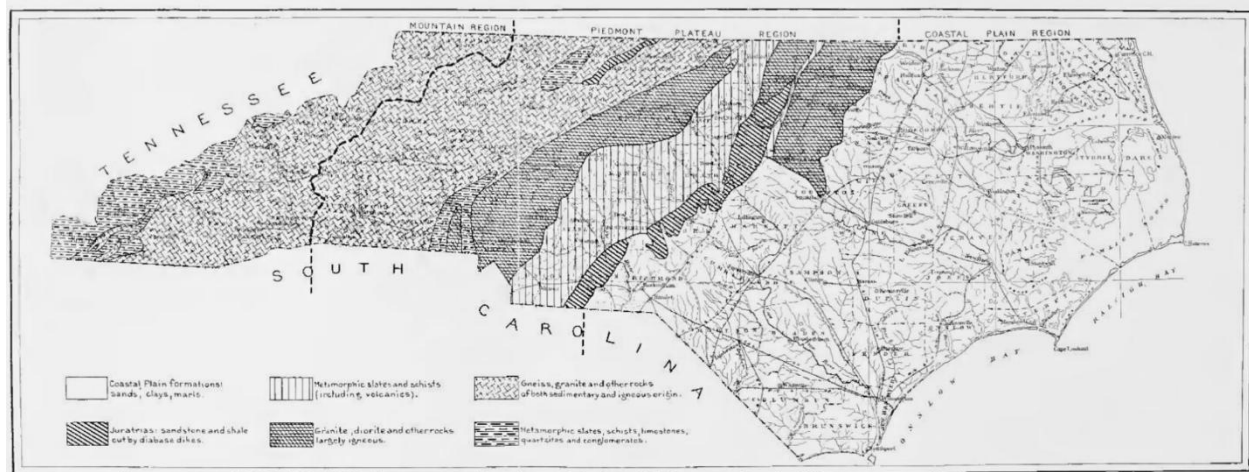


Figure 2.4: Physiographic Map of North Carolina (Watson 1906:13)

Especially in areas like eastern North Carolina, the presence of any headstone adorning a grave during the colonial period suggested a certain amount of wealth and status. As there is no native

stone to the coastal plain, any large gravestones acquired during the colonial period would have had to been imported, often at great cost to the purchaser (Figure 2.4) (Little 1998:32).

As previously discussed, it is around the mid-19th century that cemeteries and the funeral industry underwent a period of massive change. Similarly, Hijiya suggests that the transition to the “urn and willow” design represented the turning point of gravestone iconography. This design, like many of the other early styles, can be traced back to Europe and appears to represent a transition from mourning as a private affair to a more open one. Further, it has been stated that this change revealed that “death had ceased to be a transcendental phenomenon and become a social one [and] the most important relationships had become horizontal (between dead people and living ones) rather than vertical (between man and God).” Along with this, towards the end of the 19th century, the construction of markers changed from an artisan pursuit to a more mechanized process (Hijiya 1983:349, 351).

Before the introduction of more mechanized processes for stone quarrying and carving, the production of grave markers was limited to softer, easier-to-carve stones. In North Carolina, this included slate, sandstone, marble, concrete and even, in some cases, wood. Each of these materials brought with them certain challenges. The first challenge is durability. Unsurprisingly,

the softer a building material is, the more readily it decays and degrades. This, in turn, leads to a lack of surviving grave markers of these materials. Sandstone, due to its coarse and rough texture, does not lend itself well to carving. Indeed, most sandstone markers were not carved at all but rather left as unmarked fieldstones (Little 1998:63). One of the most highly prized and sought after early grave marker materials was marble. While it was harder than slate or wood and more amenable to carving than sandstone, it was not readily available in many areas, including most of North Carolina (Wood 2006:23). In the state of North Carolina, marble is only found naturally in a very small area of the western edge of the state. Instead, individuals would have to import the stone from as far away as Vermont or New York, although some closer quarries were available later in the 19th century. Still, marble was prized for the status it conveyed to the individual and its general attractiveness (Little 1989:179–181).

As railroads expanded and increased the feasibility of large-scale shipment, smaller marble works were unable to compete and were absorbed into larger industrial businesses. Granite emerged as a viable, cheaper, and more durable alternative to marble around the end of the 19th century. Granite, as a much harder stone, is more durable than other materials. However, this hardness meant that it was also harder to quarry. It was not until the mid- to late- 19th century that the quarrying of granite on a large, industrial scale was possible with the advent of several iterations of the steam powered, or pneumatic, rock drill (Wood 2006:47). This invention, as well as the incorporation of pneumatic hammers, diamond saws, and grinding machines meant that granite, which was once inaccessible to stone masons who were limited hand tools, was now a viable alternative to marble. Over time, the superior durability of granite monuments overshadowed any other alternatives and the increased mechanization of production standardized marker design and transformed the stone mason into an engraver (Little 1998:230-231).

Around the same time that granite was dominating the monument industry, another change was occurring. This was the phase that Hijiya referred to as the shift to monumental architecture and a corresponding defiance of death. While previous stones had been relatively small and unassuming, the stones of the late 19th and early 20th century were larger and more ornate in nature, with carvings and elaborate inscriptions increasing in popularity. Both marble and granite were used for these large works of art. The final stage in gravemarker design was a return to a more plain and standardized style. The modern, usually granite, marker is often uniformly created as part of a standard design. While inscriptions and decorations may be individual, the shape and size are indistinguishable from many other graves in the burial ground. For Hijiya, this reveals a “studied ignorance” towards death and, while the previous, extravagant markers sought to draw attention to the deceased, the modern marker seeks to be as unobtrusive as possible (Hijiya 1983:555–560).

African American Gravemarkers

Many researchers suggest that the traditions found within African American graveyards, especially those related to funerals, grave markers and grave goods, take their origins from West African traditions (Roediger 1981:163). While it is agreed that there is a definite and enduring African influence, some researchers caution against sweeping statements that attribute features to “West Africa”. While the statement is not inaccurate, it ignores the diversity of culture and mortuary practices present in the area of the continent. Researcher Ross Jamieson also adds that the “transition of cultural practices to the Americas would have been highly dependent on whether specialists were present” (Jamieson 1995:44–47). Still, it cannot be ignored that some practices did make their way across the Atlantic. Some African traditions, like the practice of

grave-vaulting, permeated into white practices, while many white and Christian traditions became common place in African American cemeteries (Davidson 2012:88–89).

While the same stylings of grave markers are found in both white and traditionally African American burial grounds, there are also unique aspects that set them apart. On the whole, especially in older African American cemeteries, the markers will be less constrained by commercial stylings and will be more individual in their designs (Little 1998:239). However, it should be noted that the unique trend of stamping concrete with the funeral home name does occur in many cemeteries around the middle of the 20th century. While there is a preference for individuality in many African American cemeteries, there is another feature that ties them all together and defines the southern African American burial pattern. That is the use of concrete, especially the use of concrete slabs that rest atop either the grave itself or over an underground concrete vault (Brown 2019:31).

Concrete has not been limited to its use in vaults and slabs. In the late 19th century and into the 20th century, markers constructed of cast concrete represented a viable and more affordable alternative to marble. While it was readily incorporated into African American burial grounds, cast concrete or flat concrete slabs are much less popular in traditionally white burial grounds. In fact, while there are a few examples of cast concrete gravestones in white cemeteries, there are no recorded examples of flat concrete slabs outside of traditionally African American burial grounds (Little 1989:109; Little 1998:242). One of the earliest and most common examples of a mass-produced concrete marker was a headstone with “neat, uppercase Roman lettering cast into the front face and popular decorative motifs cast into the shallow-arched tympanum” (Little 1998:242). Often, this motif features an anchor and vine. The anchor is frequently used in

gravestone iconography as a symbol of hope, while the ivy vine is used as a representative of resilience and/or the Christian Holy Trinity (Keister 2004:47, 111).

While plain concrete slabs became increasingly popular in the 1960s, they are not always undecorated. Many times the name of the funeral home will be stamped at the foot of slab, effectively acting as an advertisement for the company (Little 1989:109). Still other slabs are painted or embedded with other materials. The painting includes whitewash, a silvery finish or even occasionally a light blue. Sometimes a wave pattern will be carved into the concrete before it is set or other materials like marbles, tiles, or glass shards will be added (Brown 2019:32-33). Yet another common feature of traditionally African American cemeteries is the inclusion of a non-concrete plaque set into the concrete slab. These plaques are made of a variety of different materials including marble, granite, metal, and even a plastic composite. The plaques bear the identifying information for the individual buried in the grave, but usually are limited to the name, birth and death dates and the occasional small decorative motif. Over time, like their counterparts in white headstones, granite headstones began to become more prevalent in African American cemeteries. However, unlike white cemeteries, the use of “folk” markers and concrete constructions persisted. Individuality is also still found, despite the industry’s standardization, as technology improves, many people choose to include personal images like fraternal organizations, fishing-scenes, trucks, and portraits added to markers (Little 1998:242–247).

Cemetery studies, as a growing field, attempt to connect grave marker forms and designs with elements of human culture. Many of the early studies of this subject sought to construct or at least nation-wide patterns that shaped cemetery trends. Others attempted to find the patterns that denote specific regions or cultural groups. This research seeks to do something more specific. By viewing the cemetery assemblages in Princeville and Ayden through the lenses of

general history of African American individuals in North Carolina as well as the specific histories of the towns, this research seeks to identify trends unique to each town and show how those patterns illustrate each town's unique background.

CHAPTER 3: PREVIOUS ARCHAEOLOGY

Several surveys of cemeteries have been completed in both Pitt and Edgecombe Counties since the construction of the Ayden African American Ancestral Cemetery, the Northeast Ayden Cemetery, the Ayden Town Cemetery and the Princeville Community Cemetery. There is great variation in the information included in each survey and each cemetery was documented with different levels of detail. Many surveys were conducted in each county well before the Anthropology Department at East Carolina University (ECU) began its partnership with the communities of both Princeville and Ayden. However, the surveys conducted by the ECU Anthropology department beginning in 2020 are more detailed and complete in their scope than those conducted previously. While the Ayden Town Cemetery, 4AC, and Northeast Ayden Cemetery do appear in previous surveys conducted in Pitt County, the Princeville Community Cemetery does not appear to have been included in any previous surveys of Edgecombe County. However, many cemeteries in nearby Tarboro, many of which were much smaller than the Princeville Community Cemetery would have been at the time, have been included on multiple surveys.

Works Progress Administration

The earliest survey that could be found covering the cemeteries of eastern North Carolina was compiled as part of the Works Progress Administration's (WPA) Historical Records Survey that was conducted between 1935 and 1942. The data included in this survey was sourced from county and state records, private collections and church documents. The WPA's publication included information about many cemeteries throughout North Carolina. These data were then organized by county (Barrese 1981). The WPA cemetery surveys for Pitt County and Edgecombe County were published in 1940, however it does not include the exact year the survey was

conducted. It appears as though the survey was compiled from records already in existence, rather than through additional research. The original, typewritten document has been digitized and is hosted by North Carolina Digital Collections. It is available for public use, however many pages have been duplicated, and the collection is by no means a complete records of all cemeteries in the state. While the surveys do include some small family plots and private burial grounds, some larger, municipal cemeteries are conspicuously absent.

The WPA's survey of the cemeteries of Pitt County includes several of Ayden's cemeteries, both public and private. This includes both the Ayden African American Ancestral Cemetery and the Ayden Town Cemetery. The 4AC is referred to as the "Ayden Cemetery (Col.)" within the document. The Northeast Cemetery was not included as it would not be founded for over 20 years after the publication of the survey. What is known today as Ayden Town Cemetery was referred to as simply "Ayden Cemetery." While the gravemarker records for Ayden Town Cemetery are fairly extensive with over 150 listed individuals, there are only five markers recorded in what would come to be called the 4AC. Four of these are still visible in the cemetery today, however one stone, that of Mary Cox who died in 1911, has not appeared in any survey since. According to later surveys, 36 legible gravestones that predate 1930 are present in the 4AC. This illustrates just how small a sample was represented by the WPA records, though, as previously stated, there is little to no information available about the survey methods used by the WPA. However, the one piece of information provided states that the records were compiled by an Ernest L. Denton. Perhaps unsurprisingly, the survey also does not include any further biographical information about Mr. Denton. While little knowledge about specific graves or individuals buried in the 4AC can be gained from this survey, there is one very telling piece of

information. Already, by 1940, the condition of the cemetery was listed as “bad.” (Figure 3.1, Works Projects Administration 1940).

The Princeville Community Cemetery is not included within the documents compiled by the WPA in its Edgecombe County Cemetery Survey. Multiple cemeteries listed in the Edgecombe County survey are listed as “Old Cemetery,” however no names were found in any of those burial records that matched the pre-1940 burials at the Princeville Community Cemetery (Works Progress Administration 1940a). While Pitt County, and Ayden specifically, had and continues to have a larger population than Edgecombe County and Princeville, there are at least 60 known burials in the Princeville Community Cemetery dating before 1930. This suggests that it was at least as large as the 4AC at the time of the survey.

While the Works Progress Administration Survey is a valuable and early resource for the Ayden cemeteries, it is somewhat lacking in the information it contains. As was previously stated, it is not a complete record of the burials present in the cemeteries at the time of the survey. Further, the information that the documents contain is limited to what would have

appeared on tombstone records; simply the name, birth date and death date of the individual. No mention of grave marker design or construction or any inscriptions is included. There is also no demographic information about the individuals beyond their birth and death dates. Many of the cemeteries listed in the surveys do include a short description of the location. Consistent with this, the 4AC for example is described only as “on the east side of highway 11, about a mile north of Ayden.” However, there is no information about the layout of any of the cemeteries or the positioning of the gravestones within. The individuals are listed in alphabetical order according to the last name but are not specifically grouped into any family plots that may have been present. The survey is useful as a supplemental tool to verify names and dates, but it does not provide much detail beyond that (Works Progress Administration 1940b).

The Kittrell Survey

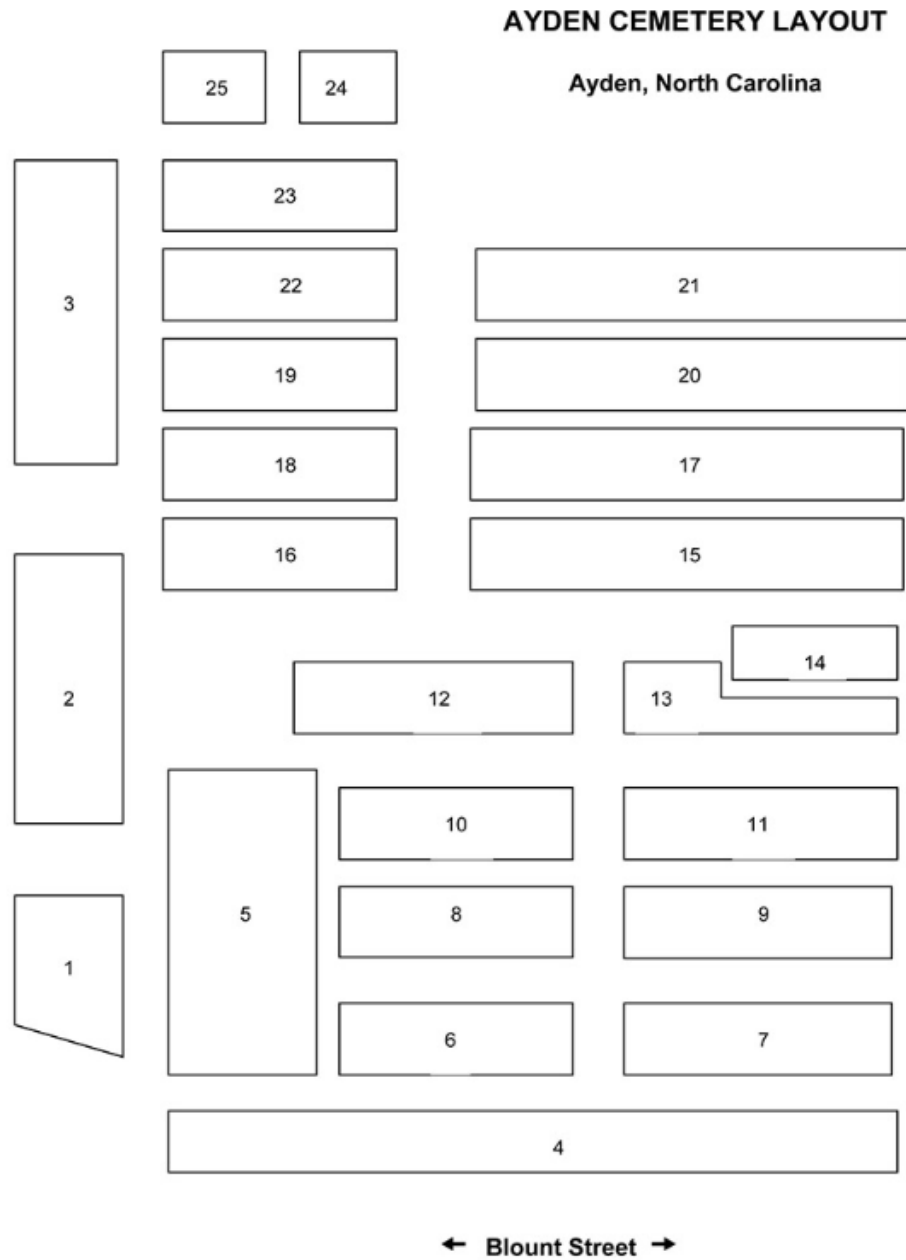


Figure 3.2: Kittrell's Map of Ayden Town Cemetery (Kittrell 2007)

In 2007, the Pitt County Historical Society published a two-volume set containing a survey of the cemeteries of Pitt County, conducted by William B. Kittrell. While Kittrell has completed surveys of other cemeteries in Eastern North Carolina, including some in Edgecombe County (though not including the Princeville Community Cemetery), his survey of Pitt County is his most complete (Kittrell 2000). Kittrell’s survey is an incredibly impressive collection, especially considering that Mr. Kittrell did all of his surveying as a volunteer. The collection is very nearly a complete survey of all of the cemeteries in the county. Like the WPA survey, very little information was recorded for each headstone and no information about location within the property was recorded for most of the cemeteries. There are exceptions to this as Kittrell includes maps for some of the larger cemeteries. One of these is the Ayden Town Cemetery. Kittrell’s map shows the basic boundaries of various sections of the Ayden Town Cemetery and includes a section number with each headstone entry (Figure 3.2).

Beyond the maps showing the general layout of the largest cemeteries, the only other identifying information is a short sentence describing the location of the cemetery in relation to the town, much like the descriptions of the WPA. For the 4AC, this was recorded as “on the east side of old NC 11, at the northern edge of Ayden, beside the creek” (Kittrell 2007).

Also, like the WPA surveys, Kittrell's survey does not appear to include all of the legible headstones that would have been within the 4AC at the time of the survey. As per surveys completed in 2021, there were 59 headstones in the 4AC with legible death dates, and 72 headstones total that had any identifying marks or names. Kittrell's survey lists 38 entries, 3 of which are labeled as unmarked. This means that his survey recorded only approximately half of the headstones that would have been present in 2007. However, it must be acknowledged that, at the time of Kittrell's survey, the 4AC was incredibly overgrown and inaccessible, so the fact that he was able to record so many is impressive and a testament to his commitment to the survey. Kittrell's map of the Ayden Town Cemetery does align with those produced by later surveys, suggesting that the inventory of those headstones was complete (Kittrell 2007).

Kittrell's survey does include more information about the headstones themselves than the previous WPA survey. While there is still no information recorded about the location of the marker within each section, and there is no documentation regarding the materials, decorations or form, Kittrell's records do include some additional inscriptions. While this does not include any epitaphs, identifying information about the individual on the military-issued markers was listed underneath the name, birth, and death dates of the individual. Additionally, on some of the mass-produced concrete headstones in the 4AC age is often listed along with the death date while the birth date of the individual is omitted. In those cases, Kittrell recorded the individual's age (Kittrell 2007). While this does provide more information and a more complete inventory than the WPA's 1940 survey, it is still lacking for some avenues of research. However, as a tool to aid genealogists, which was its stated intent, it is very effective. Since its publication, the survey has been added to a larger database covering the cemeteries of the entire state of North

Carolina. Like Kittrell, the other surveyors who contributed to this database are volunteers (Dew 2021).

East Carolina University

East Carolina University (ECU) has been involved in locating, surveying and mapping numerous historic cemeteries in eastern North Carolina. ECU first began working with the Ayden African American Ancestral Cemetery in 2020, though the process began a year earlier in 2019. Ayden town manager Steve Harrell knew of a boy scout who was interested in creating a bridge and pathway through what was described as an abandoned African American Cemetery and approached ECU archaeologist Dr. Charles Ewen for assistance. The designation “abandoned cemetery” has been met with some objections. While that phrasing still appears in articles and papers, many of the town’s residents have maintained that the cemetery was never forgotten by them. Terminology aside, this conversation signaled the beginning of a project that spanned six years (Ewen 2025).

At first it might seem unusual to bring an archaeologist in on an Eagle Scout project to create a pathway through a cemetery. However, it had long been known by members in the community that not all the graves in the 4AC are marked. In fact, most of the burials are marked only by a depression in the earth. There was a concern that, unless the location of the unmarked graves was first determined, any attempt at construction or path-clearing could potentially impact the burials. The East Carolina University Anthropology Department has a ground penetrating radar (GPR) unit and received a request to bring the GPR to the cemetery and determine the location of any unmarked burials. It was expected that the survey might uncover a few dozen burials. Instead, the survey found approximately 300 anomalies that were determined to be likely burial locations (Ewen 2025).

It quickly became apparent that this project was much larger than constructing a path and clearing some brush and litter. The first iteration of what would become the Ayden project began in 2020, as part of Ewen's Spring semester Historical Archaeology class. Students traveled to the cemetery and recorded the inscriptions, motifs, form and material of any visible headstones. They also cleared portions of the cemetery, marked any depressions and other features with flags, and recorded the location of the plots and markers with a total station, which allows for precise measurements according to a grid. Like most things that were happening in spring of 2020, the Covid-19 pandemic put a halt to the project and ECU students would not return to the cemetery until the summer of 2021 (Ewen 2025) (Figure 3.3).

Due to continuing Covid-19 precautions and restrictions, when the time came for the 2021 summer archaeological field school, it needed to be a locally based project. In previous years, the field schools had either been residential or far enough away to necessitate group travel. As Ayden is only 20 minutes from the main ECU campus, the cemetery was in an ideal location.

Over the previous year, before the field school began, it was discovered that many of the points taken with the total station had been done incorrectly. Additionally, since the previous attempt at surveying the cemetery had been interrupted by the pandemic, the decision was made to start from scratch and redo all of the recording. The project was also expanded to include the Northeast Ayden Cemetery. However, at the Northeast cemetery, the total station was not used, and the markers were recorded according to their position in each row and section. The 4AC portion of the project led to the recording of 72 markers and 264 unmarked burials and, in the Northeast cemetery, an additional 1418 markers were recorded. These data were then used to create an interactive map using ArcGIS pro (Figure 3.4). The map, as well as supplemental documentary resources, were then used to create a story map that is readily available to the public for use to locate specific burials or to learn more about the history of the cemetery (ECU 2022).

The physical surveying of the Ayden African American Cemetery (4AC) began with flagging any visible headstone or other markers. Additionally, flags were placed at both ends of any depressions that were believed to be likely unmarked graves. These were any depressions that appeared to be the approximate length, width and shape of a burial. As the cemetery was incredibly overgrown and wooded, it was not feasible to run a full ground penetrating radar survey of the area. However, the gpr was able to be used on the flat clear areas, closest to the road. No likely unmarked graves were detected in that portion. Each marker or depression was recorded both on a marker form and with a total station, as well as photographed (Figures 3.5 and 3.6).

As the ECU Anthropology Department's relationship with the town of Ayden continued to grow, an opportunity arose to expand the project to include the Cultural Anthropologists and students. The cultural side of the project began with a goal to find out the identity of some of the unmarked burials. The expansion has included the gathering of oral histories, the development of the previously mentioned ArcGIS story map, and the development of a database containing the death records of every individual who was born, lived, or died in Ayden between the years 1913 and 2015. To aid in the clean-up of the cemetery, the recording of the data, and the publishing of findings, the Anthropology Department applied for and was awarded grants from both the National Science Foundation (NSF) and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) (Ewen 2025; Schacht 2024).

The first grant awarded was from the NEH and was titled "Cemeteries as More than Final Resting Places: How Exclusion and Racism Continues to Haunt African Americans After Death." Dr. Ryan Schacht, an ECU bio-cultural anthropologist, was the project director and the grant fell

under the research program of “Archaeological and Ethnographic Field Research.” The project was awarded a total of \$137,906, and covered the period between June 1, 2021, through May 31, 2024. The stated aims of this project were to “evaluate a pattern of African American Cemetery degradation, examine the multicausal process by which cemeteries become abandoned, and identify how best to give voice to the presence of silenced past peoples” (NEH 2021).

In August of 2021, the project was awarded another grant, this time through the National Science Foundation, titled “Community Dynamics of Public Space Management and Abandonment.” The NSF grant totaled \$270,605 and the start date was August 15, 2021, with an estimated end date is July 31, 2025. As with the NEH grant. Dr. Schacht is listed as the principal investigator. However, Dr. Eric Bailey, Dr. Cynthia Grace-McCaskey, Dr. Helen Dixon and Dr. Charles Ewen are listed as co-principal investigators. Drs. Bailey, Grace-McCaskey and Ewen are all within the Anthropology department at ECU while Dr. Dixon is a member of the History department. The stated aims of the project, as detailed in the grant, were to “determine the relative rates of abandonment of public cemeteries in relation to individual- and community-level variables, to depict the processes by which these spaces are abandoned and rediscovered and to understand the feedback between abandonment versus preservation and concepts of identity and belonging” (NSF 2021).

As the cemetery survey portion of the Ayden Project drew to a close, it was determined that there would be benefits to surveying other nearby cemeteries both for preservation purposes as well as the ability to perform comparative analyses between multiple cemeteries. This led to the expansion of the summer field school to include surveys of the Ayden Town Cemetery and the Princeville Community Cemetery. The North Carolina Summer Ventures in Math and

Science archaeology program and various archaeology courses at ECU also participated (Ewen 2025).

While Dr. Ewen was working on a cemetery in Bethel, NC, Kelsi Dew, the historical outreach coordinator for the town of Princeville, mentioned that the Princeville Community Cemetery would benefit from recording and mapping. As this cemetery is a historically African American Cemetery and is geographically close to Ayden, it was a good fit for future comparative analysis. Dr. Grace-McCaskey had previously done work with Princeville regarding both oral histories and flood-mitigation. She was able to connect Dr. Ewen with the relevant town officials. The project was approved by the town and the front portions of the cemetery were surveyed and mapped in 2021 (Ewen 2025) (Figure 3.7).

For this survey, students mapped the markers in relation to each other and cemetery section. Tape measures were used to measure the distance between markers and the markers' relative locations to features such as signs and roads. As with the recording of the Ayden cemeteries, each marker was recorded on a data form (Figure x). This led to the recording of 1,011 markers and the creation of several paper maps. However, the oldest section at the north

end of the cemetery was not recorded until the summer of 2024. Data from all surveys is stored in the Archaeology laboratory, arranged in order of cemetery section or marker number designation, and was digitized during the 2024-2025 school year (Ewen 2025).

CHAPTER 4: METHODOLOGY

Field Methods

East Carolina University has undertaken the recording of historically African American cemeteries throughout Eastern North Carolina, including in Princeville and Ayden. Most of these surveys were completed between the spring of 2020 and the summer of 2021. At the start of this research, the remaining work to be done included digitizing and double-checking all the data that had been previously collected, surveying the remaining portion of the primary Princeville cemetery, also known as the Wilson Cemetery, digitizing and proofing the data, and creating a map showing the location of marked graves within the Princeville cemetery.

The previously unrecorded graves in the Wilson Cemetery, the oldest section of the Princeville cemetery, were surveyed in the summer of 2024 with the help of students from the North Carolina Summer Ventures in Science and Mathematics Program. This program is open to rising juniors and seniors in North Carolina high schools throughout the state. As part of the Archaeology Summer Ventures course, the students, who were supervised by Dr. Charles Ewen and Margaret Milteer, learned excavation techniques and the basic history of archaeology. They were also instructed in survey methods and taught how to properly identify grave marker materials and to document their findings. At the conclusion of the program, students developed and presented projects based either on the survey or on independent archaeological research (NCSSM 2025).

After a few days of preliminary training, the students headed out into the field to collect data. The goal was to record the appearance and inscriptions of the remaining grave markers in the northernmost portion of the Princeville cemetery complex (the Wilson Cemetery) and to gather location data for each marker using a total station. Once the students arrived at Princeville

Community Cemetery, they were split into pairs and assigned to various tasks including setting up the total station, marking the graves with flags, recording the markers, and photographing the gravestones (Figures 4.1-4.3). All were equipped with clipboards and data sheets and those photographing the markers were equipped with compact digital cameras and photo logs (Figure 4.4). The flags placed at each of the grave markers were removed at the end of the day out of consideration to visitors to the cemetery. Thus, rather than labeling all graves numerically, they were designated by the name inscribed on them or, if no name was legible, other defining characteristics such as material, form or decoration in order to avoid later confusion. Despite this, there were still a few duplicates that had to be removed.

Previous surveys of the Princeville Community Cemetery were done using analog methods. Measuring tapes had been used to determine the relative location of each grave marker and this information was then plotted onto paper maps. For the digital maps, this will be rectified by georeferencing points from the analog maps using gps. As such, there was no previously

established datum when the students arrived on site. To begin the new survey, the southwest corner of a family plot enclosed with a cinderblock wall, to the east of the “Wilson Cemetery,” sign was chosen as the backsight (N510/E500), and the datum was established 10ft to the south (N500/E500) (Figure 4.5). Coordinates for each marker were recorded on-site in a field notebook and added to a master spreadsheet upon return to the ECU campus. The prism pole was set to a standard height of 6ft for the entirety of the survey. All told, the students recorded 168 grave markers, 186 points with the total station, and took approximately 365 photographs. The additional 18 points included grave markers that were missed in the initial recording as well as other features such as family plot boundaries. The photos were downloaded and saved to the ECU Laboratory. While they did miss a few markers, as revealed by the discrepancy between the number of recordings and the total station points, the students were able to record the majority. The remainder were accounted for by the use of online resources and subsequent visits to the site.

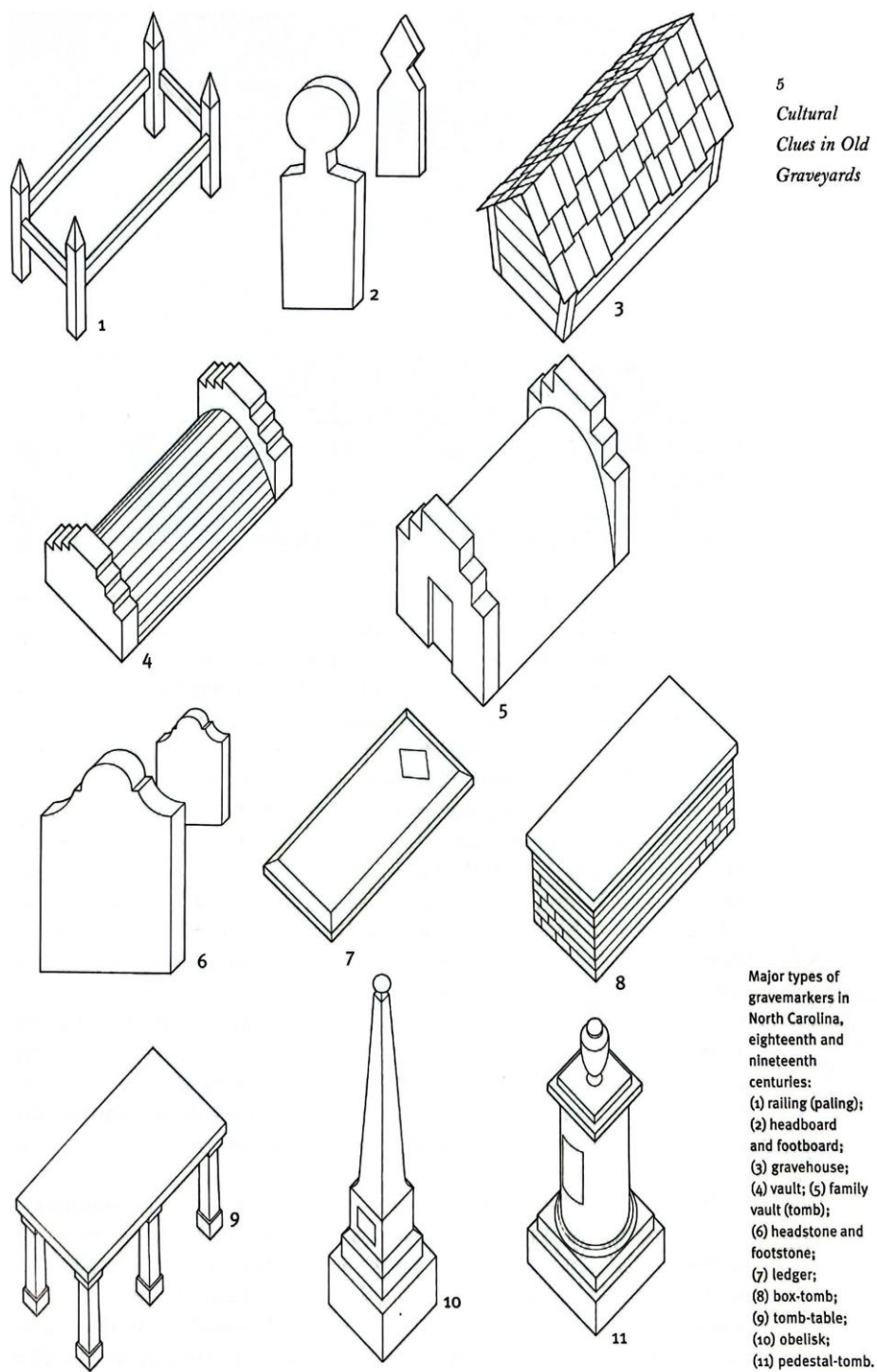


Figure 4.7: Example of common grave markers (Little 1998:5)

For the purpose of analysis and recording, the following terms were used for the various elements encountered. Any upright marker, other than an obelisk, was labeled as a headstone. “Obelisk”, on the other hand, was used for tall, pillar-like markers and were uncommon in any of the surveyed cemeteries. Any small flat marker, regardless of whether it was set on a base or flush with the ground surface, was identified as a plaque (Figure 4.6). In some cases, the category used here as “plaque” can be subdivided to include flat, beveled and slanted varieties. However, for the sake of the continuity of record keeping by multiple students and ease of later analysis, the general term “plaque” was used. Similarly, there are many ways to describe an upright marker, usually in reference to the form of the top of the headstone or other sculptural elements (Allen 2020). As technology has advanced, the variety and individuality of the headstone has also increased. As a result, if each individual style of headstone was given its own designation, analysis of large-scale general trends would be much more difficult. Instead, the general designation “headstone” and “double headstone” were used for this research (Figure 4.7). The exceptions to this rule were heart-shaped headstones (14 identified) and cross-shaped headstones (3 identified) which were each given their own category.

Finally, a decision had to be made regarding the designation of slab versus vault. As will be discussed in more detail in the subsequent section, these two terms were used interchangeably on most of the previously recorded student forms. While “vault,” as a term, can refer to a burial enclosure that is either above or below ground, for the purposes of this study, it was decided that “vault” would be reserved for those enclosures completely above ground. Any flat marker that covered the entirety of the burial and was flush with the ground surface was designated as a “slab”. This naming system ensured as little confusion as possible for the students who were doing the recording, and for later analysis. All forms were numbered in the field, placed into a labeled binder, and transported back to the ECU Archaeology Laboratory at the end of every day.

Laboratory Methods

As no excavations were undertaken as part of the surveys and no artifacts were collected, the laboratory methods for this project exclusively dealt with the data that had been collected in 2020, 2021 and the summer of 2024. The first thing that had to be done was to establish what data were accounted for and what still needed to be recorded. To do this, all marker data sheets from the Ayden African American Ancestral cemetery, the Northeast Ayden Cemetery, and the Princeville Community Cemetery were sorted into binders. Each binder was then assigned a number, for example, PCC 1 would refer to book one of the Princeville Community Cemetery. Due to variations in the number of markers in each cemetery, the number of data sheets in each binder fluctuated from approximately 350 to over 700.

Some of the data had previously been digitized. However, upon further examination, it was determined that the format in which it had been entered into Microsoft Excel would not be helpful for the analysis required by this research. For example, in the previously entered data, dates were entered as one unit without the year separated. This would make it very difficult to

sort the grave markers by the year of the individual's death. Additionally, in many cases, the form and material of the grave marker were listed in the same column, making sorting by either variable impossible. Finally, after spot checking a few of the graves against photos that had been uploaded to the website Find a Grave, an Ancestry.com affiliate where community members can upload grave marker information and photos, it was determined that many of the materials and forms had been incorrectly identified (Find a Grave). Student researchers seemed to have a particular difficulty differentiating between granite and marble as well as marble and composite. Due to these issues, as well as inconsistencies in recording and labeling, it was decided that it would make the most sense to return to the paper records and start data entry from scratch, checking each grave, when possible, against the community uploaded photographs on Find a Grave. While photographs of many of the graves were taken in the field and saved to the ECU Laboratory computer, the quality of the photos on Find a Grave was generally superior and easier to locate due to the site's search bar and organization by individual's name.

The information included in the Excel database created for this project can be sorted into four broad categories: location information, identifying information for the individual, descriptions of the marker, and additional commentary. The location information category includes the cemetery/project name, the book number, the section within the cemetery, the row within the section and the number determined either by order in which it was surveyed or the assigned plot number. The identifying information category includes the first and last names of the individual, their spouse or parents, and their birth and death dates separated by day, month, and year. The description category includes any epitaph or decoration, the material and form of the grave marker, as well as a space for the description of any footstone. It is worth noting that very few graves had footstones and, if they did, many were not recorded on the data sheets.

Finally, the additional commentary category includes a space for photo log numbers, additional comments, notes, the Find a Grave URL, and a space to denote whether or not the Find a Grave page had a photo of the marker.

In order to standardize data entry and to avoid later confusion, a few rules regarding order of recording were employed. If the marker was a multi-material construction the main material was always listed first. For example, if the marker was a concrete slab with a marble plaque set into the surface, that would be recorded as “concrete and marble” for the material and “slab with plaque” for the form. The word “with” was used in the form category in reference to plaques that were set into another material while “and” was used to denote a separate construction. For markers that had more than one form, the following arbitrary hierarchy was employed: Slab, headstone, plaque. However, if the plaque was set into the slab, it would be listed immediately following “slab” in the form category (Table 4.1)

When more than one decoration was listed on a data form, each element was listed in the Excel sheet, separated by a semicolon. In a limited number of cases, more than one grave was recorded on the same data sheet. For these, if the graves were not given separate designations, they were differentiated on the spread sheet using decimals. For example, if two graves were listed as Grave 24, they would be entered as 24.1 and 24.2. Further, in the case of double

headstones or double plaques, the information about the marker was only recorded under one of the individuals to avoid the double counting of any markers in the analysis (Table 4.2)

As mentioned in the *field methodology* section, many students had used the terms “vault” and “slab” interchangeably. Additionally, some forms were missing essential information such as the form or material and other graves were simply described as “marker.” As such, there was a need to standardize the information as the data from the marker sheets was entered into Excel. The terminology mentioned in the previous section regarding marker forms was implemented based on the verification of the form using photos from Find a Grave. The listed material was also verified and corrected when necessary. As the data were entered, any entries with questions that could not be answered either through the previously recorded information or Find a Grave were highlighted according to the issue (Figure 4.7).

While the data entry for the historic African American cemeteries was being completed, a few undergraduate and graduate volunteers assisted with the data entry for the Ayden Town Cemetery, using the same formatting listed above. Once all the data from the 4AC, the Northeast Ayden Cemetery, the Princeville Community Cemetery and the Wilson Cemetery had been entered, it was cleaned, and any spelling or formatting errors were corrected. Then, a new Excel

spreadsheet was created that was divided into two sheets: one for Ayden and one for Princeville so that analysis comparing the two town's burial patterns could begin without risking the raw data.

With the addition of the 168 grave markers recorded during the summer of 2024 and the additional 52 markers identified from findagrave, the data set of markers from the historically African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville exceeded 3,000. However, as will be discussed in the subsequent chapter, approximately 500 markers were deemed unsuitable for the research and discounted. In addition to the markers from the historically African American cemeteries, a sample size of 673 markers was obtained from the historically white Ayden Town Cemetery. This sample was selected based on the availability of previously entered data and the amount that was able to be proofed prior to analysis. The subsequent analysis of the data collected focused on four variables related to marker construction and design: form, material, epitaph, and decoration.

CHAPTER 5: RESULTS

Introduction:

During the course of this research, data from 3,017 burials were entered and analyzed. Of these, 2,469 were included in this research. The roughly 500 gravemarkers that were not included were primarily unmarked graves, markers dating to 2020 and after, markers that were illegible or markers that were not able to be verified. While there were markers recorded during the process of data gathering that dated between 2020-2024, the decision was made to exclude these markers due to the desire for even twenty-year periods. Additionally, there were relatively few graves that dated to this period, only 21 graves total across both towns.

The 2,469 graves include 210 from the Wilson Cemetery, 864 from the Princeville Community Cemetery, 59 from the Ayden African American Ancestral Cemetery and 1,336 from the Northeast Ayden Cemetery. While data from the cemeteries were all compiled and calculated separately, most analysis was completed by combining the Wilson Cemetery (WC) and the Princeville Community Cemetery (PCC) and comparing those 1,074 graves with the 1,395 in the Ayden African American Ancestral Cemetery (4AC) and the Northeast Ayden Cemetery (NEAC). Analyses were completed examining four different aspects of gravemarker construction and design: form, material, epitaph, and decoration. For each variable, the markers were further subdivided into seven 20-year periods covering the span of the cemeteries' usage. These periods were: 1880-1899, 1900-1919, 1920-1939, 1940-1959, 1960-1979, 1980-1999, 2000-2019 (Table 5.1).

To keep the results organized, each variable has been given its own sub-section in this chapter. In each sub-section, the results are further divided according to location, with Princeville's results presented first, followed by the results from Ayden.

Form:

Princeville

The total assemblage of gravemarkers in Princeville represented 21 unique forms or combinations of forms. This included the three most common forms in southern African American cemeteries: the slab, the headstone and the plaque (Little 1998:239–250). This also included several markers which had a combination of these forms and some that did not include any of these forms. Approximately 7% of the markers were classified as “funeral home tags” which are usually metal tags featuring the name, birth and death year. These are left by a funeral home as a placeholder for a future permanent marker. Other notable forms included the obelisk, approximately 1% of the assemblage, several shaped headstones, such as heart or cross-shaped, (.2%), an urn set into a concrete base (.09%), and an engraved hexagonal garden paver (.09%). It is also notable to consider the absence of certain forms in Princeville. For example, there were no fully above-ground vaults, large communal burial structures, or mausoleums identified in this research.

The most common form present in the Princeville cemeteries is the single headstone, representing an individual burial. This accounted for 27.09% of all graves. However, when the two Princeville cemeteries are analyzed separately, it is worth noting that the most common form in the Princeville Community Cemetery is a slab, while headstones represent 47.14% of all graves in the Wilson Cemetery (Table 5.2). This is likely due to the much earlier use of the Wilson Cemetery. In both Ayden and Princeville, the slab did not become a popular form of grave marker until the 1940s and 1950s, reaching the height of its popularity in the 1970s and 1980s. This will be discussed in more detail in subsequent sections.

For the first series of analyses, each form and combination of forms was treated as a unique style. This ensured that no grave marker would be counted more than once and that all future, simplified analyses would be drawn from a complete and correct list. To further prevent duplication of entries, any double marker was only counted for one of the individuals referenced

on the marker. Otherwise, each shared headstone, vault or slab would have been counted twice, artificially inflating the total count and percentage.

While there were 21 unique form combinations identified in the Princeville cemeteries, only 10 of these forms represented more than 1% of the total assemblage. For analysis of the pattern of form usage, the following form combinations were excluded as they each represented less than 1% of the total: cinderblock, cross-shaped headstone, double headstone and plaque, footstone, headstone and plaque, heart-shaped headstone, hexagonal paver, slab and double headstone, slab and marker, slab with plaque and headstone, and urn in concrete. These 11 forms accounted for less than four percent of the total assemblage. Of the 10 most common form combinations, only four represented more than 10% of the markers: headstone, slab, plaque, and slab with plaque (meaning a slab with a plaque set into the concrete) (Chart 5.1).

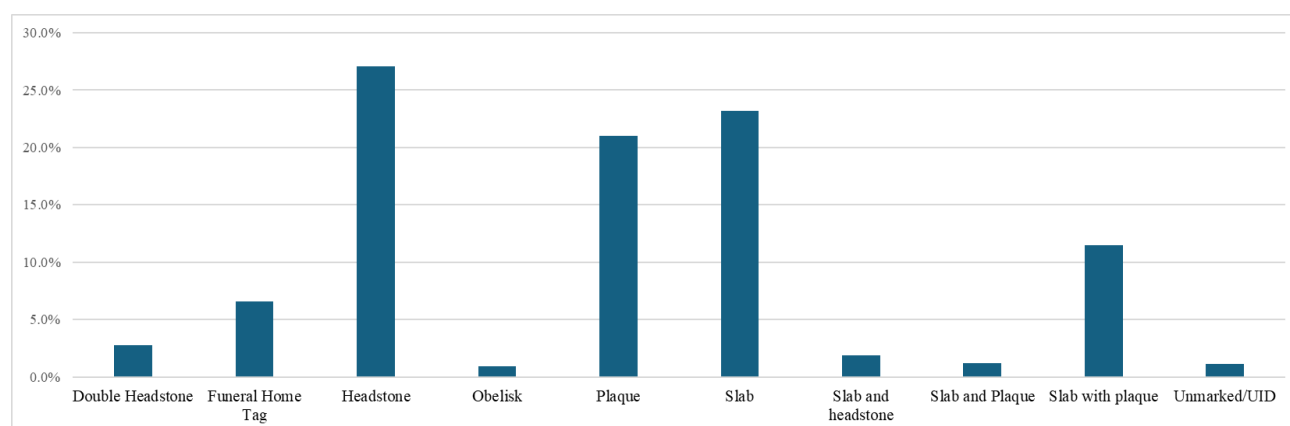


Chart 5.1: Chart of forms that represent over 1% of the assemblage in Princeville

While it was interesting to see the distribution of all 21 form options, there was so much overlap between the varieties that it was difficult to truly see the distribution of the common types. Therefore, a simplified system of categorization was implemented based on the three most common forms across all four cemeteries: slab, headstone and plaque. To prevent double counting of any gravemarker, only those markers that were composed of one type of form were included in this portion of this analysis. For Princeville, this meant that 922 grave markers were

analyzed while 152 grave markers were excluded. Slabs that included plaques set into the concrete were included in the slab category and were not listed in the plaque category.

While it was clear from the initial analysis that headstones, plaques and slabs were the most commonly used forms in the Princeville cemeteries, narrowing the focus to these three forms reveals the trends of preference throughout time. In Princeville, the headstone dominated as the most common form between 1880 and 1939. It was the only type recorded as dating between 1880 and 1899, and the only one of the three main forms recorded until 1920. The headstone, though it continually declined in popularity throughout the 20th century, experienced a resurgence in popularity beginning at the turn of the 21st century. Similarly, though the plaque has fluctuated in popularity since it first appeared between 1920-1940, it too has been increasing in popularity. By the beginning of the 21st century it was almost as common as the headstone, approximately 42% as compared to 45% (Chart 5.2).

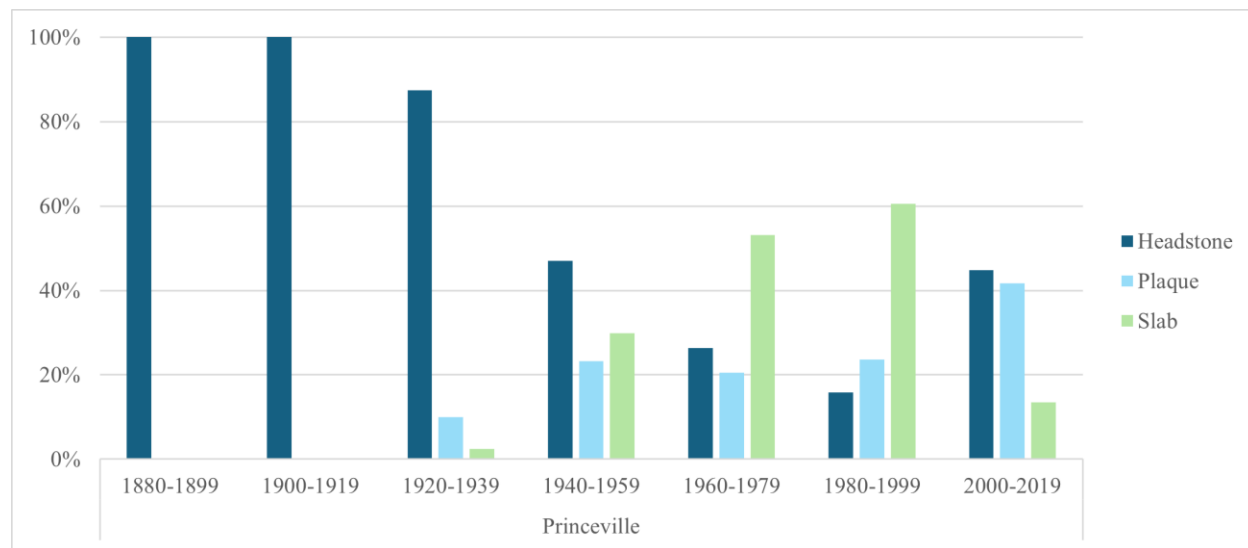


Chart 5.2: Chart illustrating the three most common marker forms over time in Princeville

Perhaps the most interesting phenomenon was the relatively short-lived popularity of the slab. While the concrete slab has often been considered ubiquitous to the southern African American cemetery, indeed being called by some researchers “the most basic feature of the

African-American burial pattern in the south” (Brown 2019:31), it represents the most used form in Princeville for only 40 years, between 1960-1999. At the turn of the 21st century there was a steep and sudden decline in the popularity of the slab, dropping from over 60% to only 13% (Chart 5.3). While the slab itself represents a substantial proportion of the gravemarkers in Princeville, it is also worthwhile to consider variation in the type of slab, namely slabs with inset plaques and slabs without. While the percentages are not vastly different, there is a higher proportion of slabs without plaques in Princeville (62% of all graves with slabs) when compared to those with inset plaques (38%).

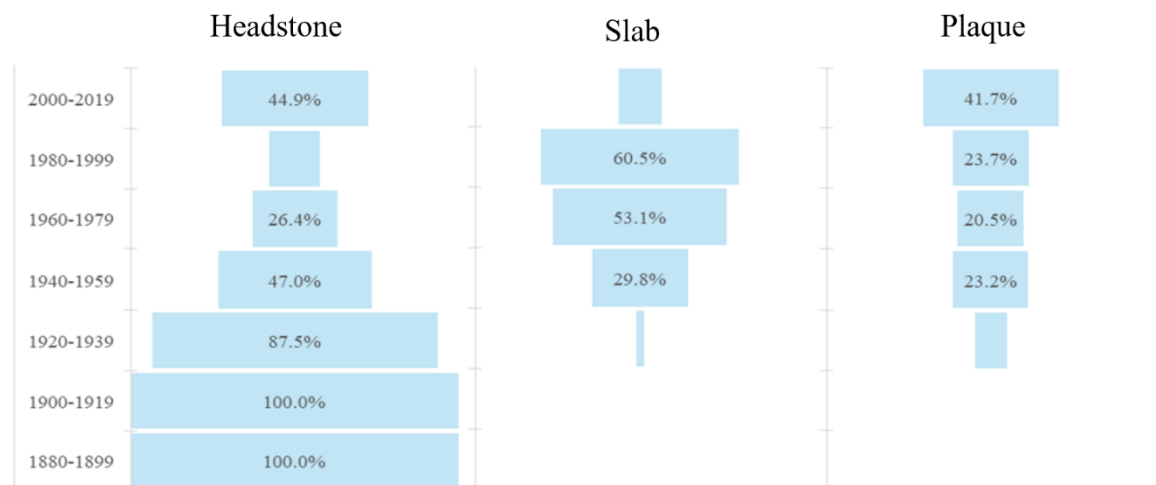


Chart 5.3: Funnel chart showing the comparative distribution over time of headstone, slab and plaque usage in Princeville

Ayden

In total, 28 forms, or combinations of forms, were recorded in Ayden. This included many of the same styles as Princeville, such as obelisks (.14%) and shaped headstones (approximately 1%). However, unlike Princeville, there were three single above-ground vaults and six double above-ground vaults identified in the Ayden cemeteries, representing just under 1% of the total assemblage. Similarly to the results seen in Princeville, there is a predominance in Ayden of the main three grave marker forms: the slab, the plaque and the headstone. However, unlike the

Princeville cemeteries, the most popular form in the total assemblage is the slab, which represents over 50% of all gravemarkers. Like Princeville, this could be due to the relatively small number of pre-1950s graves as there were only 59 graves included from the 4AC. If the 4AC is examined on its own, headstones are the most popular, representing 75% of the markers (Table 5.3). As with the Princeville results, the percentages were further broken down by 20-year period.

Of the 28 unique forms or combinations of forms that were identified among the markers in Ayden, only 10 represented more than 1% of the total assemblage. The other 18 types only accounted for 4% of all gravemarkers and were therefore discounted for most analyses. The remaining 96% is dominated by the slab with an inset plaque. The plaque, as an individual form, represents the second most

popular construction and, of the three, the headstone is the least popular, a reversal of what was seen in the total assemblage at Princeville (Chart 5.4).

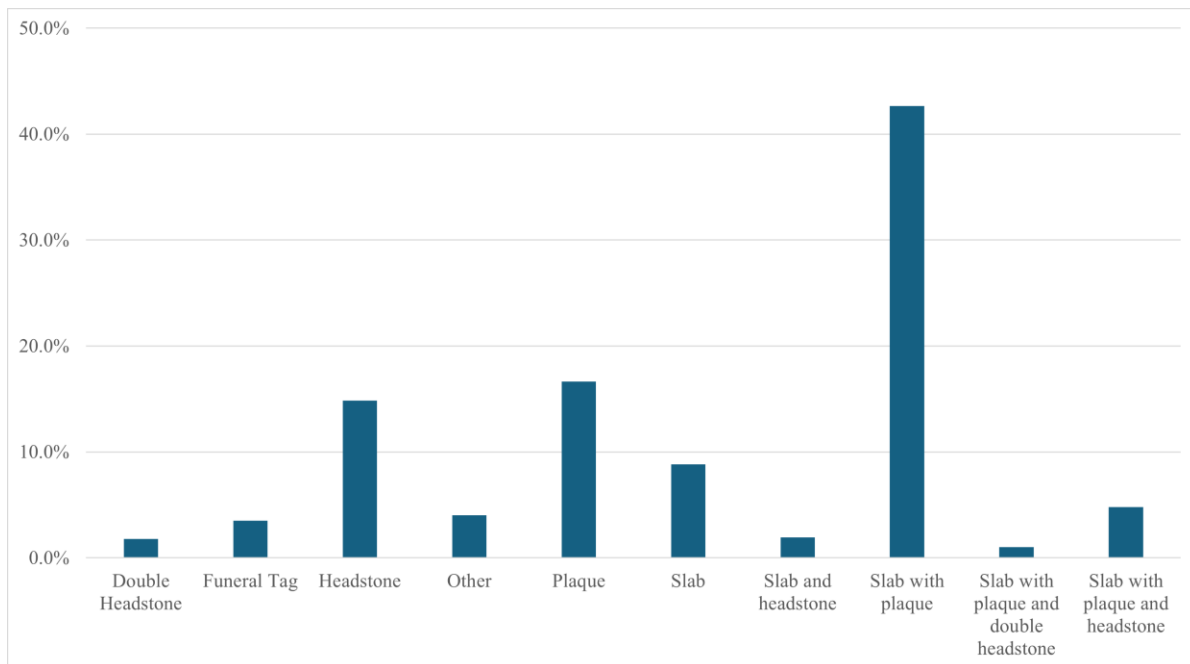


Chart 5.4: Chart showing the ten most popular forms in Ayden

As with the results from Princeville, a simplified categorization was necessary to truly illustrate the trends of preference between the three most popular forms. Only those markers that consisted of a singular form were included to prevent the double counting of any marker, and any marker that fell into the category of “other” was not included. This led to a sample size of 1,197 graves from Ayden and the exclusion of a total of 198 graves. While there were no marked graves in either Ayden cemetery that dated from before the 20th century, it is clear that, like in the Princeville cemeteries, the headstone was the marker of choice in the early half of the 20th century. The headstone represented 100% of the total assemblage between 1900-1919 and nearly 95% of the total markers between 1920-1939. However, again like Princeville, the headstone began to decline in popularity around the 1940s, coinciding with the introduction of the slab. However, unlike in Princeville, the rise and fall of the popularity of the slab is much more

dramatic. The slab represents approximately 50% of the grave markers between 1940-1959, jumps to over 90% between 1960-1979, drops slightly to approximately 80% between 1980-1999 and then plummets after the turn of 21st century to under 5% of the total graves dating to 2000-2019 (Chart 5.5).

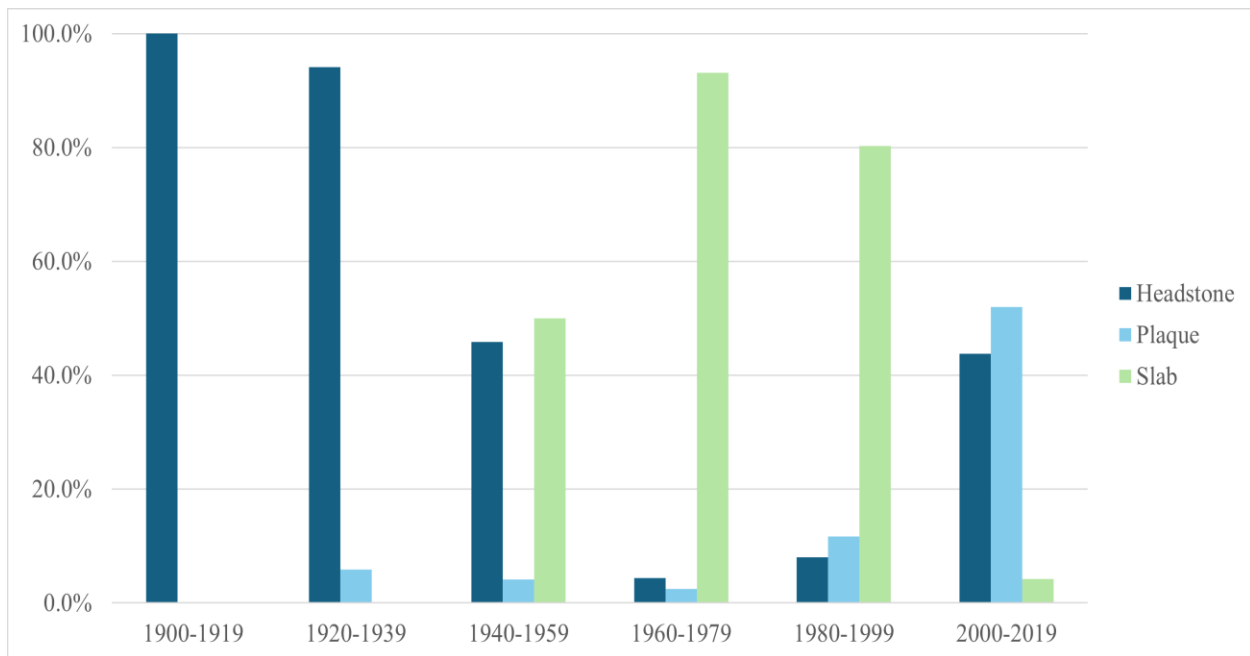


Chart 5.5: Chart showing the three most common marker forms in Ayden over time

When it comes to the popularity of plaque-style gravemarkers in Ayden, the increase in popularity in the first 20 years of the 21st century is, again, dramatic. The plaque remained relatively unused in the 20th century in Ayden when compared to the slab and headstone, and in fact, declined in popularity after a height of 5.9% between 1920-1939. It did not exceed 5% again until 1980-1999 when it reached 11.7%. The following 20-year period, between 2000-2019, it jumped to 52% of the assemblage of the three most common forms, exceeding the use of headstones, even as the headstone was experiencing a similar rise in popularity. The headstone, which was the predominate form in the first half of the 20th century, began to decline in popularity between 1940-1959. It made up only 4.4% of the simplified assemblage between

1960-1979 and 8% between 1980-1999. However, like the plaque, it experienced a rise in popularity at the turn of the 21st century, climbing to 43.8% (Chart 5.6).

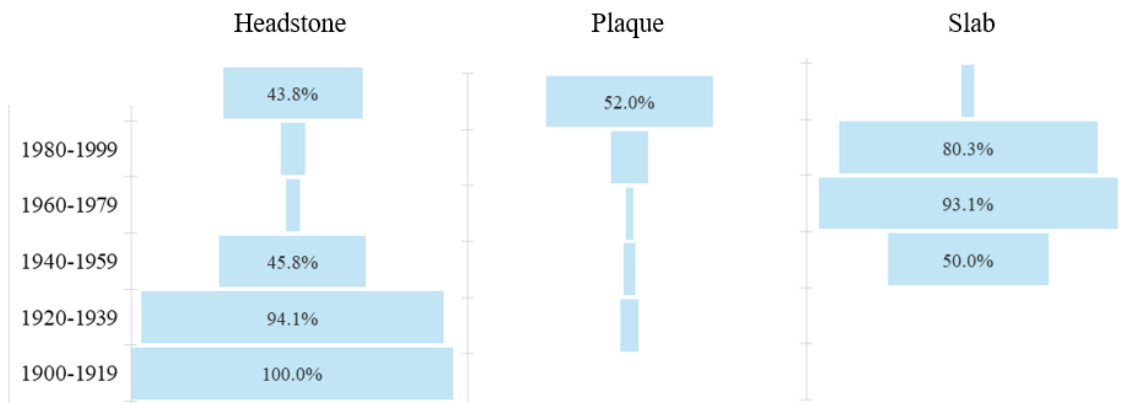


Chart 5.6: Chart showing the comparative distribution over time of the headstone, slab and plaque in Ayden

Material:

Princeville

The markers in Princeville included 19 unique materials or combinations of materials. While most of the markers were made, at least partially, of either concrete, marble or granite, there were also markers made of bronze (.19%), other metals (6.89%), plastic (.09%), composite (.19%) and even terrazzo (.19%), which is a decorative form of mosaic concrete more often used in flooring than in gravemarker construction (USGSA 2016). While approximately 55% of the markers in the Princeville cemeteries are what this analysis refers to as multi-material constructions, it is worth noting that in all but five cases, these multi-material constructions included concrete as at least one of the components (Table 5.4). Approximately 46% of all markers in Princeville included concrete as part of their construction. This preference for concrete as the base material and the inclusion of secondary materials will be discussed more fully in the following chapter.

For clarity of analysis, and since 12 of the 19 material combinations represent less than 1% of the assemblage, the data set was simplified and each marker was placed into one of five categories: concrete, marble, granite, multiple, and other. For the purposes of this analysis, only single-material constructions were placed into the specific material categories while all other forms were placed into the “multiple” category. While many of the materials fluctuated in popularity throughout the years, there are some materials that followed a distinct pattern. As seen in figure 5.11, marble, after it reached its height of 76% between 1900-1919, experienced a steady decline in use. By 1980-1999, marble represented only 4.1% and 3.8% between 2000-2019. Granite, which first appeared between 1920-1939, remained approximately 25% of the assemblage throughout the rest of the 20th century. However, at the turn of the 21st century, it rose sharply to 56% of the total from that period. While concrete remained a fairly consistent single material in Princeville through the end of the 20th century, it had fallen out of favor by the most recent 20-year period to only approximately 2% of the total assemblage. These percentages, and patterns, only consider constructions where concrete is the sole material used (Chart 5.7).

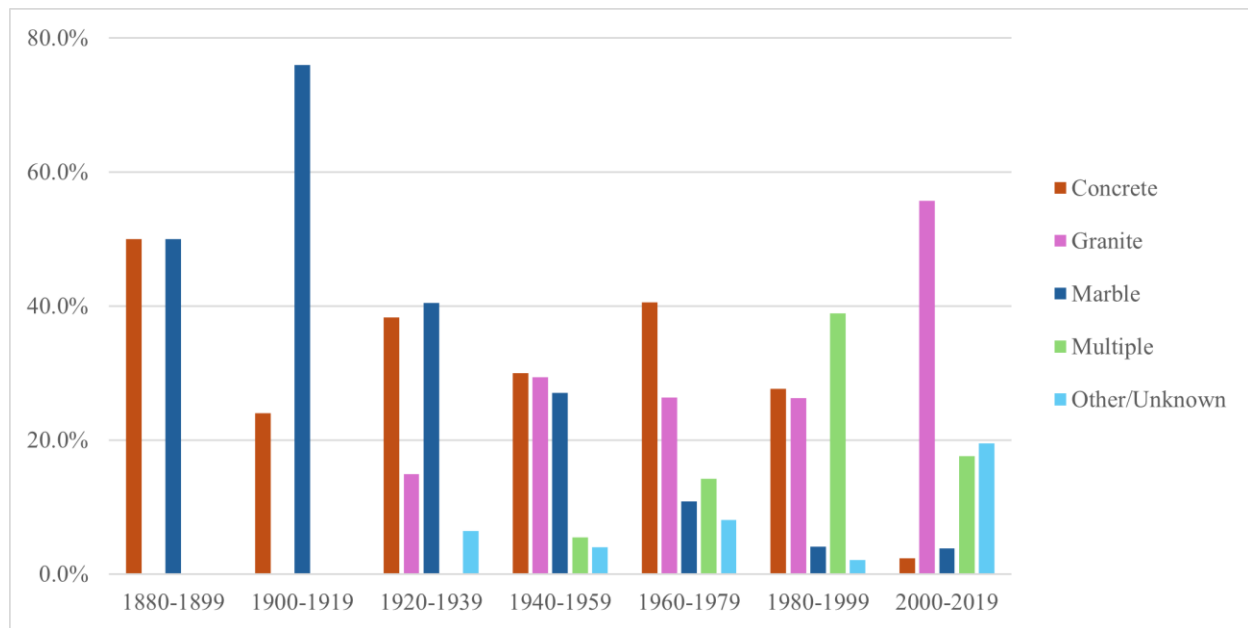


Chart 5.7: Chart showing material usage in Princeville over time

It is interesting to note that, unlike marble, which experienced a steady, even decline that forms an almost perfect funnel shape, concrete and granite experienced fluctuations in popularity. In fact, concrete, as a sole construction material appears to have alternated in its popularity every 20 years. As both marble and concrete declined in popularity, granite, as has been the case in many cemeteries around the turn of the 21st century, became more prevalent (Little 1998) (Chart 5.8).

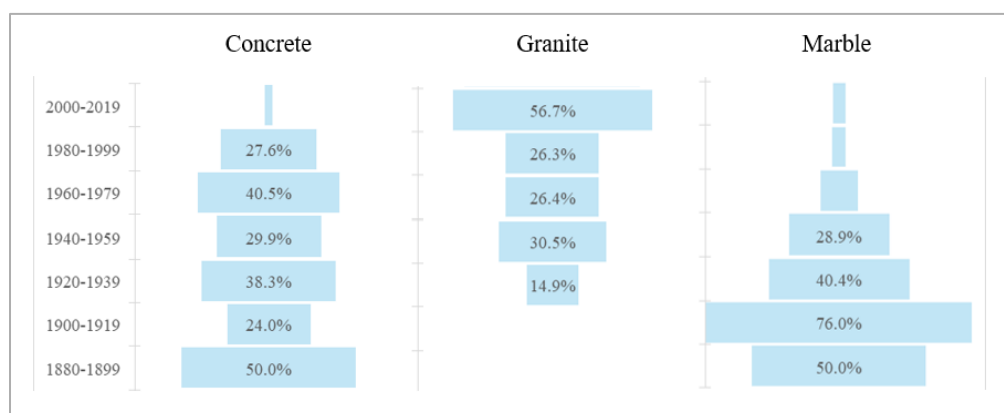


Chart 5.8: Chart showing the comparative popularity between concrete, granite, and marble in Princeville

A different pattern emerges when all markers that use concrete in any capacity are included. As shown in Chart 5.9, though concrete as a component fell in popularity between

1880-1899 and 1900-1919, it steadily rose in popularity until the turn of the 21st century when it crested at 65% before falling below 20% between 2000-2019. This most recent 20-year period appears to be when concrete was at its least popular since the construction of the two Princeville cemeteries. However, it has remained a significant construction material in the 21st century.

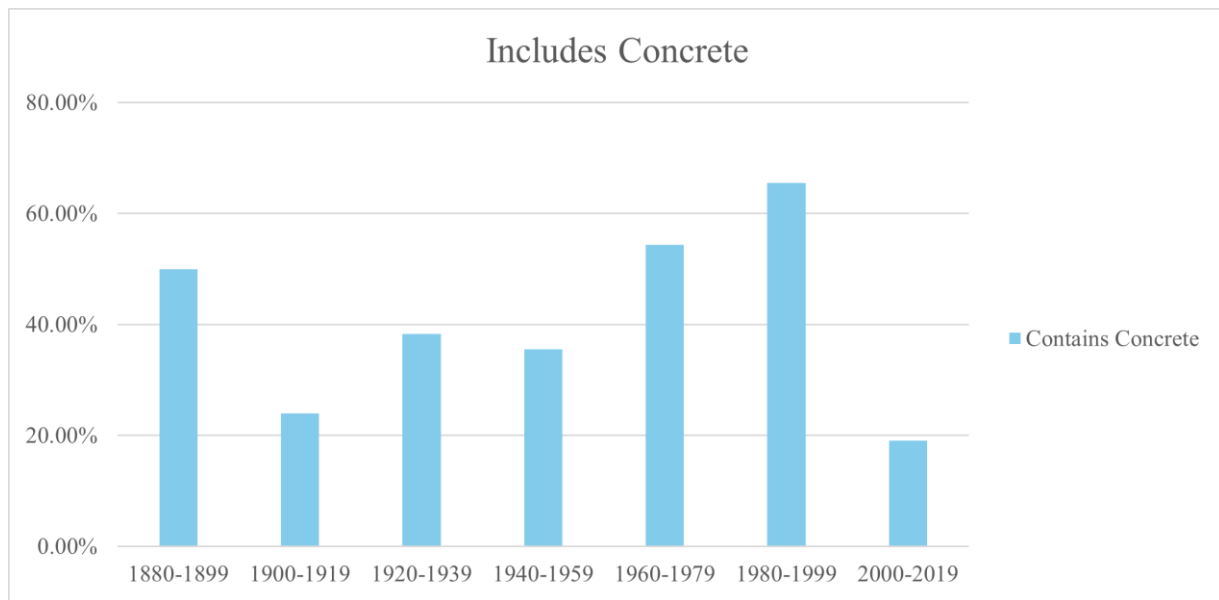


Chart 5.9: Chart showing the popularity of concrete as a material in Princeville

One of the most interesting, and short lived, materials used in both towns' cemeteries was a plastic composite, which experienced brief popularity primarily between 1980-1999.

Composite first appeared as a material for inset plaque on markers dated between 1940-1959, however, it represented only 1.4% of the markers that contained concrete from that period.

Composite increased slightly to 2.4% between 1960-1979, before jumping to 30.7% between 1980-1999. While its use declined again after the turn of the 21st century, it remained at 7.5% (Chart 5.10).

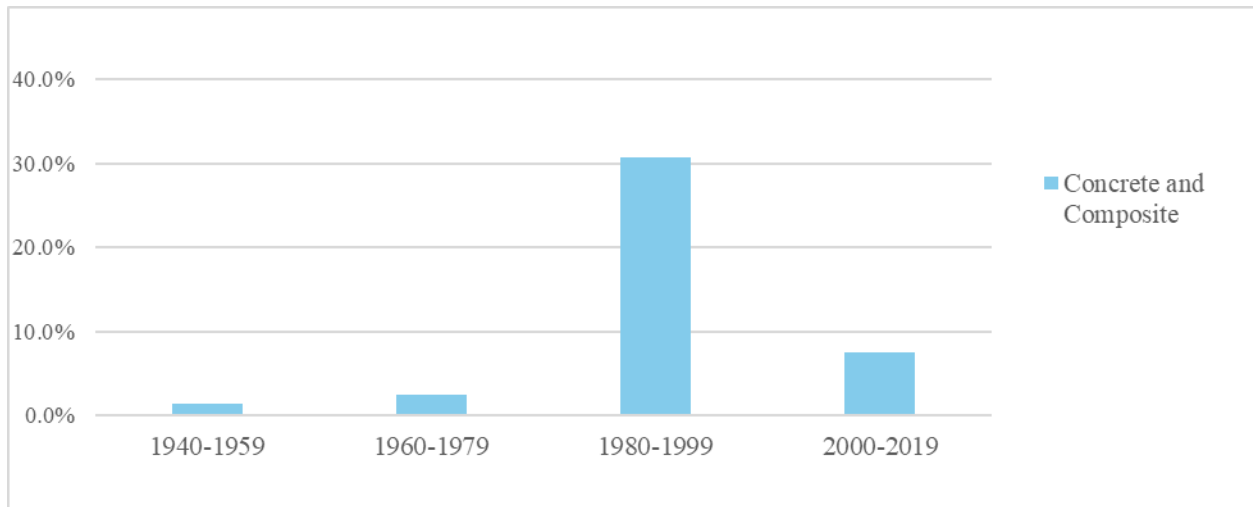


Chart 5.10: Chart showing the percentage of concrete markers that also included composite

Another variable that was analyzed was the preference for single-material constructions as opposed to markers that were made of two or more materials. The overwhelming majority of all graves in Princeville were constructed using a single material. No markers that were multi-material constructions were used in Princeville until the period between 1940-1959. Multi-material construction was at its most popular between 1980-1999 when it rose to almost 40%. However, it fell again below 20% after the turn of the 21st century. In total, multi-material constructions accounted for approximately 21% of the total markers in Princeville over the 120-year period analyzed (Chart 5.11).

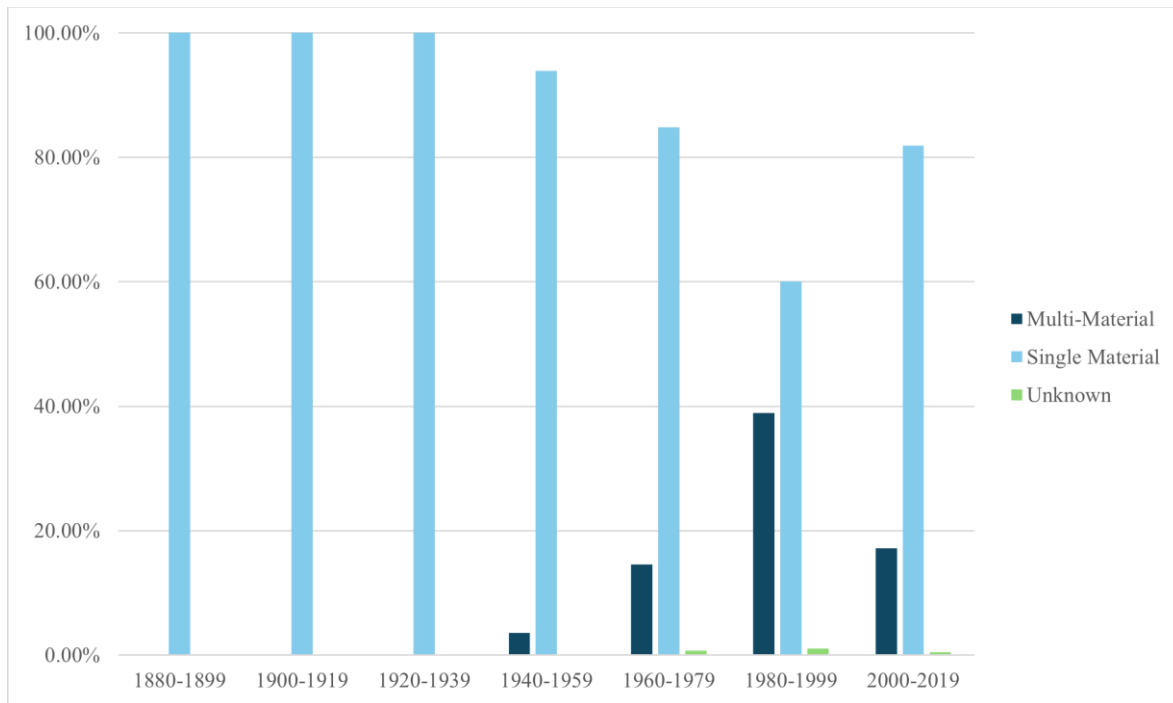


Chart 5.11: Chart showing multi-material vs single material construction in Princeville

Ayden

The assemblage from Ayden included 22 unique materials or combinations of materials. As was seen with the Princeville assemblage, the most popular materials by far were concrete, granite, and marble. However, the Ayden cemeteries also included markers made of brass (.07%), bronze (.21%), glass (.07%), plastic (.07%) and other metals (3.5%). The most popular material in Ayden was granite at 26.38% of the assemblage. This was followed by a combination of concrete and marble, at 24.8% then a combination of concrete and composite at 19.86%. However, if all markers that used concrete as a material are considered, concrete dominates the assemblage at 62.8% of all markers. Additionally, approximately half of the markers were multi-material constructions, and all but 8 of those markers included concrete as at least one component (Table 5.5).

Of the 22 material combinations, only 7 represented more than 2% of the total assemblage. Because of this, and to aid in future comparative discussions of the two towns, the material classifications were simplified and sorted into five categories: concrete, granite, marble, multiple, and other/unknown. As with the Princeville assemblage, only single-material constructions were included in the specific material categories while all other markers were placed in the “multiple” category. Although marble slightly increased in popularity over the most recent 20-year period, rising to 6.4%, it otherwise declined steadily from a high of 57.9% between 1900-1919 to a low of 2.6% between 1980-1999. While the use of granite was first observed between 1920-1939, it rose from 10.5% to 13.8% by 1959. It then fell between 1960-1979 before experiencing a sharp increase in popularity to 72.9% between 2000-2019. Concrete, as a single material, remained relatively constant through the first half of the 20th century. However, between 1960-1979, it began to decline in popularity, dropping to 3.3% between 1980-1999 before disappearing altogether after the turn of the 21st century (Charts 5.12 and 5.13).

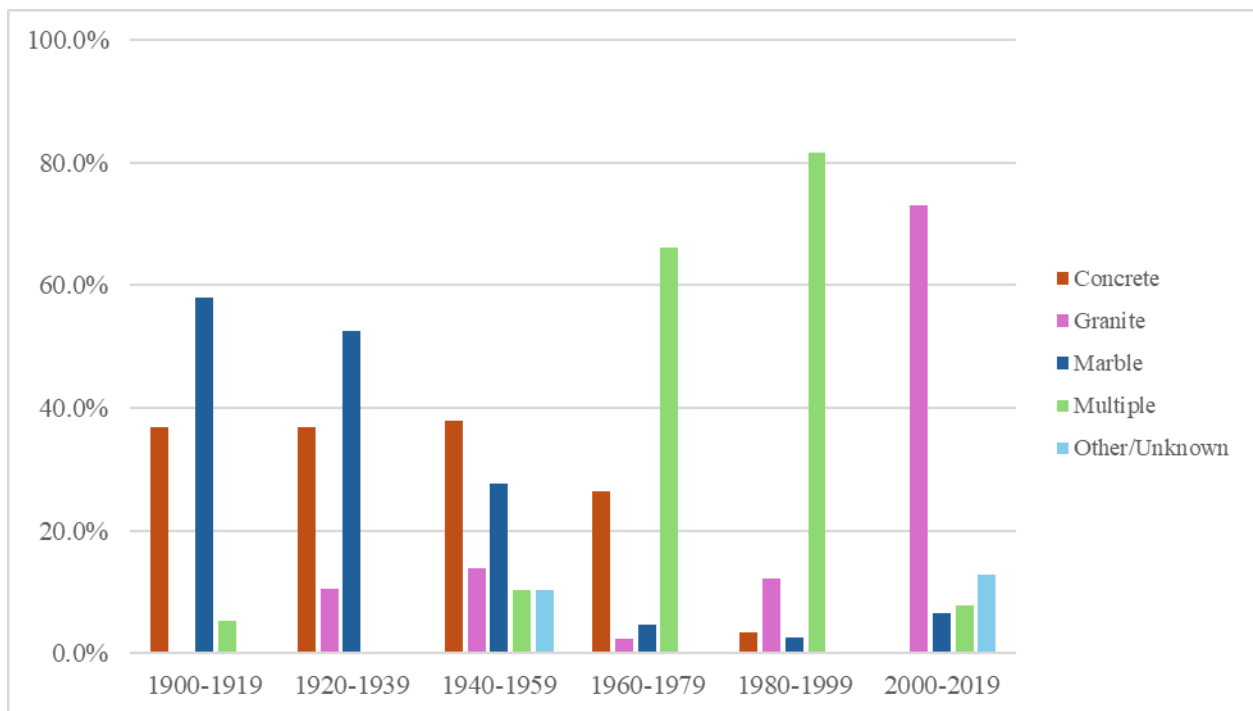


Chart 5.12: Chart showing material usage over time in Ayden

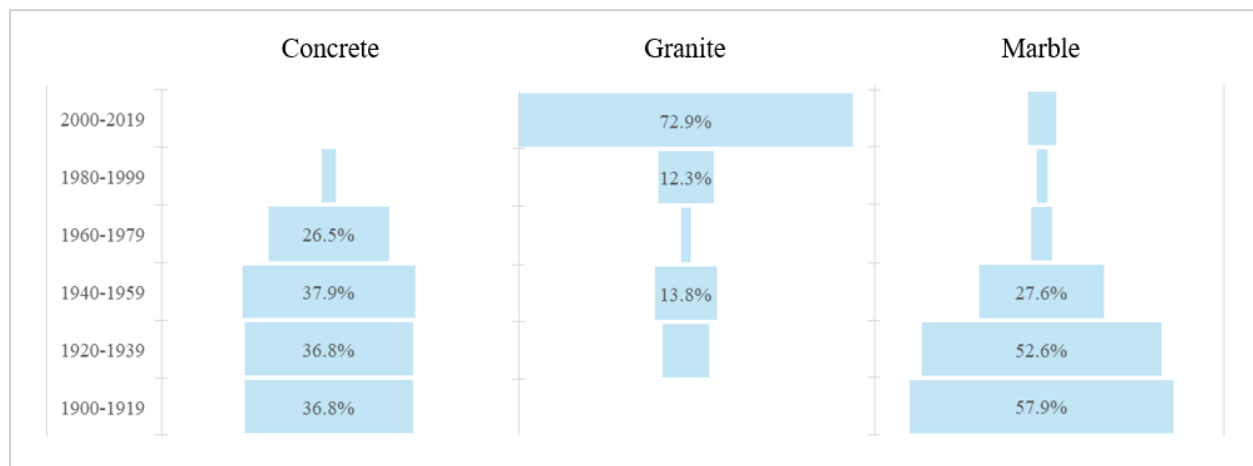


Chart 5.13: Funnel chart showing the comparative popularities of concrete, marble and granite in Ayden as a single material

While these single-material trends do show the changing preference for grave markers in Ayden, they reveal only part of the story. More so than Princeville, the Ayden cemeteries reveal a preference for multi-material construction for markers. If only these single-material constructions were taken into account, it would appear that concrete was never a priority component for grave marker construction in Ayden. However, that is far from true. In total,

across the 120-year period surveyed, 62.8% of all graves in the two Ayden cemeteries contained concrete as at least one component of construction. While the proportion of markers containing concrete stayed relatively steady between 1900-1959, between 36 and 48%, this jumped sharply between 1960-1979 when 92.43% of the markers included concrete. This number stayed high in 1980-1999, decreasing slightly to 84.74% before plummeting to 5.67% after the turn of the 21st century. Most of these markers which included concrete were multi-material constructions featuring either a slab and a separate headstone or a slab with an inset plaque (Chart 5.14).

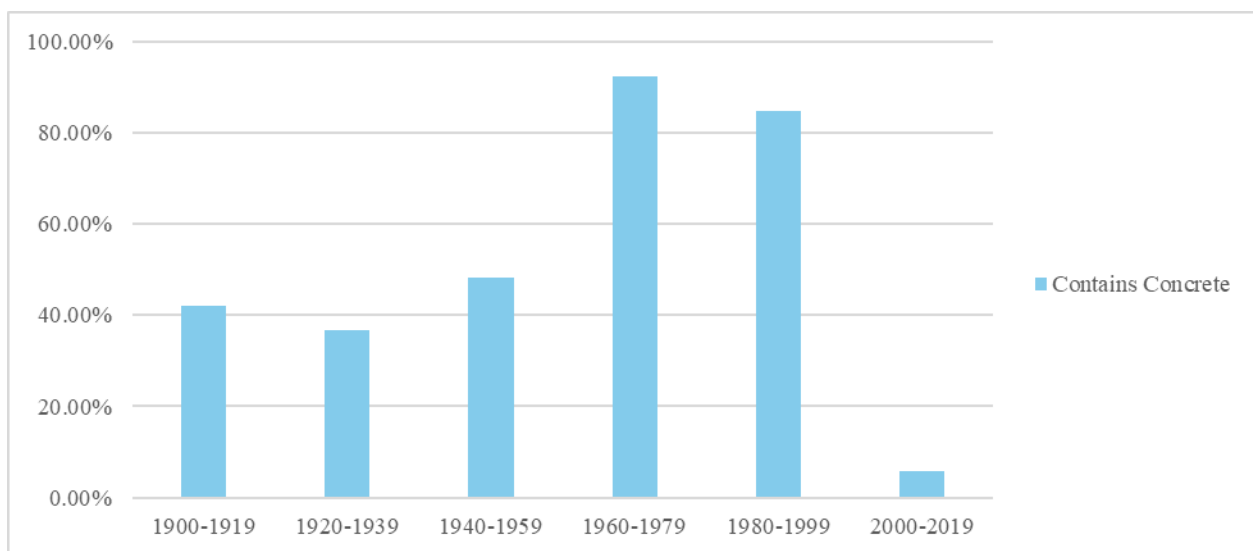


Chart 5.14: Chart showing percentage of markers including concrete in Ayden

As with the Princeville assemblage, composite represented a unique and short-lived trend in Ayden. In fact, composite's popularity was even more dramatic in Ayden than in Princeville though its subsequent decline was slightly less dramatic. However, the proportion of composite use from 2000-2019 is somewhat misleading. As in Princeville, composite first appeared as a material for inset plaques in Ayden between 1940-1959. It represented 7.1% of the markers that included concrete during that period. That percentage fell to 2.9% in the following 20-year period before jumping to 61.1% of the markers that included concrete between 1980-1999. This percentage then fell to 18.2% after the turn of the century. It must be stated here that, while this

does still represent a significant percentage of the markers that included concrete between 2000-2019, this only represents 4 markers, or .7% of all markers for that 20-year period. After the turn of the 21st century in Ayden, only 18 markers included concrete (Chart 5.15).

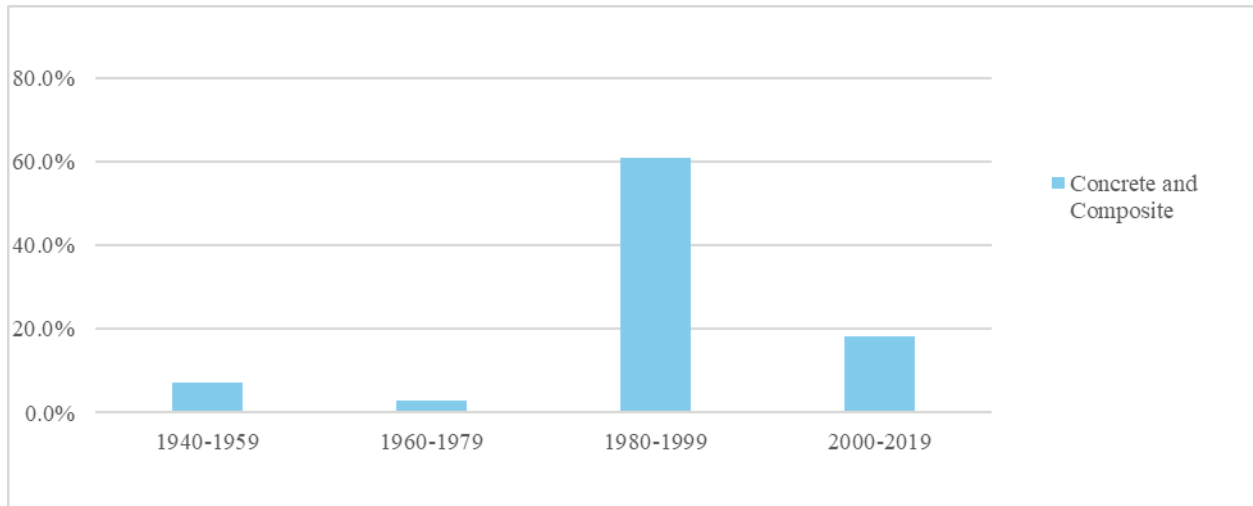


Chart 5.15: Chart showing the percentage of concrete markers that also included composite in Ayden

The final variable analyzed in regard to material composition in Ayden was the preferences for multi-material versus single-material construction. As with Princeville's assemblage, the first half of the 20th century showed an overwhelming preference for single-material construction, although multi-material constructions did make up 5.26% of the markers between 1900-1919 and 10.34% of the markers between 1940-1959. However, this changed rather abruptly between 1960-1979. During this 20-year period, multi-material construction accounted for 66.22% of all markers. This preference strengthened even more in the following period, jumping to 81.58% between 1980-1999. The turn of the 21st century saw the return of the overwhelming preference for single-material constructions with only 7.73% of markers being multi-material, the lowest proportion since 1940 (Chart 5.16).

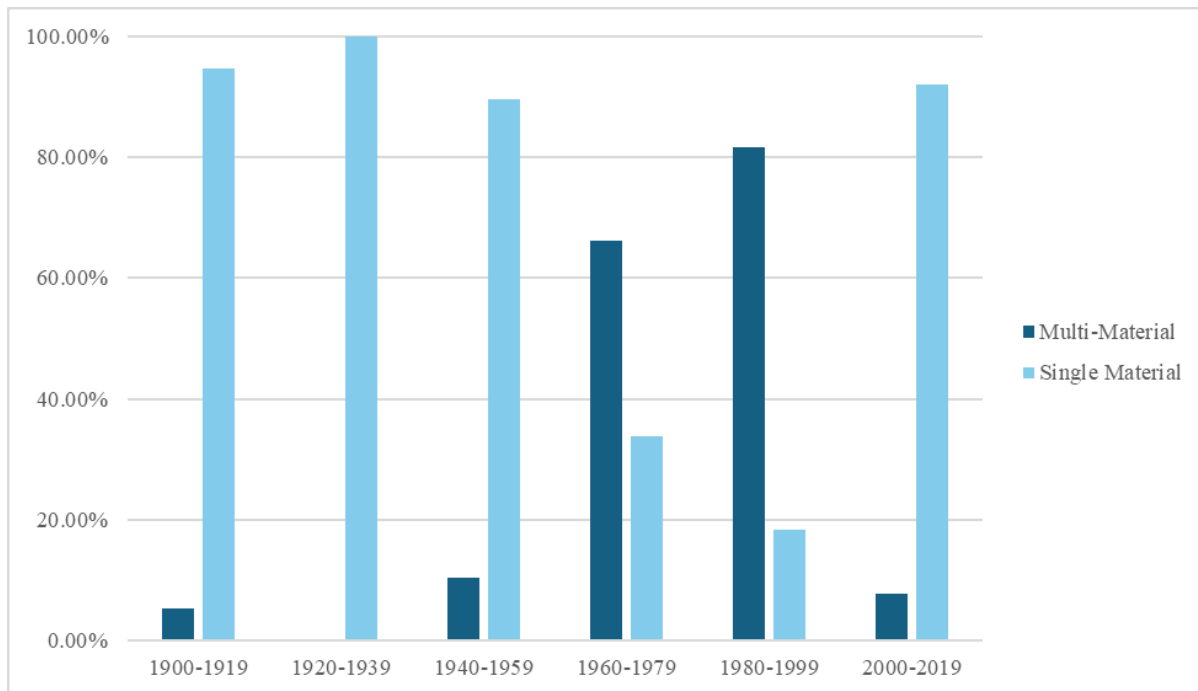


Chart 5.16: Chart showing multi-material and single material construction in Ayden

Epitaph:

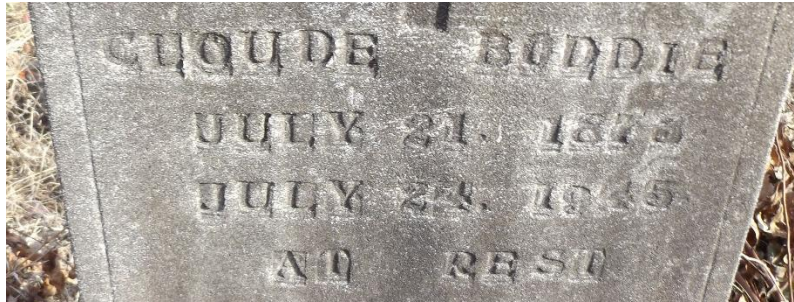


Figure 5.1: Example of "at rest" epitaph (findagrave.com)

Most of the earliest epitaphs observed in both Princeville and Ayden were fairly standard. Often, they referenced eternal life either directly “God’s finger touched him and he slept” or indirectly through epitaphs such as “at rest.” Others, especially those on military issued markers, referenced an individual’s military rank or achievement. Still others referenced the individual’s family such as “dear Mother” or “Loving son and brother.” As grave markers became more customizable towards the end of the 20th century. This led to the creation of unique and highly personal epitaphs. Some examples include “may the work I’ve done speak for me,” “Professor,” “Country Boy,” and (this researcher’s favorite) “Shorty, your silence was golden” (Figures 5.1-5.4).

Princeville

Of all graves recorded in the two Princeville cemeteries, 31.28% included some sort of epitaph. For the purposes of this research, an epitaph was defined as any additional text beyond birth and death date, excluding a funeral home name. During the last 20 years of the 19th century and the first half of the 20th century, the majority of markers included an epitaph of some sort. In fact, between 1900-1919, over 80% of the markers included an epitaph. However, after 1940, the popularity of the epitaph began to wane. Between 1940-1949 34.52% of markers included an epitaph. This proportion fell further between 1960-1979, dropping to 26.35% and again between 1980-1999 when it fell to its lowest, at 16.04%. However, likely in conjunction with the increase

in popularity of granite markers, after the turn of the 21st century epitaphs rose in popularity to 41.43% (Chart 5.17).

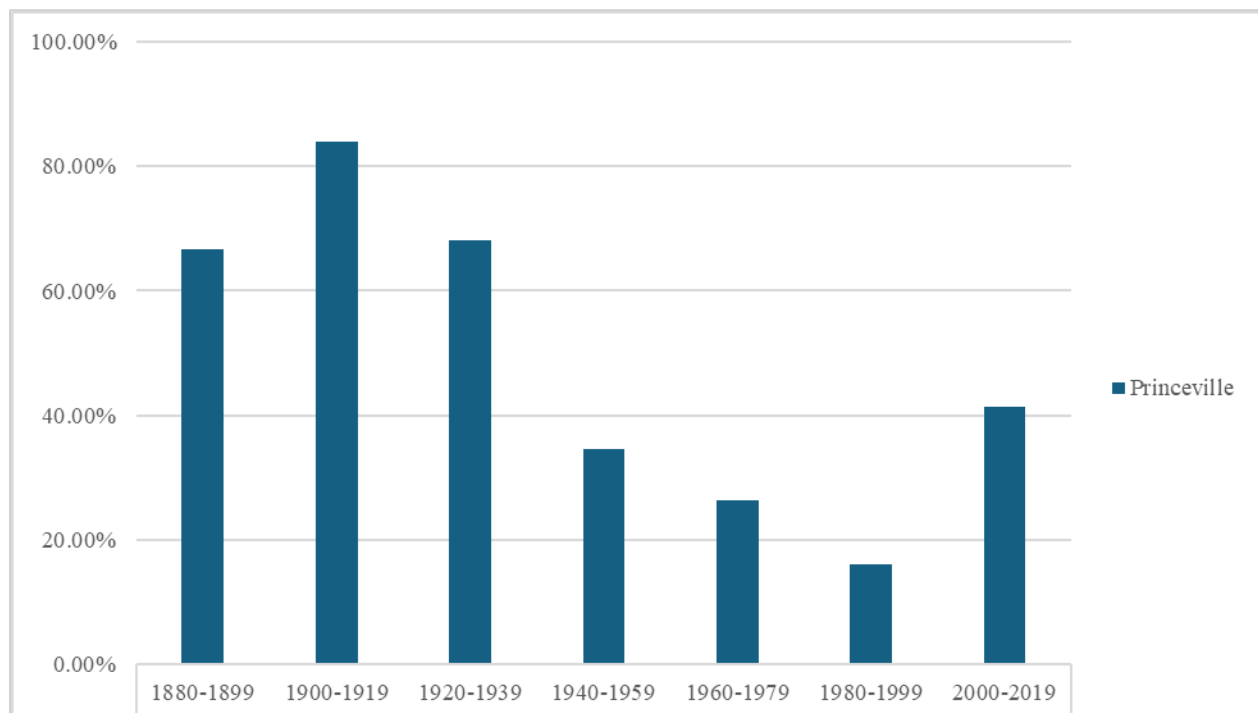


Chart 5.17: Chart showing epitaph inclusion over time in Princeville

Ayden

Almost identical to what was seen in Princeville, 32.47% of the markers in Ayden included some sort of epitaph. Also, like Princeville, most of the markers dated before 1940 included an epitaph. However, while the patterns seen in both towns are very similar, the percentages in each 20-year period do differ significantly. Epitaphs were recorded on 52.63% of the markers between 1900-1919. This proportion increased to 78.95% between 1920-1939 before dropping to 34.48% between 1940-1959. This decline in popularity continued and the percentage fell again to 16.49% between 1960-1979. During the last two decades of the 20th century epitaphs began to slowly increase in popularity, rising to 19.47%. After the turn of the 21st century, the popularity of epitaphs jumped to over 60%, the most popular since 1940 (Chart 5.18).

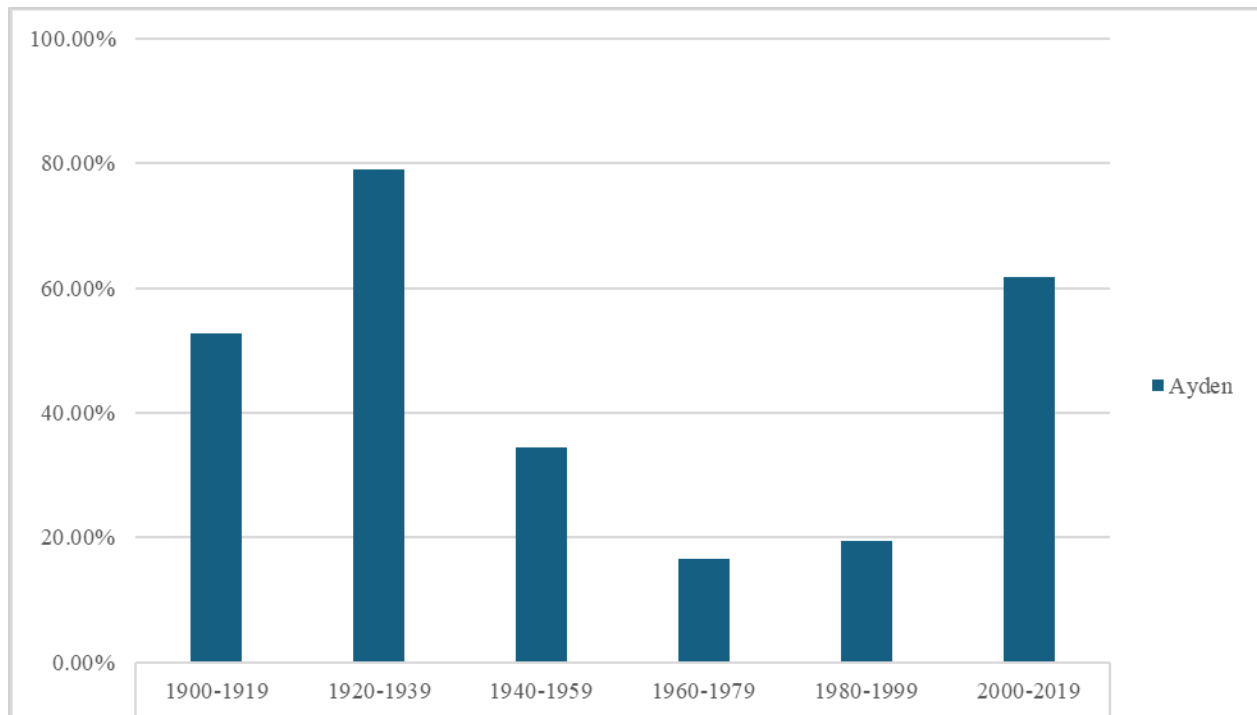


Chart 5.18: Chart showing epitaph popularity over time in Ayden

Decoration:

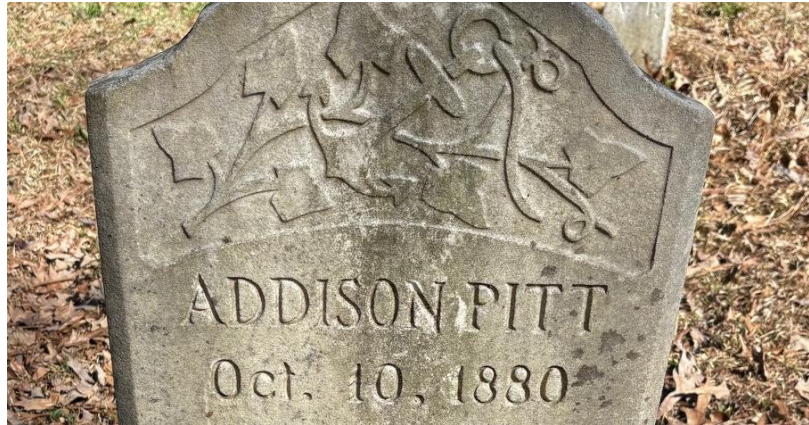


Figure 5.5: Example of the anchor and vine decoration

Initially, an examination of the types of decoration used in each cemetery was planned. To accomplish this, each decoration was sorted into a category. These categories included: floral, military, religious, military, or funeral home. The “funeral home” category was designed as a marker that included the name of a funeral home or burial service. Some of the recurring motifs seen included an anchor and vine, roses, and crosses, especially on military graves. As was seen with the epitaph, as granite markers became more customizable, the decorations became more personal and included images such as tractors and bingo cards (Figures 5.5-5.7).

When the early analysis was completed, it was determined that there were few discernible differences between specific categories of decoration. The only truly notable difference was in the inclusion of a funeral home name. Between 1940-1959, the first period where this was popular, 31.3% of markers in Ayden featured a funeral home name as compared to 4.1% in Princeville. Though the popularity declined in Ayden and rose in Princeville during the next period, it remained more common in Ayden. There are several possible reasons for this difference, all of which require further research. It is most likely that it corresponds with the greater usage of the slab during these periods in Ayden. However, since there was little other difference observed, and due to time constraints, the decision was made to examine decoration on a purely presence/absence basis (Chart 5.19).

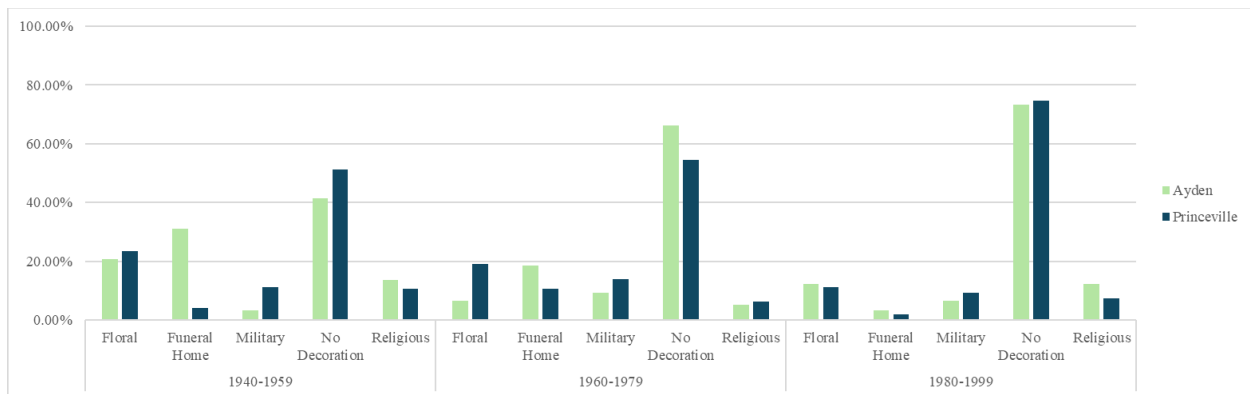


Chart 5.19: Chart showing the popularity of various decorations between 1940-2000

Princeville

Of all graves recorded in Princeville, 43.3% featured some sort of decoration. However, the percentage of markers with decorations per 20-year period has fluctuated. Of those markers that dated to the last two decades of the 19th century, 33.33% had some sort of decoration. This rose over the next 40 years, to approximately 48% between 1900-1919 then to 53.19% between 1920-1939. Then the inclusion of any decoration remained relatively consistent in popularity until 1980, though it decreased to 48.73% between 1940-1959 and 45.61% between 1960-1979.

The popularity of decoration then fell to its lowest at 25.26% between 1980-1999. However, as was seen in both towns with regard to the popularity of the epitaph, this changed after 2000.

Between 2000-2019, the inclusion of a decoration reached its most popular throughout the 140-year period represented by the assemblage, jumping to 57.62% (Chart 5.20).

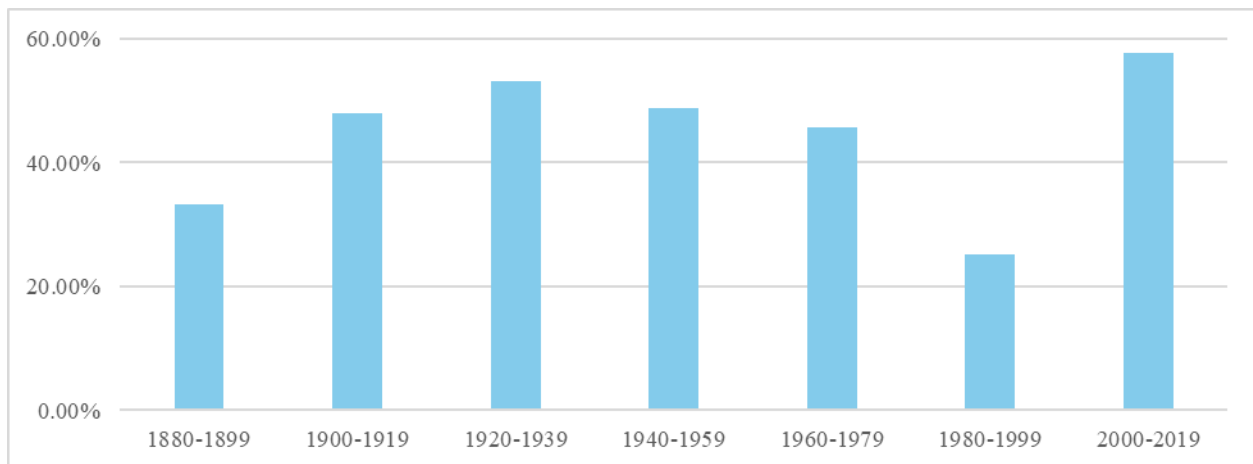


Chart 5.20: Chart showing the popularity of decoration over time in Princeville

Ayden

As was seen with the proportion of graves with epitaphs, the percentage of total markers in Ayden that feature some sort of decoration is remarkably similar to that of Princeville at 44.8%, differing by just over 1%. Also as in Princeville, throughout each 20-year period, the percentage of markers with decoration fluctuates. Between 1900-1919, 47.37% of the graves in Ayden featured a decoration. This rose to 68.42% between 1920-1939. From 1940-2000, the popularity of decoration declined steadily, falling to 58.62% between 1940-1959, 33.78% between 1960-1979, and finally to 26.67% between 1980-1999. As has been the theme with most variables, this changed at the turn at the 21st century when the popularity rose sharply and reached 78.87% of all graves between 2000-2019 (Chart 5.21).

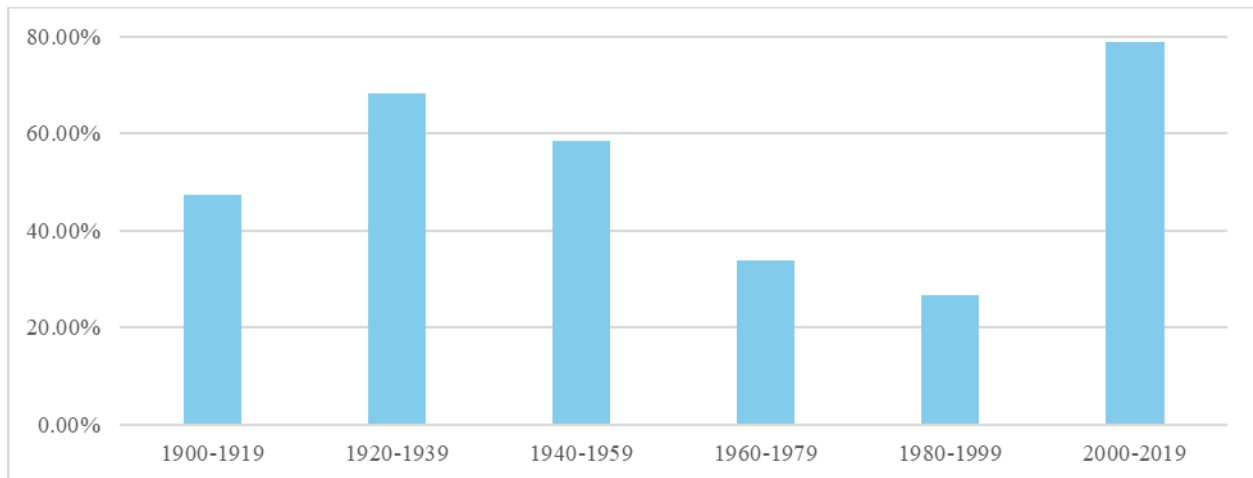


Chart 5.21: Chart showing the popularity of decoration in Ayden over time

Conclusion:

While there are many similarities between the assemblages of the cemeteries in Princeville and Ayden, each town has its own unique pattern. While there is little to distinguish the patterns of preference for epitaph and decoration, there were notable differences between the prevalence of various materials and forms. This is particularly true in regards to the slab, multi-material versus single-material constructions, and the use of concrete. When viewed through the lens of each towns' specific history, these differing patterns highlight unique aspects of each communities' culture. Additionally, as will be discussed in the following chapter, statistical analyses reveal that, beyond the differences between the two towns, there are also significant differences that appear in each assemblage before and after the civil rights movement. This speaks to the shared history of each town, which should not be overlooked even in a comparative analysis.

CHAPTER 6: ANALYSIS AND DISCUSSION

This research set out to answer several questions. The most basic was if there are identifiable differences in grave marker design between the assemblages of the surveyed cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville. At the beginning of this research, it was hypothesized that there would be discernible differences and that these would be primarily in regard to the use of concrete. As Princeville has been, and remains today, a predominately African American community, it was hypothesized that the Princeville cemeteries would see a more pronounced and longer lasting preference for concrete slabs, as that form and material combination is considered the hallmark of the southern African American cemetery (Brown 2019:32). On the other hand, it was expected that as time went on Ayden, where the African American community has always existed as a minority in a majority white town, would stop using concrete and more closely resemble the town's historically white cemetery.

Additionally, it was hypothesized that in both towns, there would be a significant difference in both the form and material of grave markers after 1970. While many areas in North Carolina were resistant to racial desegregation, most were fully legally desegregated by the late 1960s. This means that individuals would likely have access to a fuller range of materials and monument producers, as there were no longer legal prohibitions. While analysis of the data yielded confirmations for some of these hypotheses, the data also revealed some surprising and unexpected results. All statistical analyses were conducted using the one-way ANOVA test in IBM SPSS statistics software. In each test, data were converted into a binary format for both location and the tested variable with 1 indicating Princeville and 0 indicating Ayden or a 1 indicating a positive presence for the variable and 0 indicating that the variable was not present.

In order to test the hypothesis that the Ayden African American cemeteries would gradually begin to more closely resemble historically white cemeteries, a sample of burials was obtained for the historically white Ayden Town Cemetery (ATC). This sample included 673 burials dating between 1880-2019. Any burials that fell outside of that time frame were not included in the analyses. The data were cleaned and organized in the same way as the data for the other four cemeteries had been, in order to ensure accurate comparison.

Analysis of Form:

Headstone

In regard to the three most popular forms of grave marker, Princeville and Ayden do follow remarkably similar patterns, especially when it comes to the headstone. In both towns, the headstone remained the dominant form through 1940 before experiencing a period of steady decline. While both did experience a resurgence in popularity towards the end of the 20th century, this rise began slightly earlier in Ayden with a very small increase between 1980-1999 (Chart 6.1).

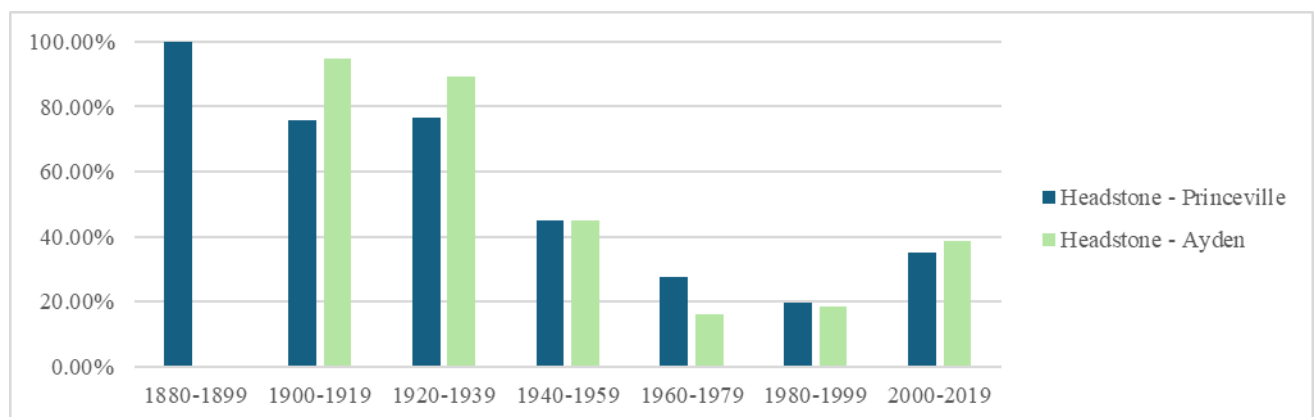


Chart 6.1: Chart showing headstone as a single form use over time in both towns

While there is similarity in the pattern of usage for headstone as a single component, statistical analysis reveals that there are significant differences when any use of headstone as part

of the marker is considered. When the entire assemblage of each town is examined, it can be seen that Princeville does show a slightly greater preference for the headstone as a component. In the Princeville cemeteries, 34% of the graves include a headstone as compared to 26% in Ayden. While these percentages are not vastly different, statistical analysis reveals that the difference is significant, and likely not due to chance. A one-way ANOVA was run with “includes headstone” as the dependent variable and “location” as the independent variable. This returned a p -value of $<.001$ which is considered significant (Figure 6.1).

While the historically African American cemeteries in Ayden resemble the cemeteries in Princeville in regard to headstone usage, both differ when compared to the historically white Ayden Town cemetery. While the same pattern of gradual decrease then increase around the end of the 20th century is also seen in the ATC, when the historically African American cemeteries are compared to the ATC, headstone usage is more prevalent earlier and less prevalent later (Chart 6.2).

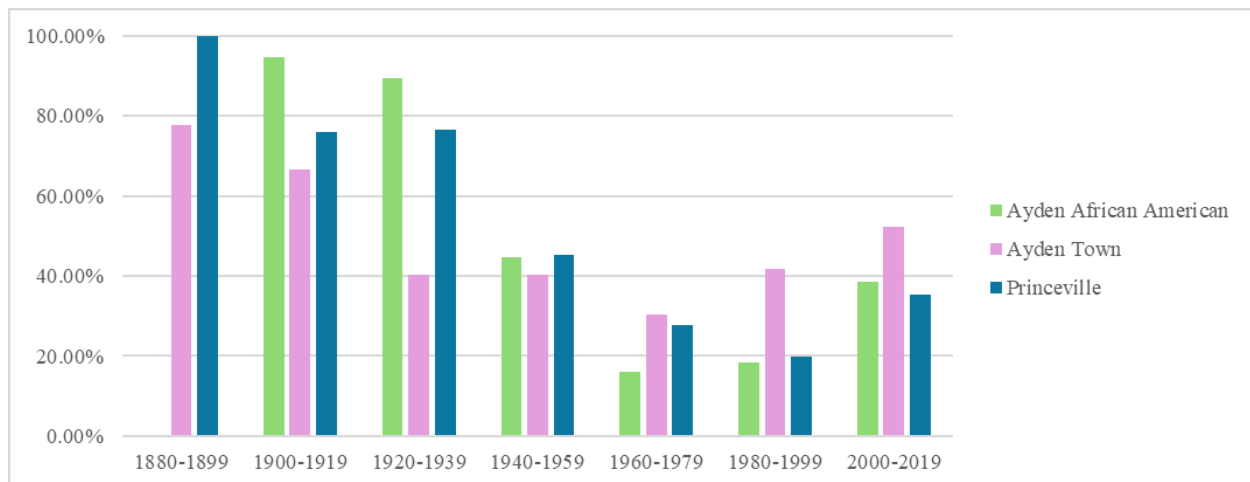


Chart 6.2: Chart showing headstone as a single component usage over time in the ATC, AAAC and PC

Plaque

The Ayden African American cemeteries and the Princeville cemeteries appear to show slight differences in regard to the usage of a plaque as a single-component construction. While the plaque seems to have been more popular earlier in Princeville than in Ayden, both towns show an increase in the popularity of the plaque over time. This trend reversed between 2000-2019, though, its popularity increased in both towns. At the turn of the 21st century, the plaque, as a single construction, represented approximately 45% of the markers in Ayden and 33% in Princeville (Chart 6.3).

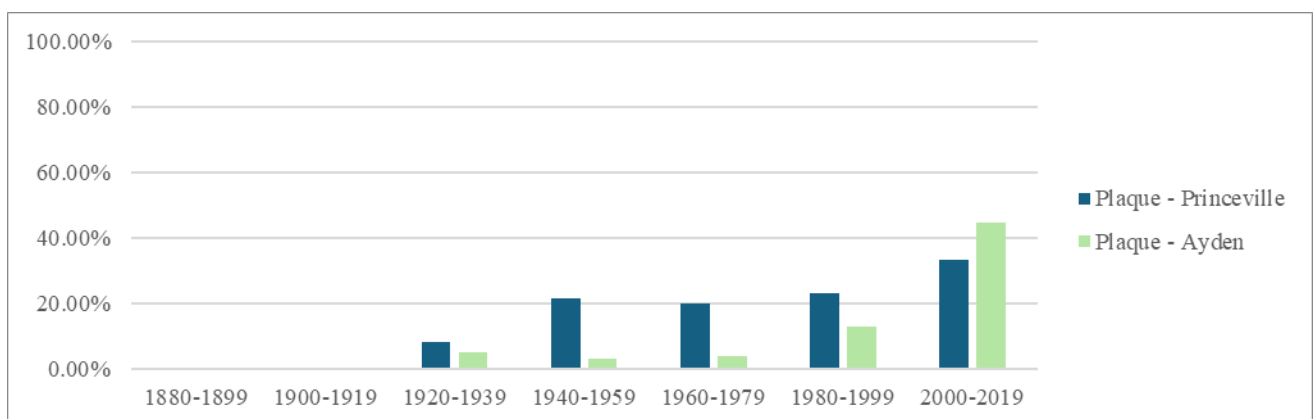


Chart 6.3: Chart showing the preference for plaque as a form over time

When the entire assemblage of each town's cemeteries is considered, 23% of the graves in Princeville include a plaque as a component of construction as opposed to 18% in Ayden. Like the headstone analysis, although these two percentages are not dramatically different, the one-way ANOVA test gave a resultant p -value of .001, which is considered significant. To obtain this result, "includes plaque" was used as the dependent variable and "location" as the independent variable (Figure 6.2).

Though the proportion of graves that were marked by a headstone did vary among the historically African American cemeteries in Ayden, the Princeville cemeteries, and the Ayden Town cemetery, the pattern was similar in each. This is not the case when it comes to the plaque. In both the Ayden African American cemeteries and the Princeville cemeteries, the plaque is not present before the 1920s but increases in popularity thereafter. It is important to note before discussing the results of the analysis that this does not include plaques that were set into concrete slabs. Conversely, plaques were present in the sampled portion of the Ayden Town Cemetery since 1880-1899. Also, although the plaque did increase in usage in the ATC between 1880 and 1979, its popularity steadily declined thereafter, decreasing from approximately 60% between 1960-1979 to about 44% between 1980-1999 then to roughly 37% after the turn of the 21st century (Chart 6.4).

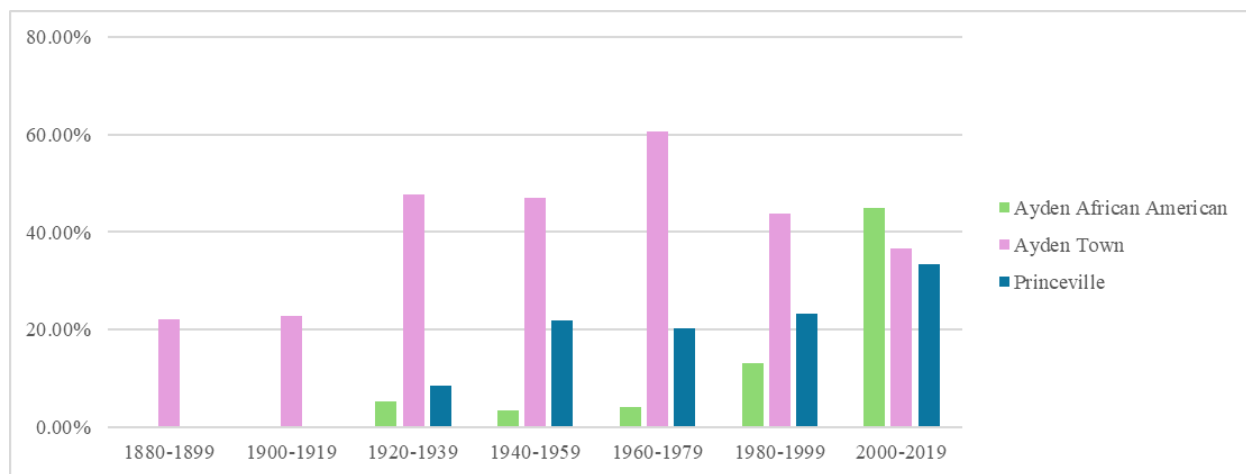


Chart 6.4: Chart showing plaque usage over time

Slab

While there are significant differences in the usage of both the headstone and plaque in the Princeville and Ayden cemeteries, the most dramatic variation is found in the use of the slab. Approximately 60% of all markers in the Ayden African American cemeteries included a slab as some part of their construction, however that proportion was less than 40% in Princeville. While both towns did follow the same pattern with slabs first emerging towards the end of the first half of the 20th century and declining in the latter half, there were also marked differences. While the decline in slab usage began in Ayden during the 1980-1999 period, in Princeville the proportion was its highest at that time with approximately 60% of all markers including slabs. While the popularity of slabs in both towns plummeted after the turn of the 21st century, the decrease was much more dramatic in Ayden, falling from over 80% to approximately 5% as compared to Princeville's drop from approximately 60% to just over 15% (Chart 6.5).

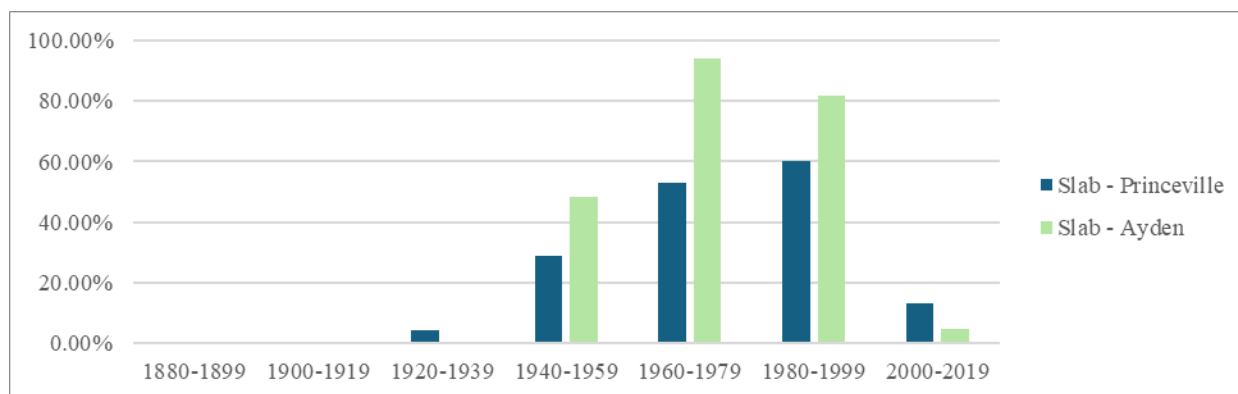


Chart 6.5: Chart showing the usage of the slab over time

Perhaps unsurprisingly, given the distinct differences shown in the previous chart, statistical analysis did return significant results. A one-way ANOVA test was run with “includes slab” as the dependent variable and “location” as the independent variable. This returned a p -value of $<.001$ which is considered significant. This indicates that the observed variation is likely not due to chance (Figure 6.3).

There were only two slabs among all of the graves sampled from the Ayden Town cemetery assemblage, one between 1900-1919 and the other between 1920-1939. This represents only .2% of the sampled graves. Both were constructed of marble rather than concrete, the most common material for slabs in the African American cemeteries. This highlights what has been said before, that the concrete slab is a hallmark of the southern African American burial pattern. As such, it was not necessary to show the three assemblages on a single chart.

There is one more variation in regard to the slab between the Ayden and Princeville cemeteries that needs to be analyzed, the differing preference for a plain slab versus a slab with an inset plaque of another material. From the introduction of the slab between 1920-1939

through the period between 1980-1999, the plain slab was preferred in Princeville. In fact, it was not until after the turn of the 21st century that slabs with an inset plaque surpassed the plain slabs there. Conversely, a plain slab represented the majority type of slab in Ayden only through the period stretching from 1940-1959. Starting in 1960, a slab with an inset plaque represented over 65% of all slabs in Ayden dating from 1960-1979. That number jumped to approximately 95% between 1980-1999 (Chart 6.6). As with other mentioned variables, a one-way ANOVA test was run to judge whether these results were significant. The ANOVA returned a p -value of $<.001$ which suggests that, yes, the difference observed in the preference for a slab with an inset plaque between Ayden and Princeville is significant (Figure 6.4).

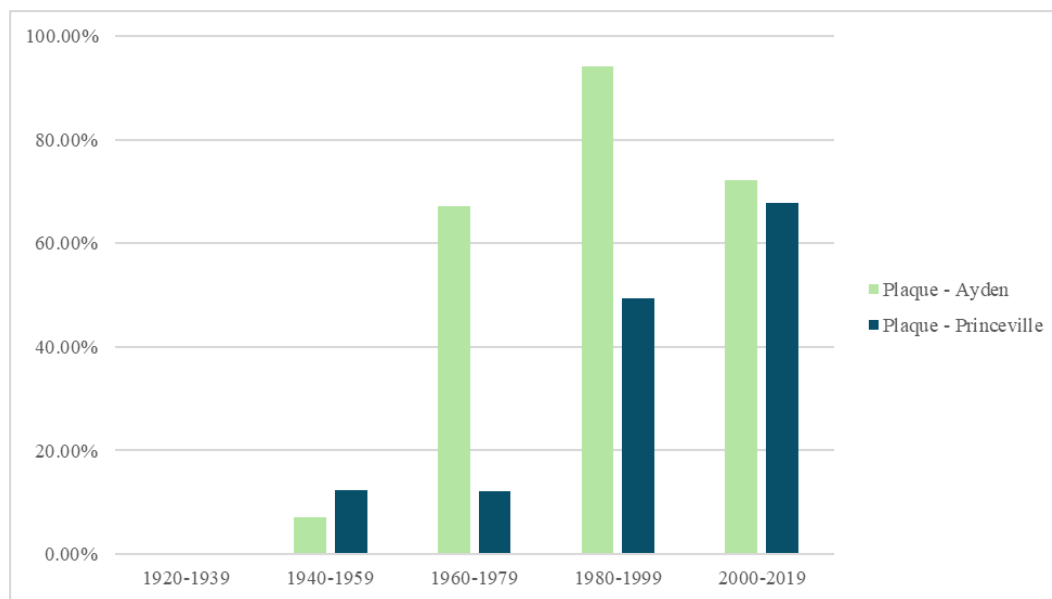


Chart 6.6: Chart showing the inclusion of plaques inset into concrete slabs over time

Discussion of Form:

While it is clear that there are differences between the burial patterns of the two communities, it is difficult to say with certainty why these differences exist. To definitively say that any specific factor is the cause, further research needs to be conducted outside of the scope of this project. However, there are many possible and indeed probable causes that can and should be discussed.

Perhaps the easiest of the variables to explain is the decline and then subsequent resurgence in popularity of the headstone. This is a common trend, or at least a trend that is common among the African American cemeteries in Ayden, the cemeteries in Princeville and the Ayden Town cemetery. Early headstones, especially imported marble headstones, were prohibitively expensive for lower income or disenfranchised people. While the headstone first declined in popularity at the turn of the 20th century, the decline was much more dramatic between the 1920s and 1960s, or during the time of both economic and cultural uncertainty surrounding the Great Depression and World War II. It is worth noting that this trend was more pronounced in the historically white Ayden Town Cemetery, than in the two historically African American communities' cemeteries. While this research suggests there could be a connection, further research mapping the economic and cultural trends associated with both the Great Depression and World War II, specifically in North Carolina, could lead to a better understanding of the variation between the communities.

The headstone started to become more popular in the Ayden African American cemeteries between 1980-1999 and the Princeville cemeteries in the following 20-year period. This corresponds with the current trend seen across the state, which is an increasing preference for customized designs (Little 1998). As technology has improved, customized granite headstones

have become more accessible. While headstones are still not the cheapest option, they have become less prohibitively expensive. However, it must be stated that, if economics was the only consideration, it would be expected that as the headstone dipped in popularity the plaque, as a smaller, cheaper alternative, would experience a concurrent increase. While this is seen in the Ayden Town cemetery, it is not seen in the historically African American cemeteries (Chart 6.7).

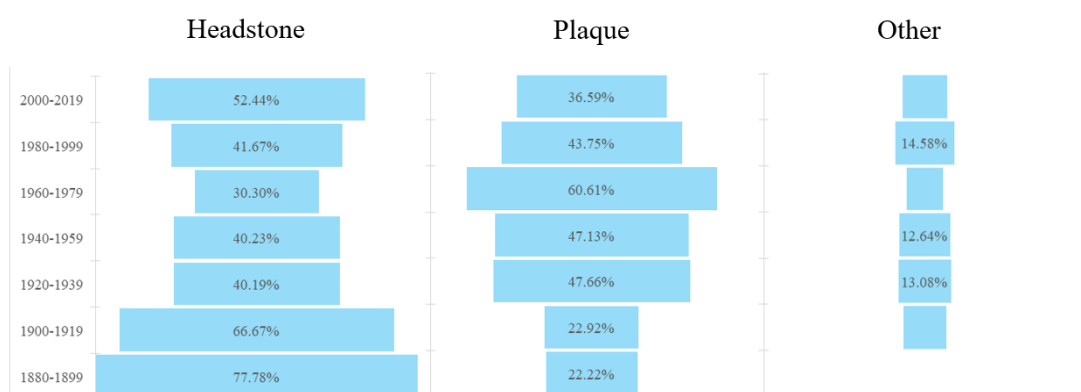


Chart 6.7: Funnel chart showing comparative usage of headstones and plaques in the ATC

As early as the 1906 Sears, Roebuck and Company catalog of Tombstones and Monuments, it is apparent that the prices for smaller, flat monuments, or what has been referred to as a plaque in this research, were lower than their upright counterparts. This held true for both the traditional marble monuments and the, then, relatively new granite varieties. (Sears 1906). The trend holds true today. While it is difficult to find listed prices for tombstones, one monument maker called Garfield Mills Cemetery Service, located in Spring Hope, NC had starting prices listed on their website. This company was chosen as it was one of the closest to the research area with prices listed. The current listed starting price for a flat plaque granite marker from Garfield Mills is \$350 while the starting price for an upright marker of the same material is \$850 (Garfield Mills INC).

If it is true that the decline and then increase in plaque usage in the Ayden Town cemetery follows the general economic trends in eastern North Carolina, this relative inexpensiveness of the plaque is a logical explanation. While it was difficult to find exact data on the median income of North Carolina adjusted for inflation, data covering the past 40 years was available and suggests that the median income has steadily increased, further supporting an economic explanation for the popularity of the headstone (Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis 2024).

This does not explain the trends of form in the Ayden African American cemeteries or in the Princeville cemetery. While the historically African American cemeteries do follow the same trend as the ATC in regard to headstone prevalence, there is a different pattern of plaque usage. Plaque usage in Princeville stays steady from the 1940s through the end of the 20th century before rising after the turn of the 21st century. Similarly, the African American cemeteries in Ayden see an increase in plaque usage by the end of the 20th century. However, by this time, the plaque was declining in popularity in the Ayden Town Cemetery. On the surface, it seems as though the economic trends that explained plaque usage in the ATC are not a significant factor in the historically African American cemeteries. However, this is not the case once the introduction and popularity of the slab in historically African American cemeteries is considered.

The slab, as a form, never experiences the same level of popularity in historically white cemeteries in the South as it does in historically African American cemeteries. Particularly, in the Ayden African American cemeteries and the Princeville cemeteries, the slab first becomes a popular form between 1940 and 1960 but had all but disappeared in the Ayden cemeteries by the turn of the 21st century, though it did account for over 15% of the markers in Princeville between 2000-2019. This follows the same trend of popularity seen for the plaque in the Ayden Town cemetery. This suggests that, though the plaque was not used in the same way in the historically

African American cemeteries, the need for a cheaper alternative to the headstone during particular time periods was common in both African American and white communities in eastern North Carolina. Most slabs in African American cemeteries were constructed of concrete, as will be discussed in the subsequent section, and they represent a cheaper option than a headstone.

The most difficult variable to explain in regard to the forms in the historically African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville is the inclusion of an inset plaque into a slab. It is almost certain that the inclusion of an inset plaque would represent an additional cost beyond that of the plain slab. As these are more common in Ayden than in Princeville, it could suggest that the community in Ayden had slightly more available income than Princeville. Another possible explanation is cultural and that, for some reason, the aesthetics of the inset plaque appealed more to the monument makers of Ayden and were consequently more readily available there. While it is clear that this does represent a difference between the towns, without further research it is not possible to conclusively determine the underlying reasons.

In regard to form, it is clear that there are distinct differences between the patterns of usage in the Ayden African American cemeteries and the Princeville cemeteries. However, the hypothesis that, over time, the Ayden African American cemeteries would more closely resemble the Ayden Town cemetery is not entirely supported. Additionally, the hypothesis stated that the Princeville cemetery would not become more similar to ATC. However, data shows that the African American cemeteries in both towns gradually became both more similar to each other and the historically white Ayden Town Cemetery. In fact, in many instances including plaque and slab usage, the Princeville cemetery appears to have more closely resembled the Ayden Town cemetery than did the Ayden African American cemeteries. Finally, though it is true that the African American cemeteries in both towns showed a dramatic decrease in the use of slabs at the

turn of the 21st century, the hypothesis that the Princeville cemetery would show a longer lasting inclusion of the slab is still supported.

Analysis of Material:

Marble

It is an established trend that marble, as the material of choice for markers, has fallen out of favor since the introduction and increased accessibility of granite. This is confirmed in the historically white Ayden Town cemetery as well as the historically African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville. While marble increased in popularity in Princeville between 1880-1919, after 1920, it experienced a steady decline as a single material through the turn of the 21st century. While the percentage of marble usage in the assemblage for each period is not identical, the trends are consistent between the Ayden African American cemeteries and the Princeville cemeteries (Chart 6.8).

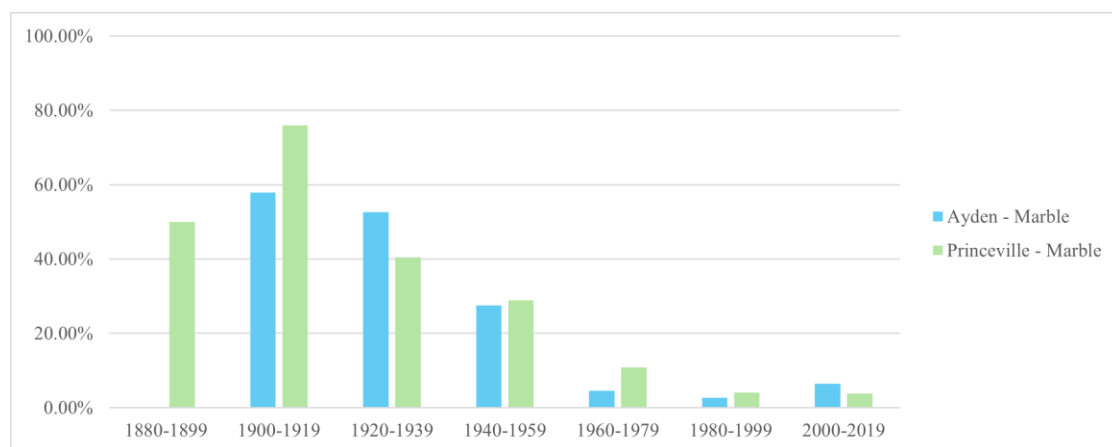


Chart 6.8: Chart showing the use of marble as a single material overtime

This trend is also seen in the Ayden Town cemetery. After a brief and slight increase in popularity between 1900-1919, marble as a single material steadily decreases in popularity through the turn of the 21st century. This suggests that there is little variation in the preference for marble in any of the studied communities (Chart 6.9). However, especially in regard to the

African American cemeteries' assemblages, it must be noted that this is only in reference to marble as a single-material construction, not markers that contain marble as one of multiple components.

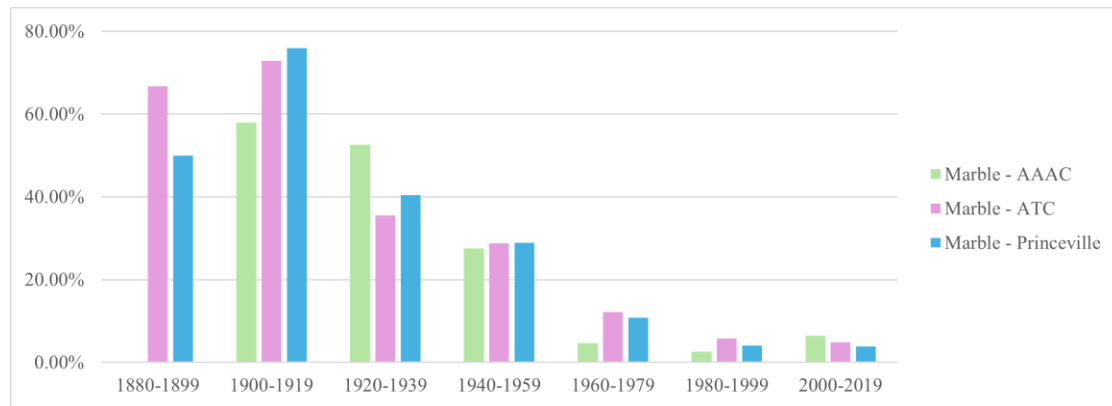


Chart 6.9: Chart showing marble, as a single material usage over time

In the African American cemeteries in both Ayden and Princeville, many grave markers are multi-material constructions. Often this is the use of concrete and some other material as either an inset plaque or additional element. Therefore, it was necessary to also explore the use of marble as a component material to truly understand marble's trends of popularity. Though the inclusion of marble as a component material has little effect on the trends seen in Princeville, it does change the trends observed in Ayden. While Princeville experienced a continual decline in the use of marble, usage of marble as a component spiked to over 60% between 1960-1979 in the Ayden African American cemeteries before declining again. In fact, during that period marble usage exceeded the previous maximum of approximately 58% seen between 1900-1919 (Chart 6.10). Statistical analysis that was done using a one-way ANOVA confirms that the difference in marble usage in the African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville was significant, returning a p -value of $<.001$ (Figure 6.5).

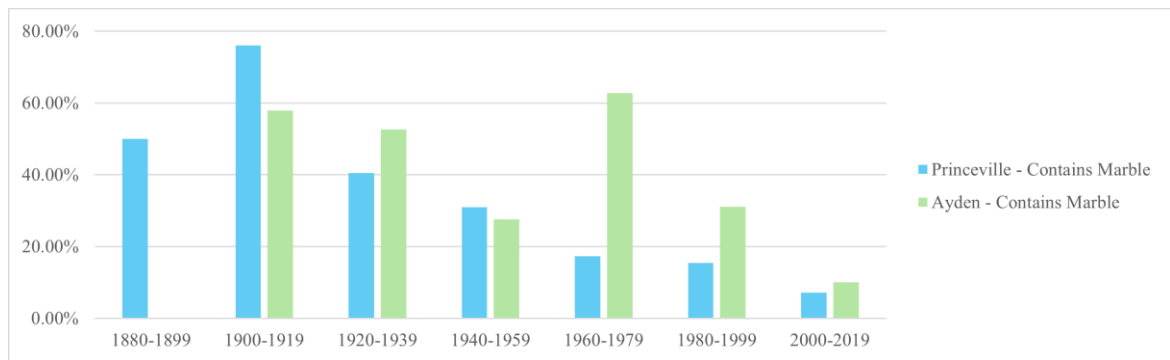


Chart 6.10: Chart showing the usage of marble as a component in African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville

This spike in the use of marble coincides with the rise in popularity of the slab with an inset plaque that was seen in Ayden. However, to fully understand this seemingly random spike in marble, the introduction of composite as a material also has to be considered. Composite inset plaques had a relatively short-lived popularity, but represented a significant portion of graves between 1980-1999. As was shown in Figure 6.9, the inclusion of an inset plaque was most popular between 1960-1999. When the concrete grave markers that also contain marble or composite are analyzed together, the trend almost exactly match the trends of preference for the slab with an inset plaque as a form (Chart 6.11).

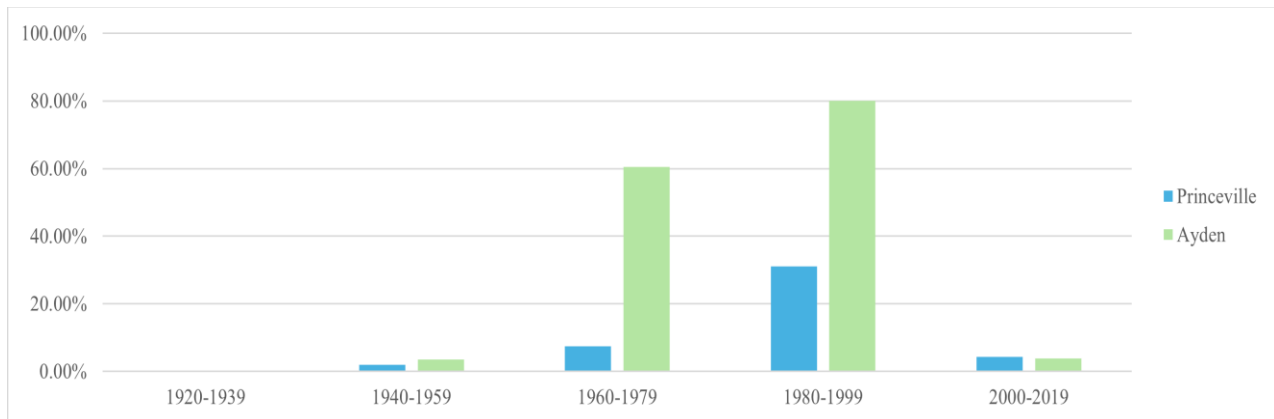


Chart 6.11: Chart showing the combined usage of marble and composite with concrete in Ayden and Princeville

Granite

In all three communities' cemeteries there is a gradual increase in granite usage over time. However, granite appears much earlier in the Ayden Town Cemetery than in either the Ayden African American cemeteries or the Princeville cemeteries. While granite is not seen in any markers in the African American cemeteries until the 1920s, it is present in the Ayden Town Cemetery as early 1880-1899. However, it must be noted that this is most likely due to older graves being re-marked with newer markers. Regardless, it is clear that granite is much more popular much more quickly in the Ayden Town Cemetery than in either of the historically African American cemeteries. In fact, of the sampled graves in the ATC, granite represented the majority of markers as early as the period between 1920-1939. It would not exceed 50% of the assemblages in either of the historically African American communities' cemeteries until after the turn of the 21st century (Chart 6.12).

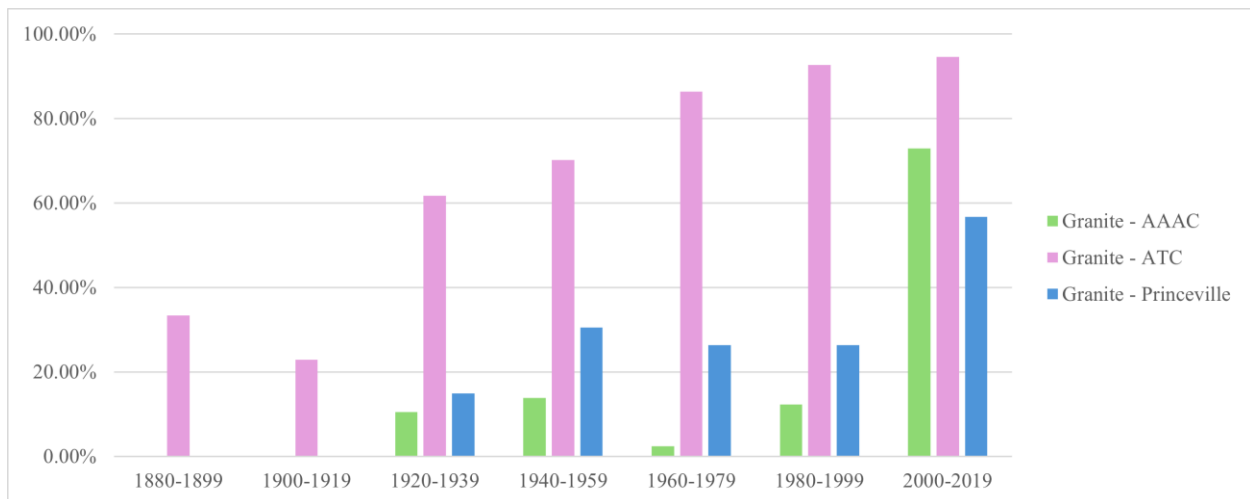


Chart 6.12: Chart showing use of granite as a single material in the Ayden African American cemeteries, Princeville cemeteries and Ayden Town cemetery over time

In addition to not following the same pattern as the Ayden Town cemetery, Ayden African cemeteries and Princeville cemeteries also do not follow the same trend as each other. Princeville's use of granite as a single material remains fairly steady between 1940-1999 before jumping to nearly 60% of the assemblage between 2000-2019. However, in the Ayden African American cemeteries, granite as a single material does not exceed 20% until it jumps to over 70% after the turn of the 21st century. In fact, it also dips to below 5% between 1960-1979, which coincides directly with the maximum popularity of the concrete slab in Ayden.

As with marble, granite as component material, in addition to a single material, also has to be considered. Though granite was sometimes used as an inset plaque material, it was never as popular as composite or marble in this regard. When all markers that include granite are analyzed, the dip in usage in Ayden between 1960-1979 becomes slightly less dramatic, though still noticeable. In all other regards, the patterns observed do not vary much when compared to the trends of granite as a single material. When a one-way ANOVA was run to see if there were differences present in the use of granite based on location, a p -value of .003 was returned. While this is higher than previous p -values, it is still considered significant as it falls below the .05

threshold. This suggests that the differences observed are likely not due to coincidence (Chart 6.13 and Figure 6.6).

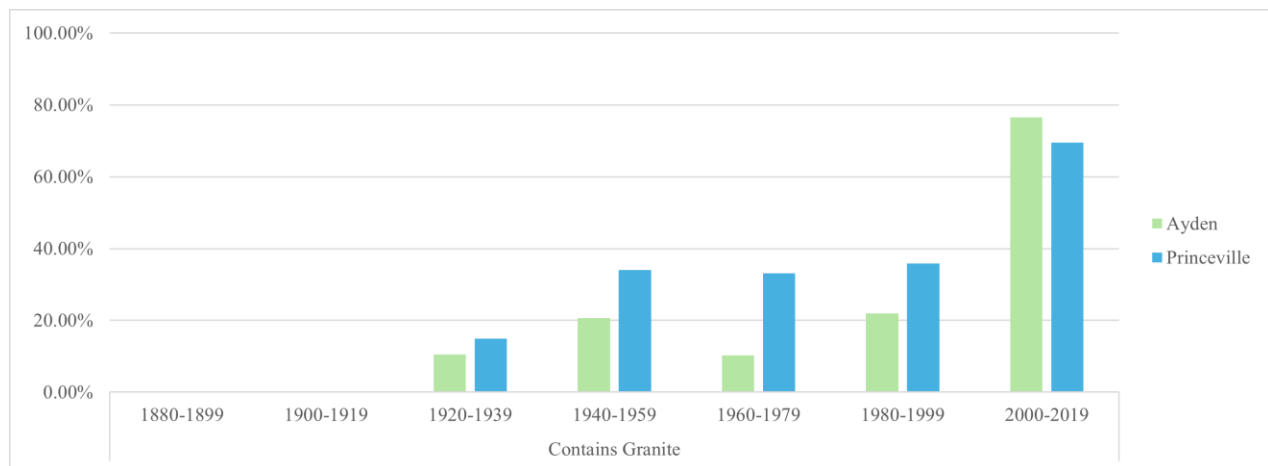


Chart 6.13: Chart showing the use of granite overtime in Ayden and Princeville African American cemeteries

Concrete

As previously discussed, the concrete slab, as well as concrete headstones and other vernacular markers, are considered to be the hallmark of the southern African American cemetery (Brown 2019:32; Little 1998:237). Unsurprisingly, there is very little concrete found in the Ayden Town Cemetery. There were no single-material concrete constructions seen in the sampled portion of the ATC and the only markers that contained concrete as a component are brick tombs. As such, it was not included in the analysis of concrete usage. The historically African American cemeteries in both Ayden and Princeville follow slightly different patterns to each other when concrete as a single material is examined. While the percentage of concrete as a single material in the assemblage in the Ayden African American cemeteries remained constant

through the first half of the 20th century, it did begin to experience a slight decline between 1960-1979 before a steep drop between 1980-1999 and its disappearance entirely after the turn of the 21st century. Conversely, following the initial decline after the turn of the 20th century, concrete as a single material fluctuated in Princeville until the period between 1960-1979. After that, it experienced a slight decline in popularity before all but disappearing after the turn of the 21st century. Statistical analysis confirms that the differences seen between the African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville are unlikely to be due to chance, as the *p*-value was <.001 (Chart 6.14 and Figure 6.7).

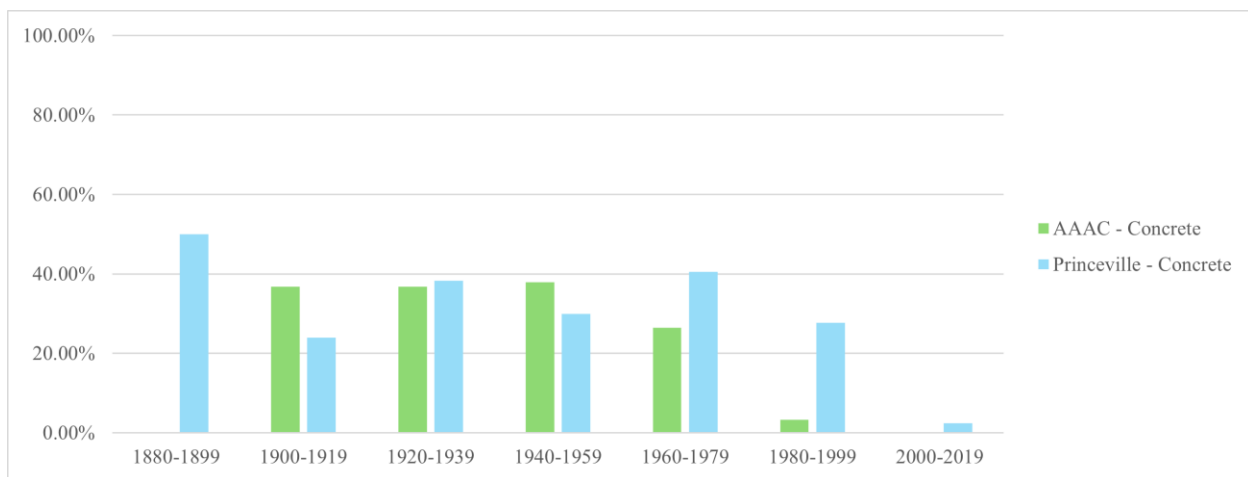


Chart 6.14: Chart showing concrete as a single material over time in Princeville and Ayden

While concrete as a single material reveals interesting trends, concrete more often appears as a component in a multi-material construction, especially in the latter half of the 20th century in the analyzed cemeteries. Concrete as a component material rose in popularity between 1940-1999. In Ayden this rise was primarily between 1940-1979 and in Princeville this was

primarily between 1960-1999. In all observed periods other than 1880-1899 (no identified graves in Ayden date to this period), 1920-1939 and 2000-2019, concrete accounted for a greater percentage of the assemblage in Ayden than in Princeville. This is contrary to what was originally hypothesized. However, it is still clear that there are differences in concrete usage between the two communities and, as shown by the ANOVA with a returned p -value of $<.001$, those results are significant (Chart 6.15 and Figure 6.8).

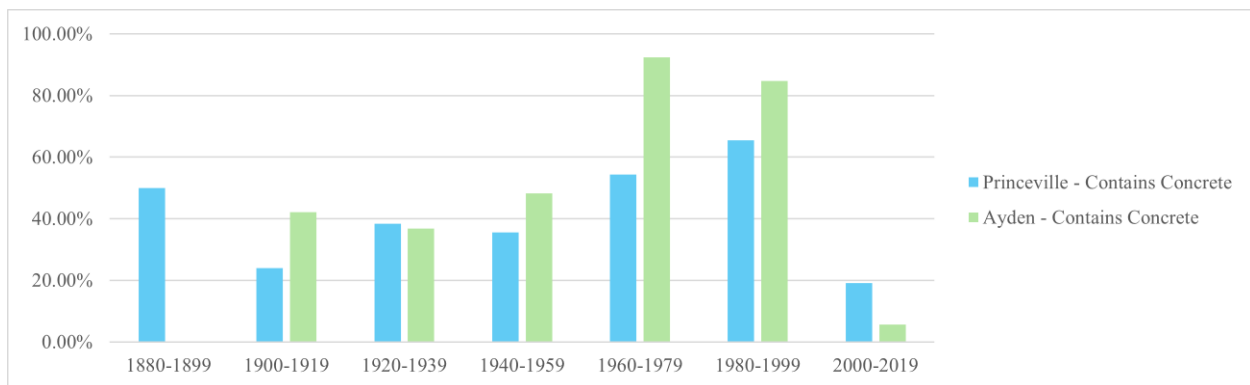


Chart 6.15: Chart showing usage of concrete as a component in Ayden and Princeville

Multi-Material

The preferences for multi-material versus single material constructions was a somewhat unexpected result that was outside of the original research questions. While multi-material constructions constituted a significant portion of graves in the African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville, only 6 graves, less than 1%, in the Ayden Town cemetery were identified as having two or more materials. As this made up such a small portion of the total assemblage of sampled graves, the focus of this analysis is exclusively on the historically African American

cemeteries. While multi-material constructions were popular in Princeville between 1960-2019, it never exceeded 40% of the total assemblage for any period. Conversely, multi-material constructions accounted for over 60% of the assemblage in the Ayden African American cemeteries between 1960-1979 and over 80% between 1980-1999. As this corresponds with the use of inset plaques in both Ayden and Princeville, it can be concluded that the introduction of the inset plaque is responsible for the rise in multi-material construction. However, while inset plaques accounts for most multi-material constructions, there are markers where it appears that a new, usually granite, headstone was added to an older marker. The one-way ANOVA test for this variable returned a p -value of $<.001$, indicating that the difference is significant (Chart 6.16 and Figure 6.9).

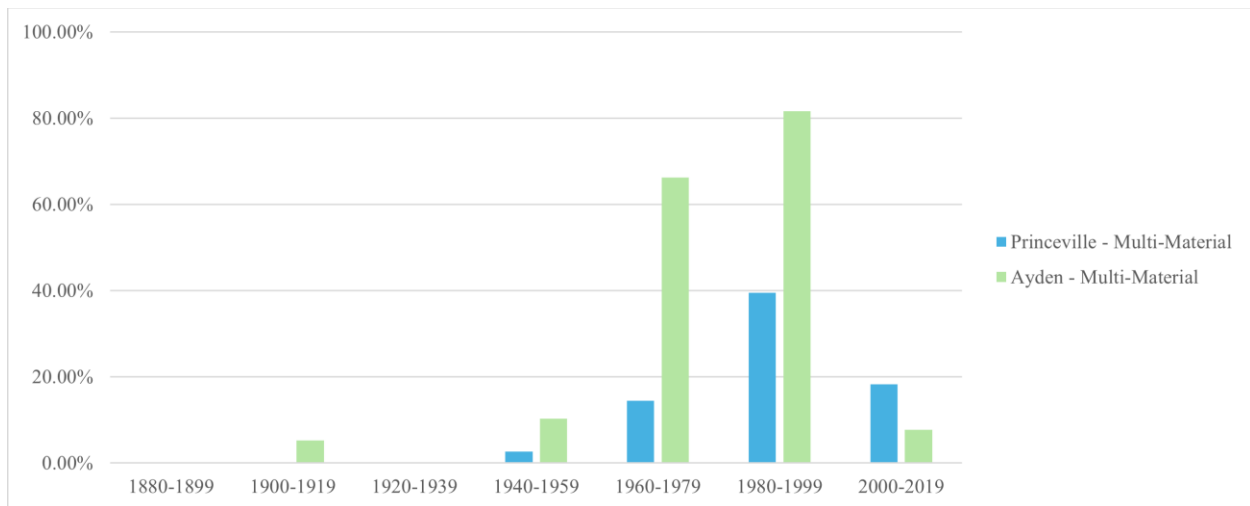


Chart 6.16: Chart showing multi-material use over time

Discussion of Material:

As with the discussion of the differences observed in form, without further research into the economic and cultural environments in both towns, it is impossible to say for certain why the observed differences occur. However, there are several probable explanations.

The pattern observed in the usage of marble is, almost completely, consistent in all three communities. All saw the expected and common decline in use of marble over time as it was replaced with the stronger, more customizable, and cheaper granite alternative (Wood 2006:47; Little 1998:231). However, there are still notable and significant differences seen in the pattern of usage in the historically African American cemeteries in Ayden. While there was still a decline in the use of marble over time, there was an interesting spike in marble usage as a component material between 1960-1979. This represents another instance where, contrary to the original hypothesis, Princeville more closely resembles the historically white cemetery than do the Ayden cemeteries.

This use of marble can be tied in with both the use of composite in Ayden between 1980-1999 and the use of multi-material construction. It is likely that both the inclusion of marble and composite as inset plaques stemmed from the same desire to add visual interest to what would previously have been a plain concrete slab. Additionally, both marble and composite are more durable than concrete. As concrete is exposed to the elements, it can rapidly decay whereas marble and plastic composite are a bit harder. It appears as though composite was used as a “replacement” material for marble in inset plaques. This is confirmed by the swift decline of marble when composite becomes popular. However, the use of composite is short-lived. While composite looks clean and marble-like when first placed, it does not age well. Many of the composite plaques seen during survey were massively discolored or cracked, or both. While

composite did present a cheaper alternative than marble, it is likely that its lack of durability was quickly discovered which led to its rapid decline. However, it should also be noted that the concrete slab fell out of favor at the same time, so the decline in the use of composite may simply be due to the lack of desire for inset plaques of any variety.

The pattern of the use of granite is fairly consistent in the African American cemeteries of both Princeville and Ayden, with usage increasing over time. However, it is more commonly used in Princeville than in Ayden until the turn of the 21st century. This is again somewhat contrary to the original hypothesis that suggested that the African American cemeteries in Ayden would more closely resemble the ATC. While the Ayden African American cemeteries' use of granite is much lower than was expected through the 20th century, it does closely resemble the ATC after the turn of the 21st century.

The use of concrete in both communities declined over time, although it did persist in Princeville for longer, as was proposed by one of the original hypotheses. However, concrete as a component material was more common in Ayden than in Princeville until the turn of the 21st century. This is closely tied with the fact that multi-material constructions were far more popular in Ayden than they ever were in Princeville. This is yet another area which contradicts the original hypothesis that the Ayden African American cemeteries would more closely resemble the ATC. Rather, Princeville's preference for single-material constructions is more consistent with the patterns of historically white cemeteries than with the Ayden African American cemeteries.

It is clear that, in regard to material, while there are distinct differences between the Ayden and Princeville cemeteries, it is the Princeville cemetery that appears to more closely resemble the patterns of usage in the Ayden Town Cemetery. There are several explanations for

this, all of which need further research to confirm. However, one of the most likely explanations is the greater diversity of occupation and the embrace of industrialization in Princeville (Mobley 1986). While this is not to say that Princeville would be considered better off than Ayden, nor to suggest that Princeville experienced less discrimination than in the larger eastern North Carolina area, it does suggest that there may have been more or different products available and accessible in Princeville. Ayden, on the other hand, has remained a largely agricultural community for most of its history. Typically, agricultural or rural communities have a greater and longer lasting use of vernacular grave markers (Little 1998:237). This is a likely explanation for the greater use of concrete as a component in Ayden during the 20th century. In the 21st century, as Ayden has moved away from its agricultural roots, it is logical that these vernacular markers would fall out of popularity in favor of more standardized/commercial markers (Power 1991:291).

The fact that Ayden may be considered a more “rural” community is one, practical explanation for the differences seen in the marker assemblages. However, there is also a cultural explanation, which is a bit harder to prove. While Princeville has always existed as a predominantly African American town, in both citizenry and governance, the African American community in Ayden has always existed as a minority in a majority white town. It is therefore possible that the Ayden community would feel a stronger need to hold on to those cultural practices that bind them as a community.

This is consistent with the findings of many researchers regarding ethnic marker theory. Ethnic markers are typically understood to mean attributes or practices that signal belonging or membership to a particular group or culture (Bell and Paegle 2021:471). These attributes, or markers, can be transmitted and shared both consciously and unconsciously. Research has suggested that the differences seen between cultural groups “should be stronger at boundary

regions than deep within ethnic territories” (McElreath et al. 2003:129). In other words, a community that exists as a minority surrounded by a separate majority is likely to hold more strongly to cultural trends than those who live in a cultural enclave. While ethnic marker theory does provide a plausible explanation for the patterns seen in the 20th century, it does not explain the change at the turn of the 21st century to a more standardized pattern in material usage. More ethnographic research is needed to explore the connection to ethnic marker theory as well as to determine the cause of the shift seen at the beginning of the 21st century.

Analysis of Epitaph:

As previously mentioned, there was little variation or discernible pattern in the popularity of different categories of epitaph between markers in the African American cemeteries of both Princeville and Ayden. Additionally, most epitaphs fit into multiple categories. They may be both relational and religious, or religious and military, etc. For these reasons, the decision was made to focus the analysis and discussion on the presence or absence of an epitaph, rather than on what the epitaph says. That said, this would present a valuable topic for future research.

In the Ayden Town Cemetery, the inclusion of an epitaph declined in popularity steadily from 1880-1979. However, at the end of the 20th century it did begin to regain popularity, though not quite to the level at the end of the 19th century. The inclusion of an epitaph in the Ayden African American cemeteries increased in the first 40 years of the 20th century before steeply dropping around 1940. Popularity continued to decline over the next 20 years before a slight increase after 1980 and a jump after the turn of the 21st century. In Princeville, on the other hand, epitaphs appear to have risen in popularity in the early part of the 20th century before steadily declining in popularity until the beginning of the 21st century. Unlike the Ayden Town Cemetery,

the cemeteries in both African American communities experience a brief increase in the inclusion of an epitaph at the beginning of the 20th century, before declining (Chart 6.17).

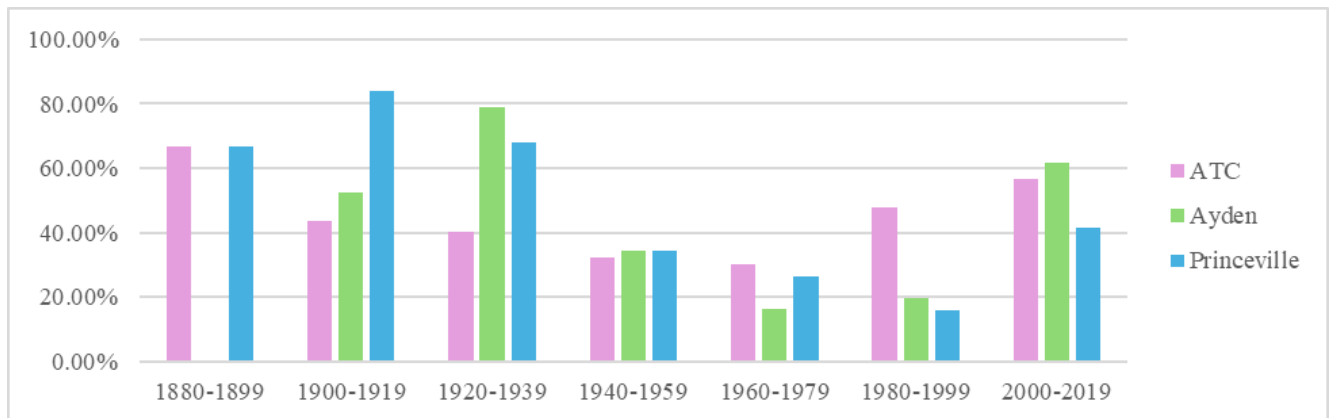


Chart 6.17: Chart showing inclusion of an epitaph over time

While there is some variation between the usage of epitaphs in the historically African American cemeteries of Ayden and Princeville, it does not appear as though the difference is statistically significant. When a one-way ANOVA test was run, it returned a *p*-value of .555 which suggests that the differences could be due to chance rather than an effect based on the location of the cemetery (Figure 6.10).

Analysis of Decoration:

Similar to what was observed in regard to the epitaph, there was little variation seen in the types of preferred decoration between the African American cemeteries of Ayden and Princeville. As such, the decision was made to approach this variable in terms of presence and

absence rather than looking at the individual types of decoration. However, as with epitaph, further exploration and study on the types of decoration would be an interesting avenue for future research.

The pattern of popularity of decorated headstones is very similar for the African American cemeteries in Ayden and Princeville. In both, decoration increases in popularity until the period between 1920-1939. It then declines through the end of the 20th century before increasing in popularity after the turn of the 21st century. This pattern is also very similar to the pattern for epitaph that is seen in these cemeteries. The trend is different in the ATC but the pattern of decoration popularity in the ATC matches that of the epitaph with a decline in popularity in the period between 1940-1959, after which the inclusion of a decoration begins a steady increase in popularity. Once again, though the percentages converge during certain periods, the pattern in the historically African American cemeteries does not match that of the Ayden Town Cemetery. Unsurprisingly, statistical analysis backed up the apparent similarity of the Princeville and Ayden African American cemeteries. The one-way ANOVA returned a *p*-value of .474 which is comfortably outside of the range for statistical significance (Chart 6.18 and Figure 6.11).

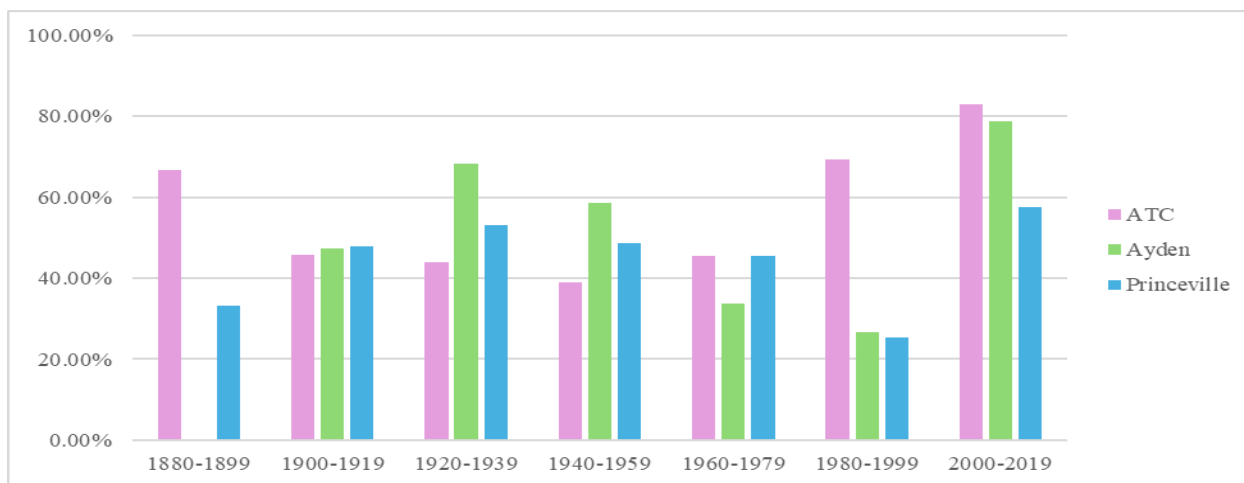


Chart 6.18: Chart showing the inclusion of a decoration over time

Discussion of Epitaph and Decoration:

Although there is not much difference between the patterns observed in the cemeteries of the African American communities in Princeville and Ayden, the general pattern illustrated is worth discussion. In his work “American Gravestones and Attitudes toward Death,” James Hijiya suggests that, at the turn of the 20th century the American preference for gravestone design entered what he called the “modern plain style.” Hijiya characterizes this style as standardized markers that were intended to be unobtrusive (Hijiya 1983:555–560). It is also worth noting the article was written in 1983, before the return of the epitaph and decoration had really taken place in the Ayden Town Cemetery. This suggests that, perhaps, the modern plain style began to fall out of popularity between the 1960s and 1980s and the modern gravemarker style is something new, marked not only by an increased standardization in form, but also an increased variety in decoration.

It is also clear that this popularity of the modern plain style does not entirely account for the trends seen in the African American cemeteries. Instead, there is an increase in the popularity of epitaph and decoration seen at the beginning of the 20th century in the historically African American cemeteries. While a preference for the modern plain style may have developed there, it took place in the latter half of the 20th century, rather than the first as was suggested by Hijiya.

More research would be needed to determine if this pattern holds true in other African American cemeteries in both North Carolina and the southeastern United States as a whole.

Effect of Desegregation:

The final question posed by this research was whether or not desegregation and the Civil Rights movement had a noticeable effect on the preferred and available materials and forms for gravemarkers. First, it was necessary to determine if there were noticeable differences before and after a certain point in time that would be used to mark the end of legal segregation. While 1960 is often used as a benchmark, it was decided to push that back to 1970. The main reason behind this decision is that North Carolina was notably slow to desegregate in many areas, even though the process may have begun in the 1950s and 1960s (Crow et al. 2002).

To determine if significant differences exist, a one-way ANOVA test was run for many variables including the most common forms and materials. In these tests “post1970” was used as the independent variable rather than “location.” All returned a significant p -value of $<.001$ except for “includes headstone,” “includes slab with plaque,” and “includes granite” all of which did not return significant values at the .05 threshold. This makes it clear that there are significant differences in patterns of usage in the African American Cemeteries in both Princeville and Ayden before and after 1970 (Figure 6.12).

However, it is important to remember that correlation does not always equal causation, and in this case, it is likely that it does not. While it would be foolish to state that desegregation had no effect on the materials and forms that were available as there were fewer restrictions on purchase, it does not seem to be a main driver of change in these cemeteries. If the change in trend were solely, or even predominantly, due to the effects of desegregation, it would be expected that the most dramatic changes would occur between 1960-1979 and that those changes would resemble the patterns in historically white cemeteries at that time. That is not the case.

While there is a dramatic shift in form between 1960-1979, it is in relation to the popularity of the slab and the introduction of the slab with plaque, both of which are grave forms that are unique to African American cemeteries. However, it should be noted that, while the slab returned a significant p -value, the slab with plaque did not.

More research is needed to determine the effect of desegregation and the Civil Rights on the trends of African American cemeteries in the Southeastern United States. Within the scope of this research, it can be definitively said that there are changes in cemetery trends over time. However, it is not possible to tie them to a specific moment in time or event. It is unclear if the cemeteries are different after 1970 because of massive social change, or simply because it is in the nature of a cemetery to change as time progresses.

CHAPTER 7: CONCLUSION

Every community has its own unique history and narrative. Far too often, the history and culture of marginalized groups are treated as a monolith and the diversity within those communities is overlooked. This study, rather than focusing on the Southern African American burial pattern as a whole, identified the trends followed in the African American cemeteries in two towns in Eastern North Carolina. After research and analysis, it can be said that the burial patterns of those two towns, Ayden and Princeville, are distinct and do reflect the unique histories of each community.

While the African American communities in both Ayden and Princeville both follow what is considered the Southern African American burial pattern of vernacular markers and concrete slabs, the degree to which these materials and forms are used is different. At the start of this research, it was hypothesized that the Princeville cemetery would retain these hallmarks of southern African American burial longer than Ayden, and that the African American cemeteries in Ayden would more closely resemble the historically white Ayden Town cemetery. It was shown that concrete, as a single construction material, has persisted longer in the Princeville cemeteries. However, in most other aspects, it is the Princeville cemetery that more closely resembles the historically white cemeteries.

In the beginning stages of this research, it was assumed that it would be the use of concrete that would show the largest variation between the cemeteries. In fact, the greatest indicator of difference was the preference for multi-material constructions rather than single material constructions. The markers in historically white cemeteries are overwhelmingly constructed of a single material, usually either granite or marble. This was echoed in the Princeville assemblage. The majority of markers in Princeville were constructed of a single

material, though concrete was a common material. The opposite was seen in Ayden during the latter half of the 20th century, with the majority of markers there being made of more than one material (Figure 7.1).

Many of the similarities between the Princeville and Ayden African American cemeteries can be attributed to the general trends of the southern African American burial pattern. However, this research revealed that, through much of the 20th century, it was the Princeville cemeteries that more closely resembled the trends of the historically white Ayden Town cemetery. Originally it was hypothesized that, due to their geographic proximity, it would be the Ayden African American cemeteries that would be more like the Ayden Town cemetery. While it is not possible to determine the exact reason for these similarities and differences within the scope of this research, there are several likely possibilities. One of these is that Princeville adapted to industrialization fairly quickly while Ayden remained a mostly agricultural community. It should also be noted that Princeville has always existed as an enclave, as a predominately African American community. Ayden's African American community, on the other hand, has always existed as a minority. This could lead to an increased desire for community expression and a firmer hold on traditional grave markers as a way to designate community culture.

There are many opportunities for future research connected to this study. This research was relatively small in scope, covering only two towns in one region of North Carolina. Future studies that expand this analysis to include other communities both in Eastern North Carolina and across the rest of the state could shed more light on the immense diversity of burial patterns and community histories. Additionally, future comparative studies could also include cemeteries from neighboring states.

Future research is also needed to determine the exact factors and experiences that led to the observed differences highlighted in this study. While it is clear that these differences exist, and it is suggested that the source of the variations is the differing histories of the towns, more ethnographic, historical, and economic research is needed to further support or challenge these conclusions.

Cemeteries are many things. They are the final resting place of loved ones. They are gathering spaces for communities. They are places where the living feel connected to their ancestors. However, cemeteries also hold a wealth of information, not only about the individual but the community and culture in which they lived their lives. It is clear that the dead do still have a story to tell the living.
